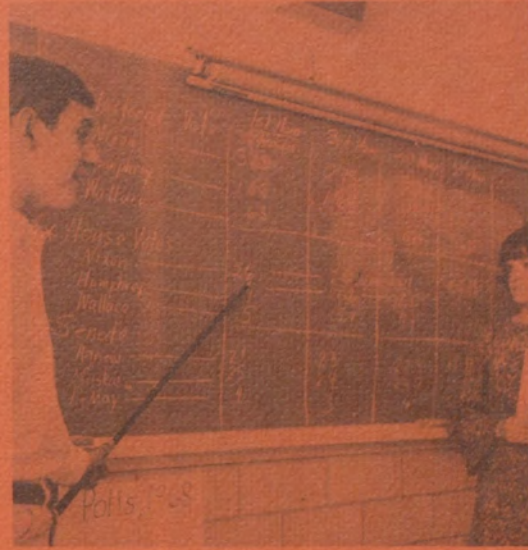

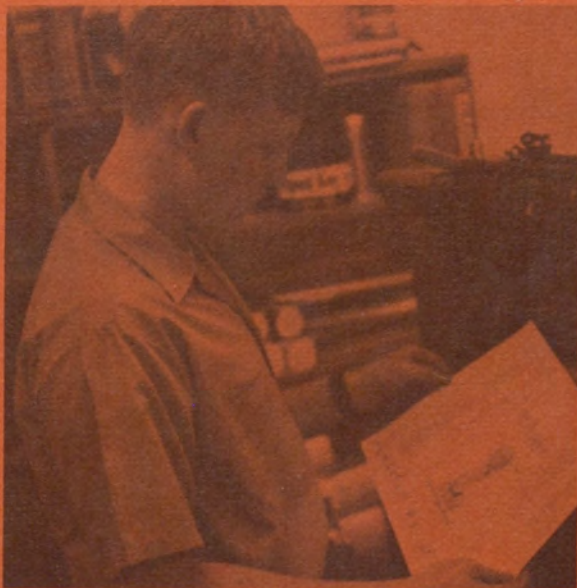

Mathematics is, in every sense, a foul word to a great majority of students. Everything even remotely associated with the term is scorned. Tradition has it that an hour spent entombed in the math classroom is not the most pleasant means of passing the time.

IHS math teachers are out to dispel this myth. Each member of the crusade is striving to bring life into an otherwise lifeless class. Through the use of new concepts and materials, the math teacher is succeeding in making the longest hour of the day bearable for many students.

Mr. Wallingford, RIGHT, instructor of geometry, advanced algebra, and senior math, displays the spirit that is a part of this changing attitude.



"Voix et Image" is a new concept at IHS, yet teaching French the audio-visual way has been the most widely-used method of instruction in France for several years. Recently, Mme. Overman, French instructor, introduced this program at our school. With its coming, there was an appreciable increase in enrollment in the language course. TOP, French II students check tapes to be used in the day's lesson. All students are brought into active participation during the class period and made to "feel" the language. They must also be well-versed in the operation of the audio-visual equipment and aids, BOTTOM picture, as they themselves must use it frequently.

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SPORTS

The 1968 Bulldog Football Season, though it saw few decisive triumphs and too many hard-fought losses, was sprinkled with brilliant individual performances. After dropping the first game to Pittsburg, 27-7, the Bulldogs showed come-from-behind determination, scoring 13 points in the final period to tie Ft. Scott. The 'Dogs picked up steam, rolling over Chanute 27-7 with the defensive unit playing the first of their starring roles. At Parsons the high-flying Canines came within a single point of victory but lost a crucial fumble and were brought back to earth by a 28-13 defeat. Iola came to Indy only to meet a "defensive masterpiece." The Mustangs were corralled to 5 yards net rushing and a hard-nosed offense ground-out the 20-13 win. However, the next Friday's action, featuring Columbus' All-State quarterback Richard Jones, was sufficient to humble the 'Dogs, 40-19. The Altamont game surprised everyone--including Altamont (LCHS: 28-IHS: 7). But the next week, a determined Bulldog defense kept Coffeyville scoreless for 30 1/2 min. Even a C-ville touchdown with 94 sec. remaining didn't stop the 'Dogs. They stifled the extra-point attempt and drove to within 20 yards of pay-dirt before being finally halted by a pass interception. The post season saw junior fullback Barry Turner named to the ALL-SEK team and the Bulldogs elect as Team Captain, Robey St. Clair, Most Valuable Lineman, Steve Zimmerman.

