

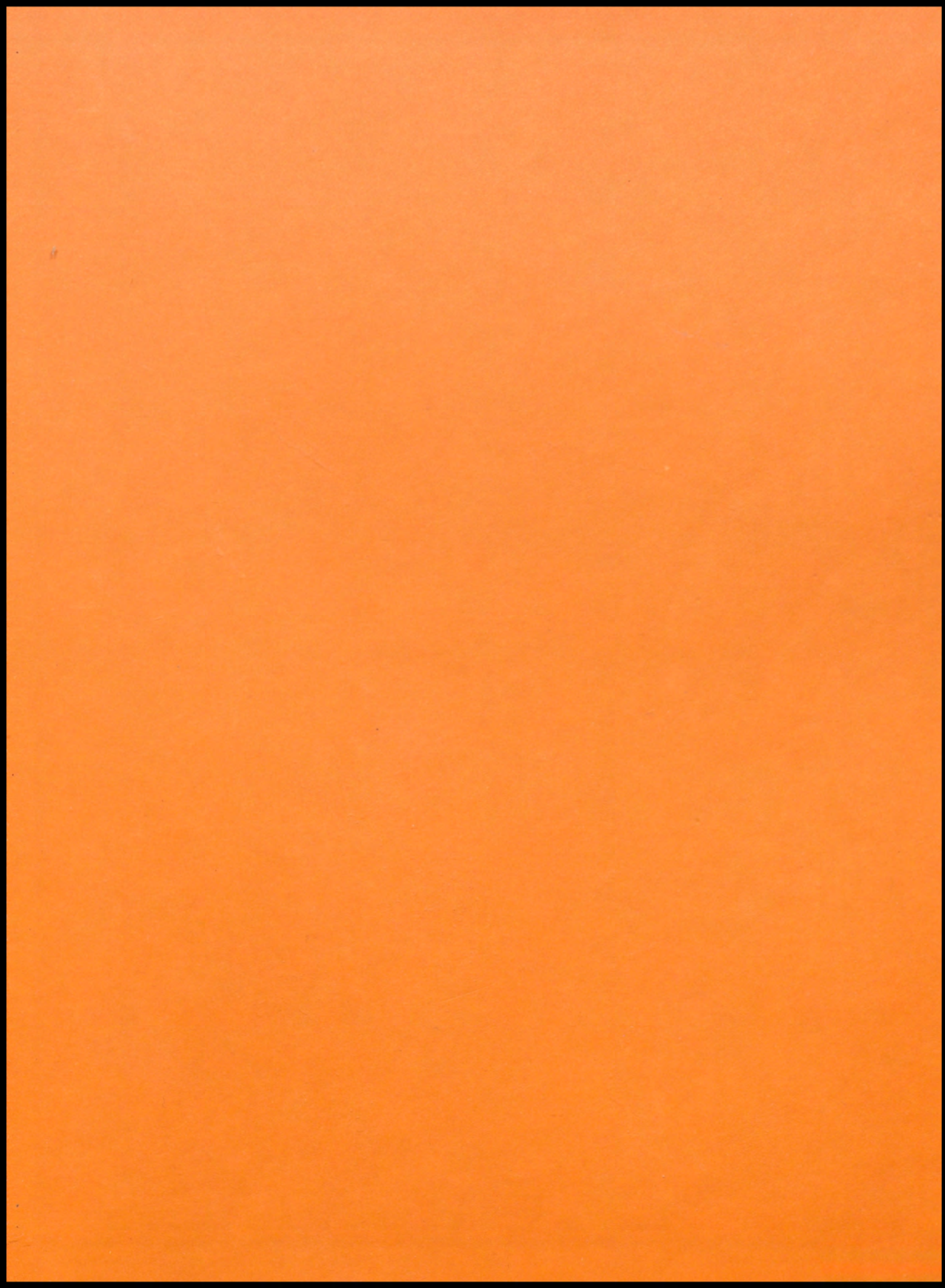


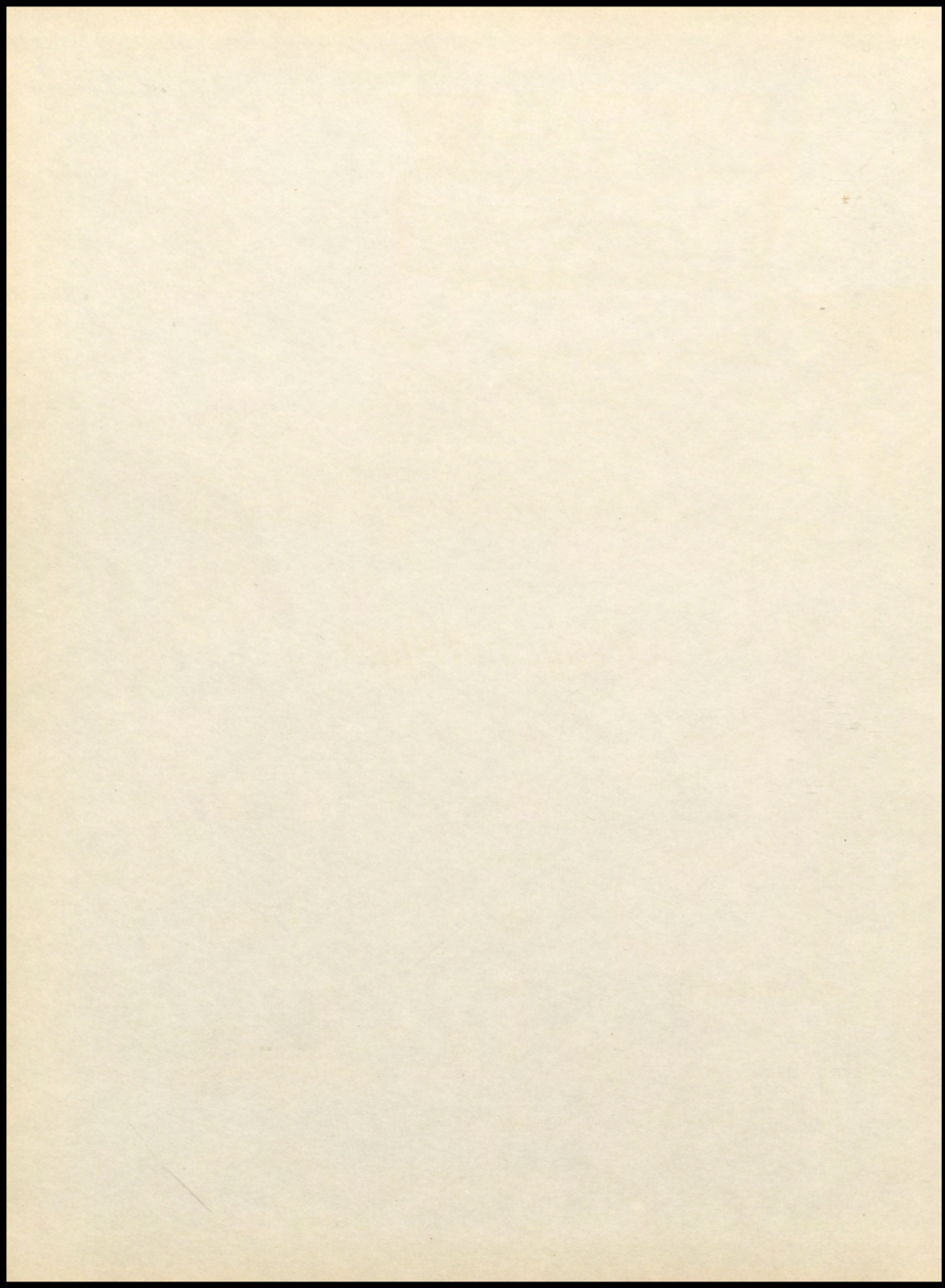

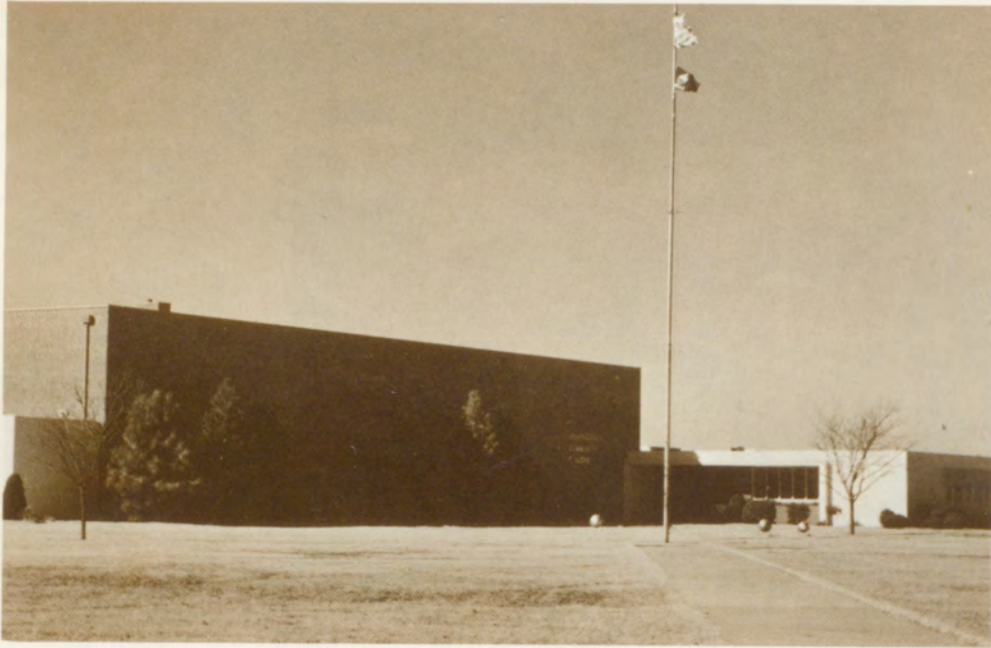

One of the physical changes was the change in identification on the exterior of the building. Early in the first semester the "community college" was replaced by High School.

