


We hope you enjoy thumbing through these pages, reminiscing on the year we spent piecing it together.




STATE CHAMPS



Hunter Boorigie (12), Abby Dunham (10), and Curtis Burnett (12) earned SEK Honorable Mention. Both varsity teams then traveled to Wichita for the Regional race. The boys' team finished thirteenth and the girls' finished eleventh. The team ran a total of 6,527 miles to conclude their season which was a 26 mile average per week from start to finish. With a 3-1 record, IHS was hoping for a win against the Chanute Comets, but it was not to be (50-26). IHS then suffered another loss to the Ft. Scott Tigers (22-7).

The Bulldogs traveled to county rival Field Kindley where they were handed another loss (66-12). Things improved the following week when IHS squeaked by Winfield with a 30-28 win. The season came to an end with a 47-13 loss to Augusta and a 4-5 record.

Coach Carl Boldra said, "The boys did very well, but due to injuries early in the season we didn't finish as well as we had hoped."

Post-season honors went to seven IHS players. Marquise Johnson (12), Evan Speicher (12) and Kyle Rinck (11) were All-SEK First Team picks. Jordan Mead (12) got the nod for All-SEK Second Team, while Honorable Mention went to Athaniel Collins (12), Dalson Hamlin (11) and Max Jones (11).


BUILDING an argument

Tate's going to miss IHS basketball next year. "I will miss all the wonderful support from the fans and the atmosphere on the court," said Tate. Although IHS fans will also miss Tate, they won't have to go far to watch this standout bulldog athlete hit the hardwood. Tate plans to attend Independence Community College on a basketball scholarship.

"I'm looking forward to playing for my dad," commented Tate. Tate's dad, Tony Turner is the head coach for the ICC mens' team. "I hope the IHS fans will follow the Pirate team to watch the home town players."

Tate closed out his IHS career with 1,137 points to finish third on the program's all-time scoring list.

One for the History Books

Throughout the regular season, the word surrounding the IHS boys basketball team was *perfection*. With each win fans began to believe it was really possible for the team to finish its regular season unbeaten. The campaign to perfection began with the Osawatomie Trojan Tip-Off tournament. IHS claimed the championship with a 57-41 win over Spring Hill. In January the team grabbed another championship at the Wilson County Classic, the first team to ever win five straight championships there.

The team began picking off its league opponents through January and February. "We tried to keep the players as relaxed as we could," said **Marcus Lanning, head coach**. "But with each win there was more pressure. The players set the goal of winning league, and they didn't want to share it." The goal was accomplished when the Bulldogs took down the Fort Scott Tigers with an amazing 55-43 victory. It was the first time for the Bulldogs to achieve a 20-0 record. The team also set a school record for most consecutive wins at 32.

The league championship wasn't enough. The team wanted to punch its ticket to a third straight trip to the State tournament in Salina. IHS was ranked number three by the Kansas Basketball Coaches Association. The first round Sub-State game was against the Chanute Blue Comets, and sadly, the Bulldogs were stunned when, with 35 seconds left on the clock, the Comets sank a three-pointer that put them ahead 42-39 and ended the Bulldogs' season with a 20-1 record. "You always hate to lose the last game, and this one broke the kids' hearts," said Lanning. "This one's going to hurt for a while."

Three IHS players earned post-season recognition. **Tate Turner** (12) was named to the All-Class 4A- Division I First Teams by the Kansas Basketball Coaches Association, Sports in Kansas and The Topeka Capital Journal, Unanimous All-SEK First Team, Craw-Kan SEK Player of the Year and All-Area First Team. He was also named to the Wilson County Classic All-Tournament and All-Academic Teams, as well as participating in the ESPN 100.7 All-Star game in Frontenac. **Marquise Johnson** (12) was All-SEK Honorable Mention, Independence Daily Reporter All-Area Third Team and Craw-Kan SEK All-Area Second Team. **Kyle Rinck** (11) was All-SEK Second Team, Independence Daily Reporter All-Area Second Team, Craw-Kan SEK All-Area First Team and Wilson County Classic All-Tournament Team.














Anna [Bend, but never Miller Break]














































IHS Tennis










IHS Bids Farewell Staff Members Move on to Other Positions

Every spring students select from a wide variety of music pieces to practice and perform either in quartets or as solos at District Competition.






[Vocal Music]














NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY

While attending IHS, Luber was on the soccer team and also participated in track. He hopes to return to Kansas in the future and maybe even attend college in the United States.






















★ A spacecraft launched by the European Space Agency 10 years ago successfully landed a robotic probe on the surface of a comet. The probe, named the Philae, immediately sent back pictures and was expected to monitor the comet for four to five months.