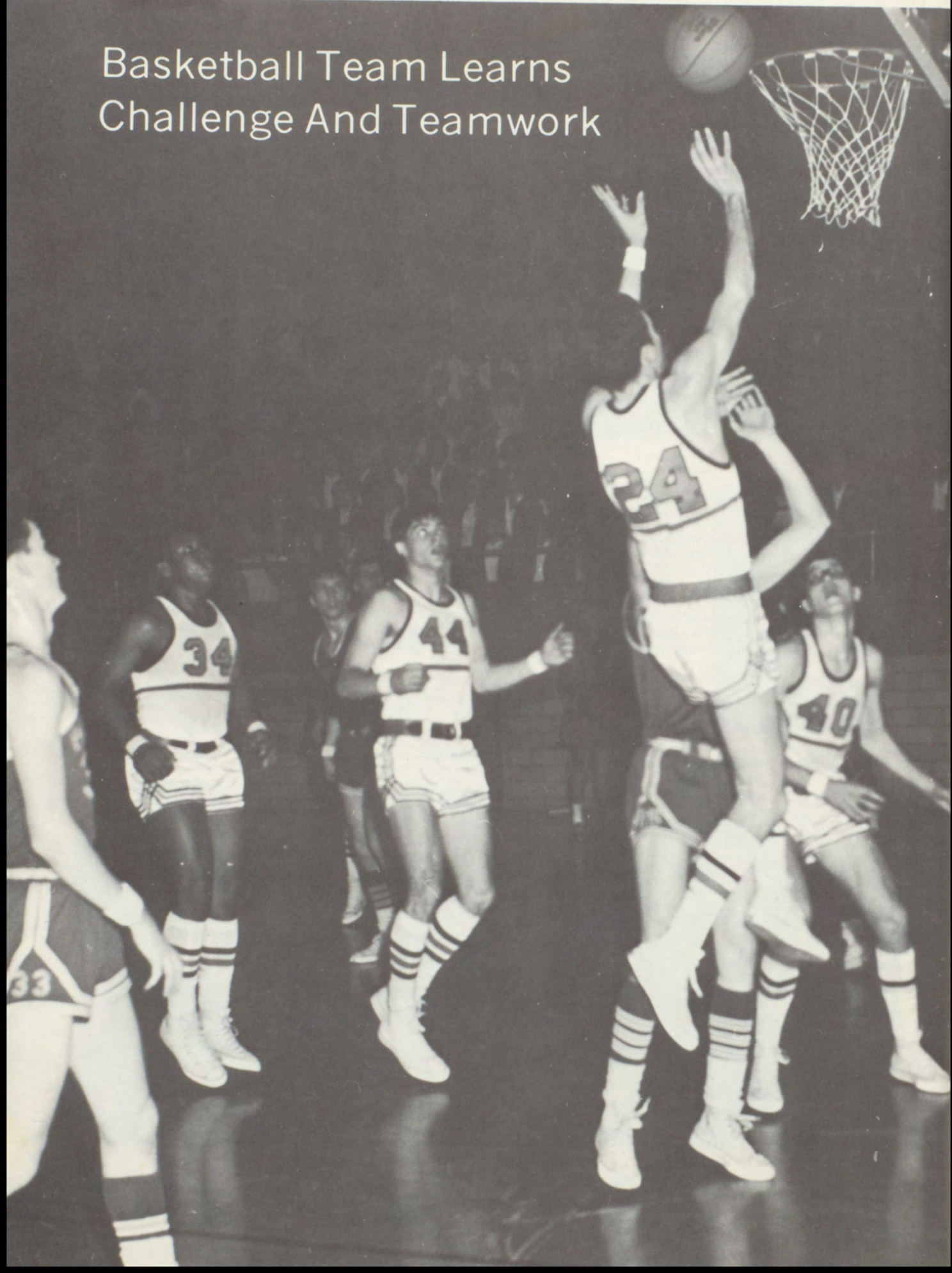