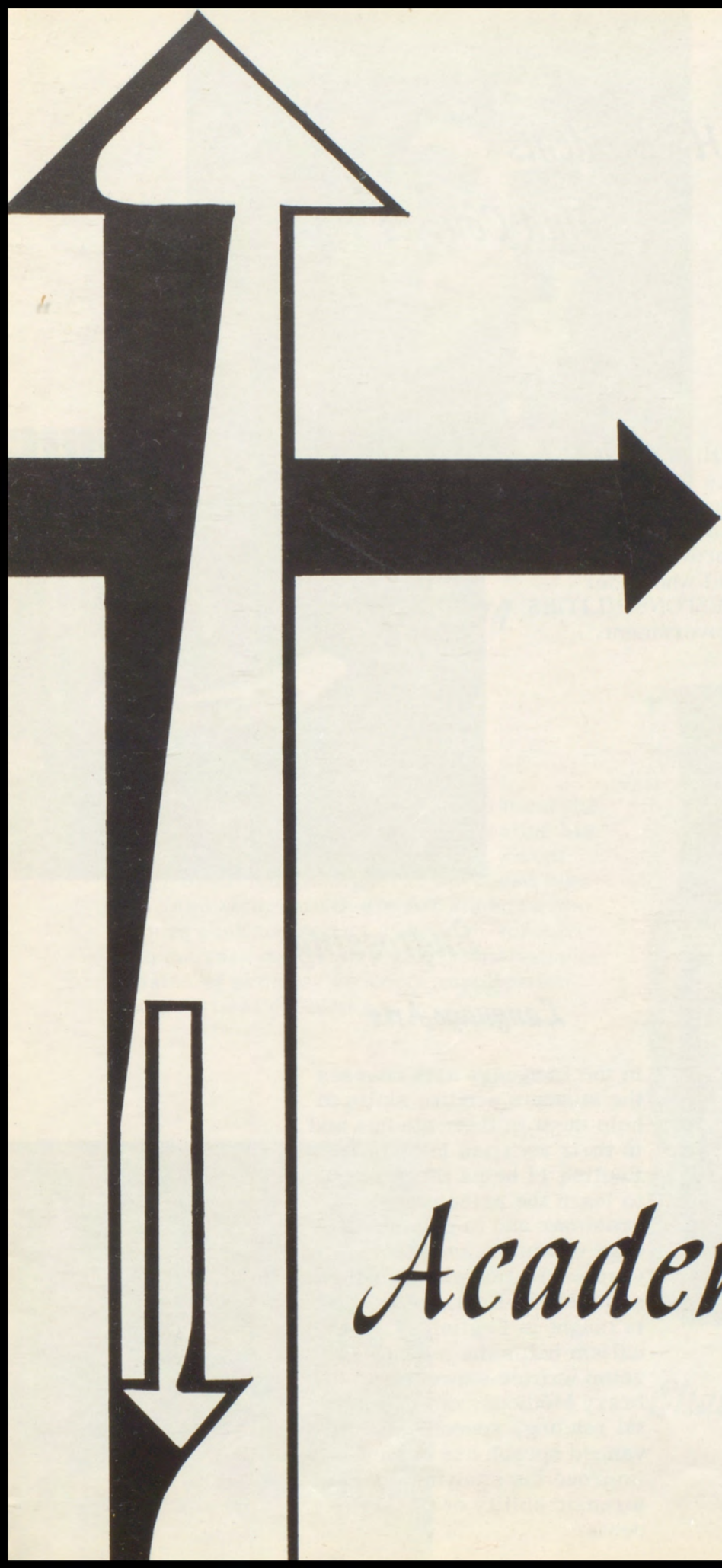

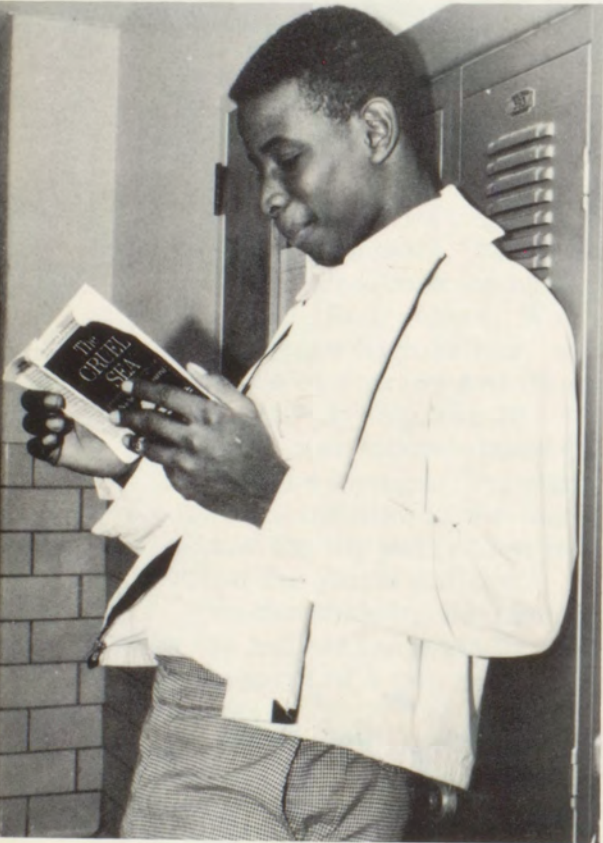

### *Philosophy*

The goal of Independence High School is to provide educational experience for its youth which will afford each individual the opportunity to develop to the maximum of his potential. These experiences are provided to help him become a useful individual who understands his FREEDOMS and RESPONSIBILITIES under a democratic form of government.



### *Engrossing*

#### *Language Arts*

In the Language arts courses the students acquire skills to help them in their studies and in their vocation later in life. English 11 helps the student to learn the principles of grammar and to gain knowledge of American authors. Communication skills and a study of the English language is taught in English 12. Journalism helps the students develop written expression. Library Methods, developmental reading, speech and advanced speech are designed to improve the studying and forensic ability of the students.







