## Turner Reaches 1,000 Point Milestone

The night Tate Turner (12) reached the 1,000-point milestone of his IHS basketball career, it was fitting that the senior would have the game ball in his hands as the final seconds were counting down at the Labette County game. While Tate has excelled in other sports, as well as in the classroom, his best known achievements have thus far happened on the basketball court.

Coach Marcus Lanning said, "Tate only scored two points his freshman year, so breaking the thousand point mark has been done just over a three year period. I don't know anyone who has ever done that. To have Tate reach this milestone is amazing because he's a great kid who puts in a lot of the hard work. Not only can Tate score, but he makes everyone around him so much better.

Tate's going to miss IHS basketball next year. "I will miss all the wonderful support from the fans and the atmosphere on the court," said Tate. Although IHS fans will also miss Tate, they won't have to go far to watch this standout bulldog athlete hit the hardwood. Tate plans to attend Independence Community College on a basketball scholarship.
"I'm looking forward to playing for my dad," commented Tate. Tate's dad, Tony Turner is the head coach for the ICC mens' team. "I hope the IHS fans will follow the Pirate team to watch the home town players."

Tate closed out his IHS career with 1,137 points to finish third on the program's all-time scoring list.

## One for the History Books....

Throughout the regular season, the word surrounding the IHS boys basketball team was perfection. With each win fans began to believe it was really possible for the team to finish its regular season unbeaten. The campaign to perfection began with the Osawatomie Trojan Tip-Off tournament. IHS claimed the championship with a $57-41$ win over Spring Hitl. In January the team grabbed another championship at the Wilson County Classic, the first team to ever win five straight championships there.
The team began picking off its league opponents through January and February. "We tried to keep the players as relaxed as we could," said Marcus Lanning, head coach. "But with each win there was more pressure. The players set the goal of winning league, and they didn't want to share it." The goal was accomplished when the Bulldogs took down the Fort Scott Tigers with an amazing $55-43$ victory. It was the first time for the Bulldogs to achieve a 20-0 record. The team also set a school record for most consecutive wins at 32 .

The league championship wasn't enough. The team wanted to punch its ticket to a third straight trip to the State tournament in Salina. IHS was ranked number three by the Kansas Basketball Coaches Association. The first round Sub-State game was against the Chanute Blue Comets, and sadly, the Bulldogs were stunned when, with 35 seconds left on the clock, the Comets sank a three-pointer that put them ahead 42-39 and ended the Bulldogs' season with a 20-1 record. "You always hate to lose the last game, and this one broke the kids' hearts," said Lanning. "This ones going to hurt for a while."

Three IHS players earned post-season recognition. Tate Turner (12) was named to the All-Class 4A- Division I First Teams by the Kansas Basketball Coaches Association, Sports in Kansas and The Topeka Capital Journal, Unanimous All-SEK First Team, Craw-Kan SEK Player of the Year and All-Area First Team. He was also ramed to the Wilson County Classic All-Tournament and All-Academic Teams, as well as participating in the ESPN 100.7 All-Star game in Frontenac. Marquise Johnson (12) was All-SEK Honorable Mention, Independence Dafly Reporter All-Area Third Team and Craw-Kan SEK All-Area Second Team. Kyle Rinck (11) was All-SEK Second Team, Independence Daily Reporter All-Area Second Team, Craw-Kan SEK All-Area First Team and Wilson County Classic All-Tournament Team.

## Team Captures League \& Regional Titles, Finishes Second at State

The IHS boys tennis team had plenty of positives this season. Week after week the headlines in local papers reported on the team's success during its regular season. It never gets old to hear Coach Matt Ysusi report, "It was another great day for Bulldog tennis."

Among the highlights were a first place finish at lola, winning its own home tournament, winning the championship at Parsons, taking the championship at Winfield, winning at Campus and taking third at the always tough Tournament of Champions in Wichita.

Those successes were simply preparation for the "big three": SEK, Regionals and State. Parsons hosted SEK, but IHS owned the courts that day as the Bulldogs took all four divisions with Zack Schroeder (11) champion at No. 1 singles, Josh Hilger (12) and Sam Hilger (11) champs at No. 1 doubles, Lane Schicke (12) No. 2 singles champ and Zach Stacy (12) and Patrick Hardy (12) No. 2 doubles champs. "Zack dominiated the court," said Coach Ysusi. "And Josh and Sam were aggressive and took care of business."

