Chapter 3 THE BEGINNINGS OF GOVERNMENT IN THE UNITED STATES

The roots of American government reach deep into the past. Our system of government did not suddenly spring into being as if the words of some political magician's wand. Nor was it pulled out of thin air by the

Our English Heritage. The French, Spanish, Dutch, Norwegian, and other Europeans settled in parts of what was to become the United States. But it was the English who came in the largest numbers. And it was the English who came to control the thirteen colonies that stretched for 1,500 miles along the Atlantic seaboard.

These early pioneers who cleared the wilderness and fought off the Indians had to back out their own responsibility for the future in the New World. But they came here in search of greater freedom and they brought much of their political heritage with them. Rather, it has developed through long centuries of experience, tradition, thought, and deed. We shall now review the high points of their heritage.

The Colonial Period

From the time that they brought much of their political heritage with them, the English brought with them the concept of a governmental system that has been working and developing in England for hundreds of years. These political ideas, especially those that came to the United States, were especially important in the development of the American governmental system. We shall now review the high points of their heritage.

of which are to be found today — county, borough, jury, sheriff, coroner, and justice of the peace, for example. And all of these were well-known in England long before the first Englishman ever heard of America.

(1) *The Twin Concepts of Limited Government and Civil Liberties.* They brought with them, too, the twin ideas of limited government and civil liberties. That is, that government is not all-powerful, that government is limited in what it may do, and, especially, that it is limited in the sense

that each man has certain rights that government cannot injure or take away. These great principles of freedom were proclaimed in such historic English documents as the Magna Carta in 1215, the Petition of Right in 1628, and the Bill of Rights and the Act of Toleration of 1689.

(2) *The Concept of Representative Government.* A third vitally important concept brought to America in English ships was that of representative government. For centuries there had been developing in England the