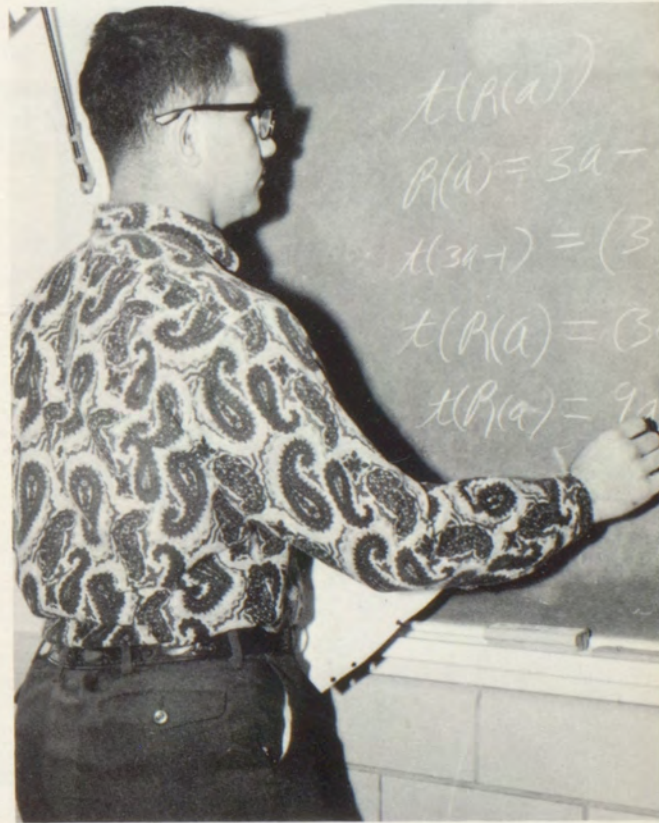
## *Social Studies*

American history and American government are offered to give the students a greater understanding of the problems confronting the nation. Other social studies courses available that encourage understanding in local, state, national and world affairs are: economics, world cultures, psychology, and sociology.

Consumer math is designed to meet the needs of the student who is terminating his formal education in mathematics. Geometry, intermediate algebra, advanced algebra, and senior math are for students who plan to continue school after high school. 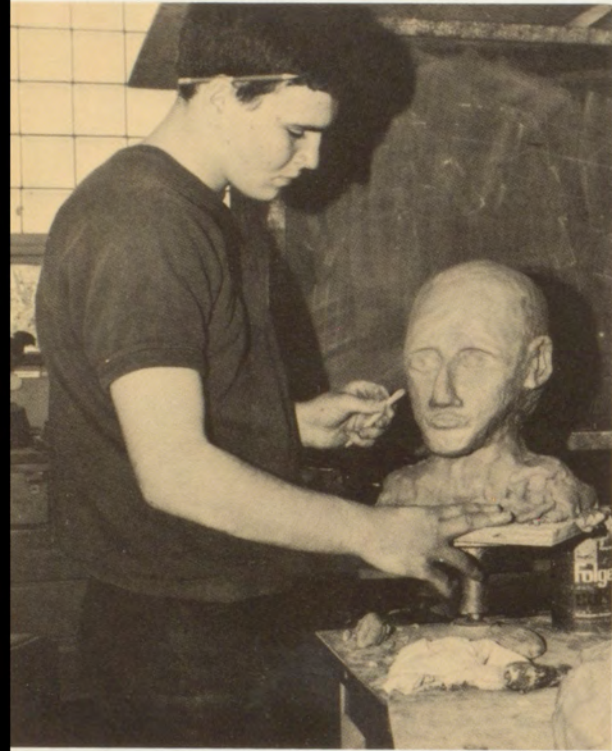