IHS continued its roll as it took home its eleventh straight Regional championship at Parsons. It was a tough day with the weather conditions, but the Bulldogs played tough and accomplished its goal of bringing home the championship and qualifying all six players for State. Zack Schroeder repeated as singles champion, as did the doubles team of Josh Hilger and Sam Hilger. Taking second place were Lane Schicke in singles and Patrick Hardy and Will Schabel (10) in doubles. "I think this is the second time IHS swept SEK and Regionals," said Coach Ysusi.

The Bulldogs traveled west to Pratt for the State tournament. Spring weather in Kansas is always unpredictable. Rain delays forced the final matches into Sunday, but IHS players remained focused. IHS earned 45 points, finishing behind McPherson with 53 . Zack Schroeder won third place singles and Patrick Hardy and Will Schabel won third in doubles. "Given that Zack still has two more years of high school tennis, he's playing excellent tennis," said Ysusi. "I can't wait to see what he accomplishes in the future." Ysusi went on to compliment Hardy and Schabel: "They played tough. All four of their matches went into three sets."

Josh Hilger and Sam Hilger, who took second as doubles team at State last year, finished in seventh place this year. "Although they lost in the first round, they battled back," said Ysusi.

Lane Schicke finished in eighth place. "He had a fantastic day," commented Ysusi. "He impressed me with his competitiveness."

* On the strength of her 70mph fastball, 13 -year old Mo'ne Davis became the first girt to pitch a shutout and get a win in the Little League World Series. The Associated Press named Davis, who also plays basketball and soccer for her school in Philadelphia, the Female Athiete of the Year.
* In an unexpected matchup of two wild card teams, the San Francisco Giants defeated the Kansas City Royals in seven games to win the 2014 World Series. Madison Bumgarner pitched five shutout relief innings on two days' rest in the final game to clinch it for the Giants.
* NASA took its first steps toward Mars with the initial launch of the Orion spacecraft. Orion, which was designed for human exploration of the moon, asteroids and Mars, took a test flight in December. It was hoped manned missions with Orion could take place by 2021

* The latest hit movie from the Marvel universe, "Guardians of the Galaxy, earned more than \$330 million at the box office and introduced a new group of misfit superhero space characters out to save the world.
* Malala Yousafzai, 17, of Pakistan, received the Nobel Peace Prize for her work supporting the education of women in her country. Kailash Satyarthi of India also received the Peace Prize for his work in freeing children from forced labor. Both went about their work at great risk to their lives.

* Teen girls were wearing dresses inches above the knee, jeans, leggings and jeggings with baby doll tops and even laced combat boots. Scarves and fringe were among the accents. Layered looks remained in style for both guys and girls. Guys were sporting jogger pants with elastic cuffs and jeans with or without rolled cuffs.
* The Ohio State Buckeyes won the first ever College Football Playoff, defeating the Oregon Ducks, 42-20, in the national championship game. Third-string quarterback Cardale Jones led the way for the Buckeyes in the final three games, after Ohio State's top two quarterbacks went out with injuries.

* President Barack Obama issued an executive order offering millions of illegal immigrants the chance to apply to stay in the U.S. temporarily if they have lived in the U.S. more than five years, have children and pass a criminal background check. Questions were raised about Obama's use of executive action versus working to get an immigration bill through Congress.
* The nominees for Best Picture at the Oscars included "Boyhood," a coming-of-age film that was shot over the course of 12 years and showed a young boy and his sister growing up through their school years. Other nominees included "American Sniper," "Birdman," "The Imitation Game," and "Selma."
* Ridesharing service Uber expanded to more than 200 cities. Smartphone users were able to arrange rides via the Uber app. However in many cities taxi drivers protested Uber, claiming they were avoiding the fees and restrictions taxi companies face.
* In his first year as host, comedian Jimmy Fallon helped boost the ratings of "The Tonight Show" for the first time in years. Fallon introduced the traditional late-night show to younger viewers with comedy bits that quickly became viral video sensations.

* AMC's zombie drama "The Walking Dead" continued to gain viewers. The show's season 5 premiere was watched by more than 17 million people, making it the most-watched episode in cable TV history.

Spurs hired retired WNBA
player Beoky Hammon as an assistant coach, making her the first full-time female coach in NBA history, During her playing days, Hammon was a 6-time WNBA All Star and a college All-American.