★ SpaceShipTwo, one of the planes for Virgin Galactic's new space tourism company, crashed in the Mojave Desert during a test flight. One of the plane's two pilots was killed, and the company's test flight program was set back several months.

★ After 20 seasons, New York Yankees shortstop Derek Jeter retired. The 14-time All Star finished his career as the Yankees' leader in hits and games played. His final total of 3,465 hits was the most ever by a shortstop.

★ Lava from the Kilauea volcano on the big island of Hawaii destroyed a house in November, five months after the lava flow began. No one was injured. Residents had been on alert to evacuate since June, and were moving possessions out of their homes to protect them.

★ Fans flocked to see "The Hunger Games: Mockingjay – Part 1" around the holidays. The first of two movies scheduled to be made based on the final book in "The Hunger Games" series drew rave reviews.

★ Devoted Harry Potter fans received a special treat when author J.K. Rowling published six new short stories on the Pottermore website that provided a whole new round of backstory on the Potter world.

★ iPhone sales surpassed 500 million devices as Apple released the iPhone 6 and 6 Plus. The newest iPhones came with the largest screen size to date and an improved camera.



★ On the strength of her 70mph fastball, 13-year old Mo'ne Davis became the first girl to pitch a shutout and get a win in the Little League World Series. The Associated Press named Davis, who also plays basketball and soccer for her school in Philadelphia, the Female Athlete of the Year.



In an unexpected matchup of two wild card teams, the San Francisco Giants defeated

the Kansas City Royals in seven games to win the 2014 World Series. Madison Bumgarner pitched five shutout relief innings on two days' rest in the final game to clinch it for the Giants.

★ NASA took its first steps toward Mars with the initial launch of the Orion spacecraft. Orion, which was designed for human exploration of the moon, asteroids and Mars, took a test flight in December. It was hoped manned missions with Orion could take place by 2021.



The latest hit movie from the Marvel universe, "Guardians of the Galaxy," earned more than \$330 million at the box office and introduced a new group of misfit superhero space characters out to save the world.

★ Malala Yousafzai, 17, of Pakistan, received the Nobel Peace Prize for her work supporting the education of women in her country. Kailash Satyarthi of India also received the Peace Prize for his work in freeing children from forced labor. Both went about their work at great risk to their lives.

★ Teen girls were wearing dresses inches above the knee, jeans, leggings and jeggings with baby doll tops and even laced combat boots. Scarves and fringe were among the accents. 

★ President Barack Obama issued an executive order offering millions of illegal immigrants the chance to apply to stay in the U.S. temporarily if they have lived in the U.S. more than five years, have children and pass a criminal background check. Questions were raised about Obama's use of executive action versus working to get an immigration bill through Congress.

* The nominees for Best Picture at the Oscars included "Boyhood," a coming-of-age film that was shot over the course of 12 years and showed a young boy and his sister growing up through their school years. Other nominees included "American Sniper," "Birdman," "The Imitation Game," and "Selma."

★ Ridesharing service Uber expanded to more than 200 cities. Smartphone users were able to arrange rides via the Uber app. However in many cities taxi drivers protested Uber, claiming they were avoiding the fees and restrictions taxi companies face.

★ In his first year as host, comedian Jimmy Fallon helped boost the ratings of "The Tonight Show" for the first time in years. Fallon introduced the traditional late-night show to younger viewers with comedy bits that quickly became viral video sensations.





★ AMC's zombie drama "The Walking Dead" continued to gain viewers. The show's season 5 premiere was watched by more than 17 million people, making it the most-watched episode in cable TV history.





Not many had a better year than Pharrell Williams. The singer, songwriter and producer earned six Grammy nominations, including Album of the Year for his latest album, Girl. Plus, Williams' song "Happy" was a number one hit.



★ The New England Patriots won Super Bowl XLIX, 28-24, over the Seattle Seahawks in dramatic fashion when rookie Malcolm Butler intercepted a pass in the end zone with 26 seconds left. Seattle's decision to call for a pass rather than run with the ball on the 1-yard line was questioned by many.

★ Health officials struggled to contain the Ebola epidemic, which began in West Africa. A few cases were treated in the U.S. Of those, two people died, but among the survivors was Nina Pham, a nurse who caught Ebola while treating a patient with the disease.








In November, areas of Buffalo, N.Y., received up to seven feet of lake-effect snow in four days in November. People were trapped in their houses and vehicles, and roofs collapsed. In a two-week period in January and February, Boston received more than 75 inches of snow, with more on the way.