## *Dorita Reed Honored*

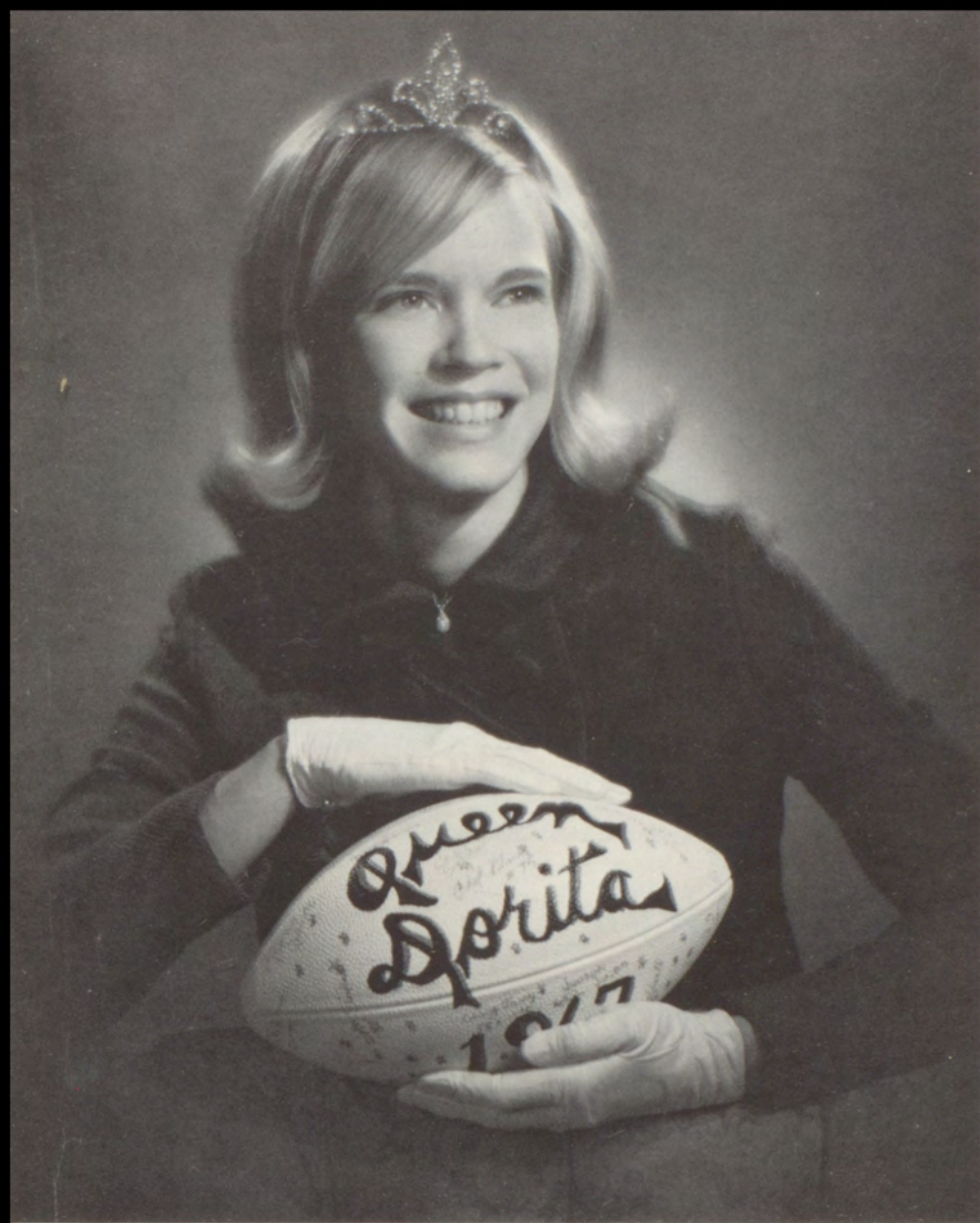

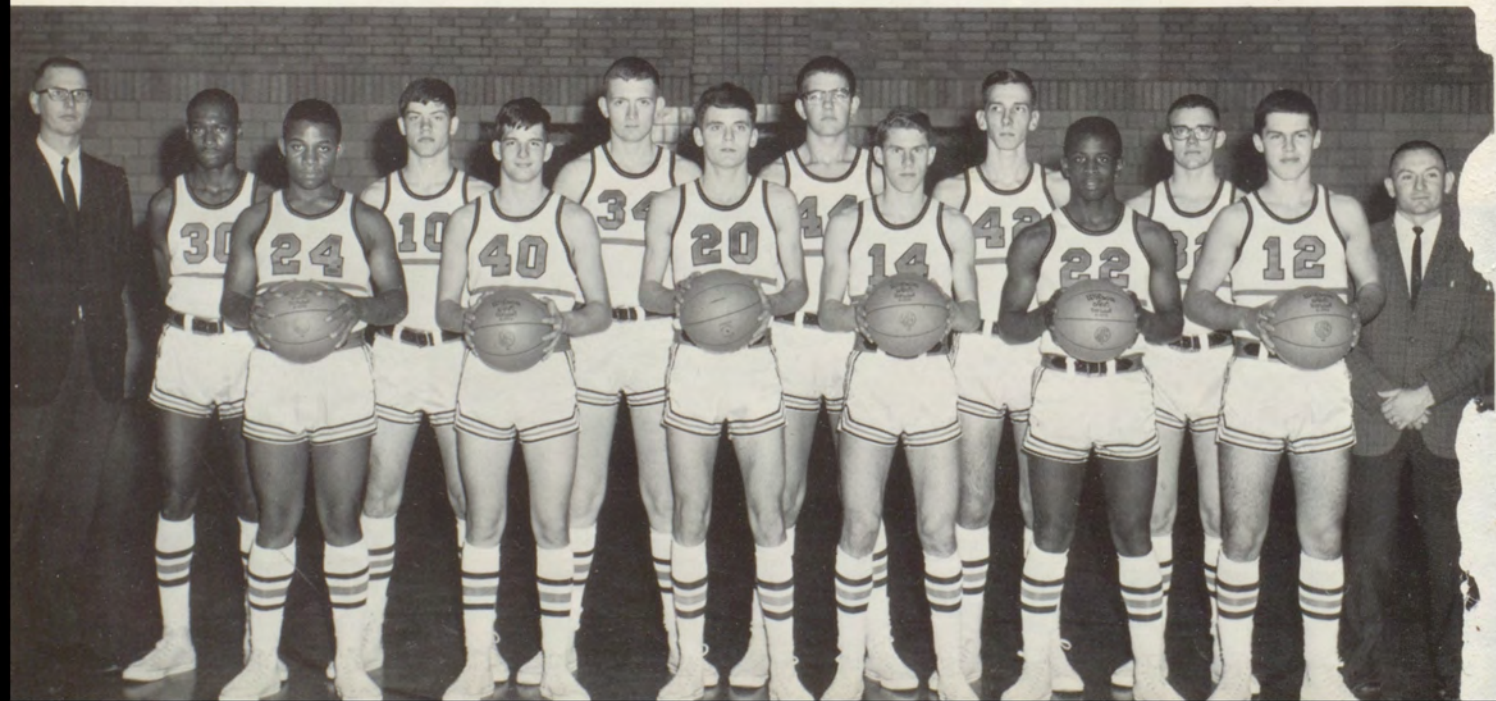

