









BASEBALL 2000

The Flyers of 2000 had a T.H.S. record-setting season. Heading to the State Tournament for the third year in a row (10th overall), the Flyers boast a 20 and 1 record.

Highlights of the season were winning the Arma Tournament again, and winning the MBL Championship for the second year in a row. The Flyers biggest win of the year came on May 18, as the Flyers hosted the Regional Tournament. The Flyers easily defeated Altoona-Midway 15-1 and then smashed West Elk 16-6 to win the Regional Championship and advanced to the State Tournament in Emporia on May 26-27.






"If"


▲ Alaska Airline Flight 261 crashed 11 miles off Point Mugu, California on January 31. All 88 people on board were killed.