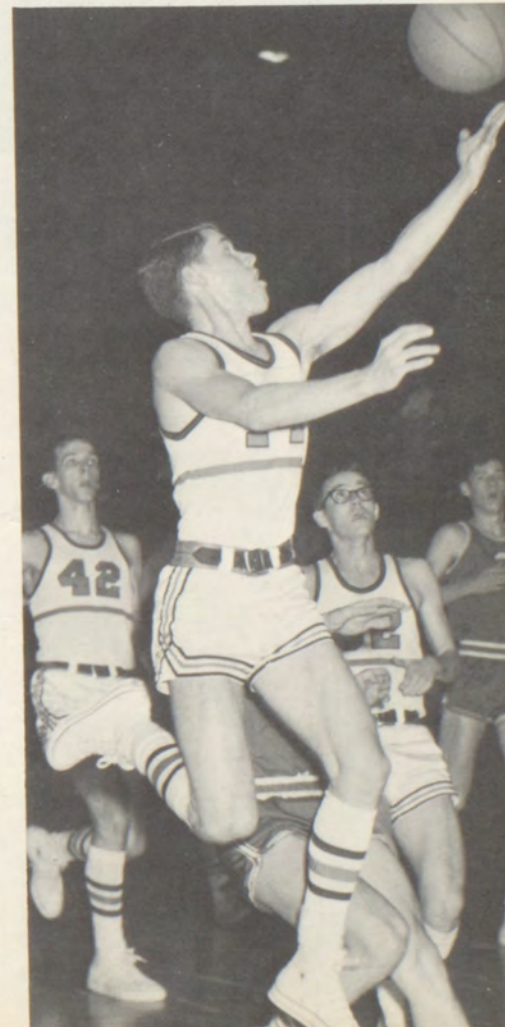

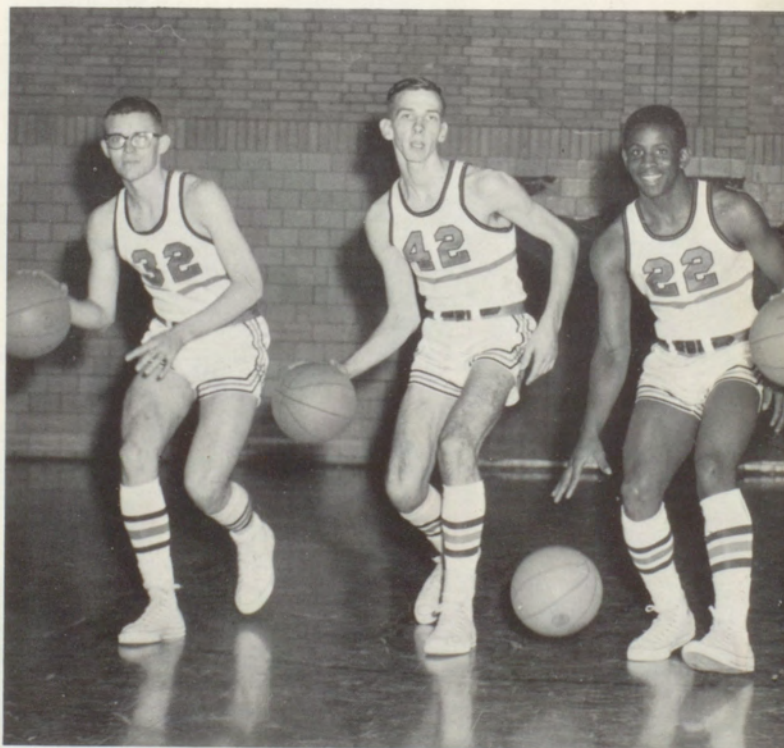

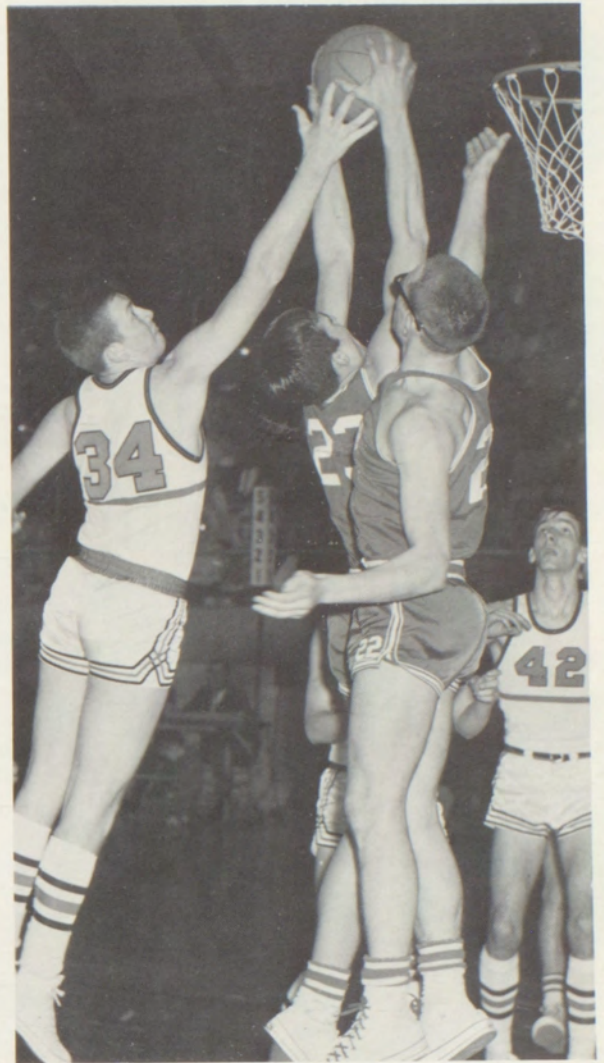

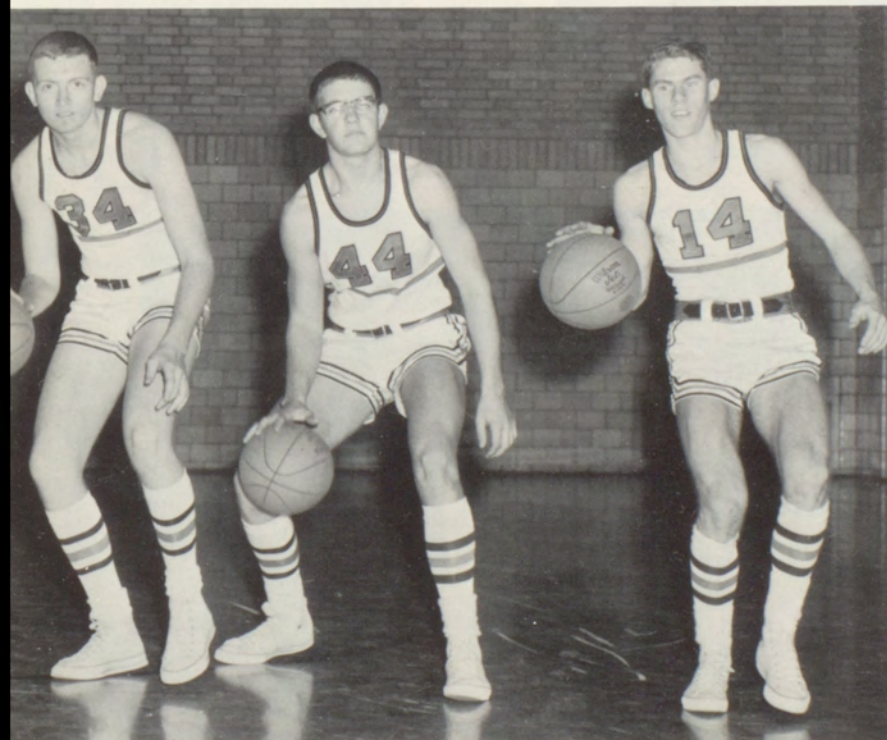




Dan Stichman gets a pass inside to Rick Vencil while James Wyckoff looks on.

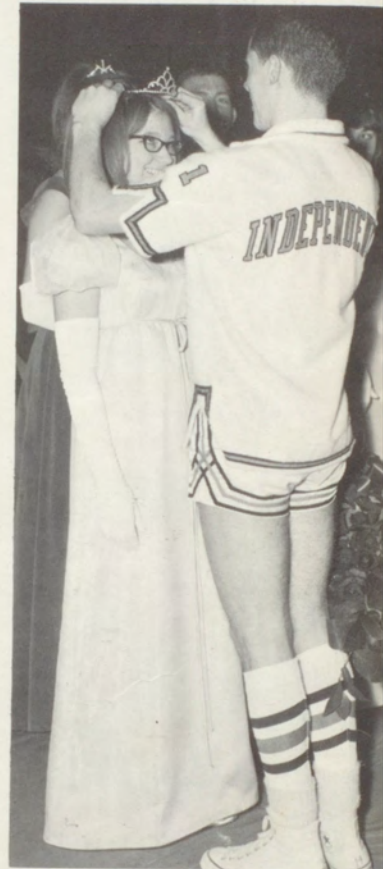

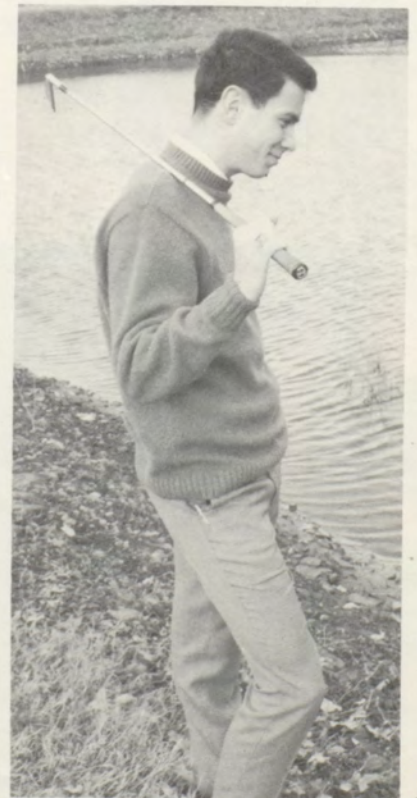
## *Track And Golf End Sports Year*

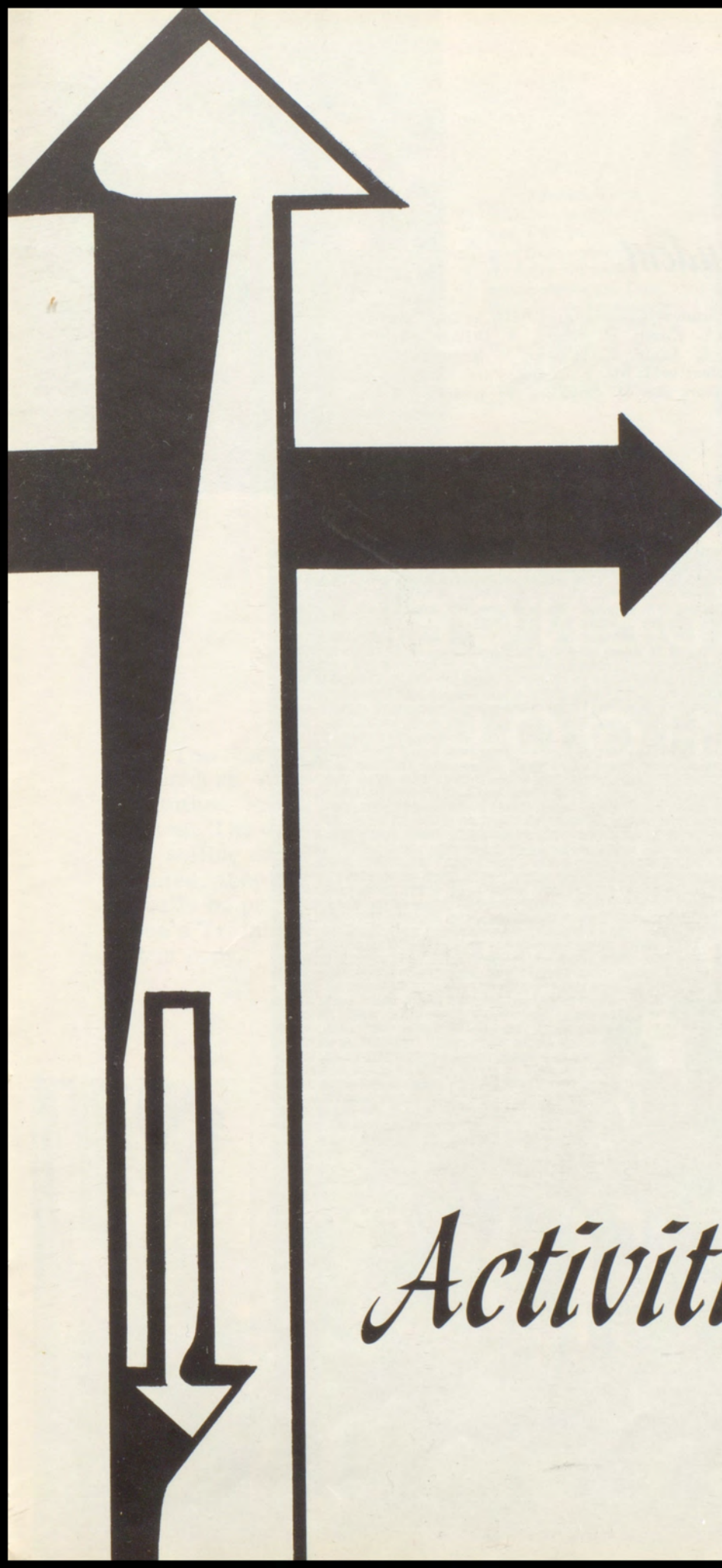

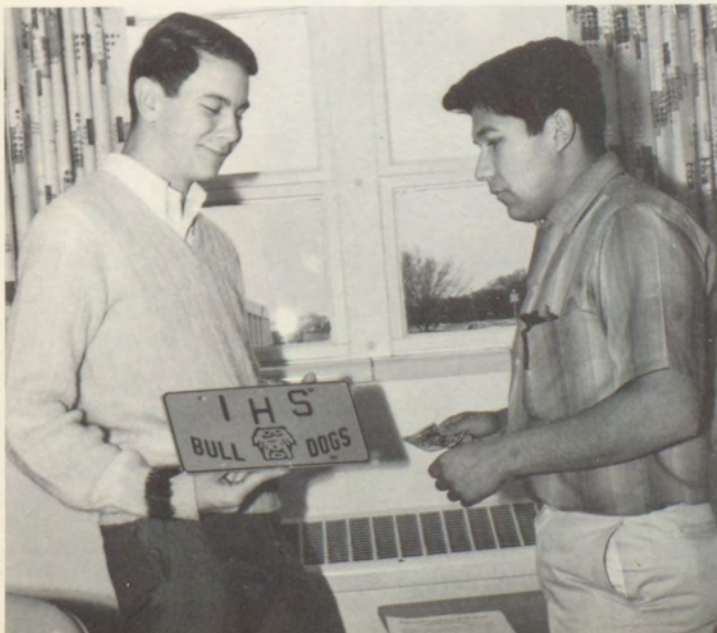