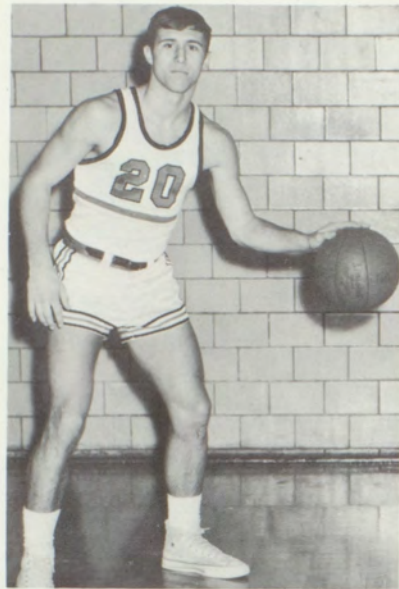

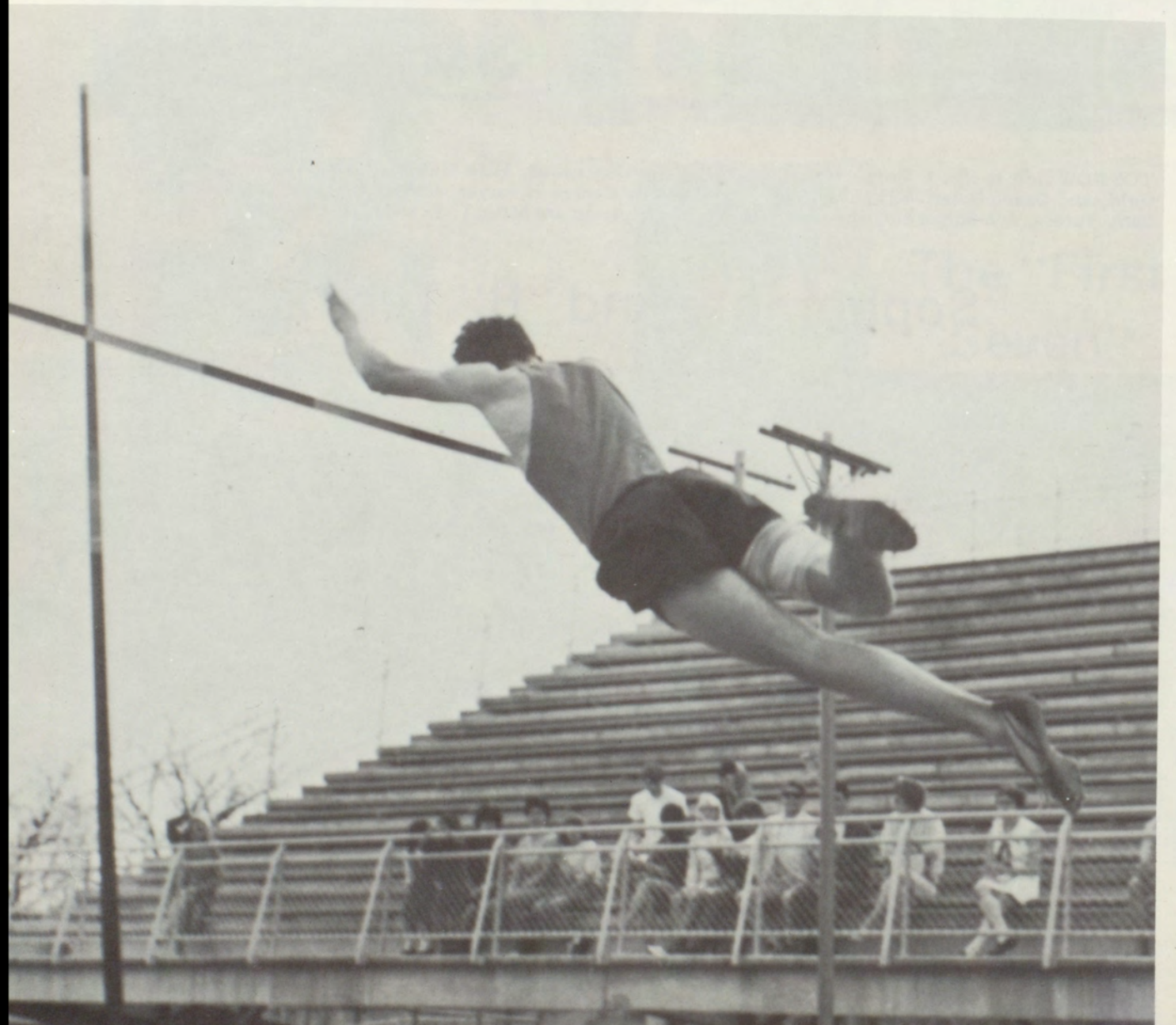
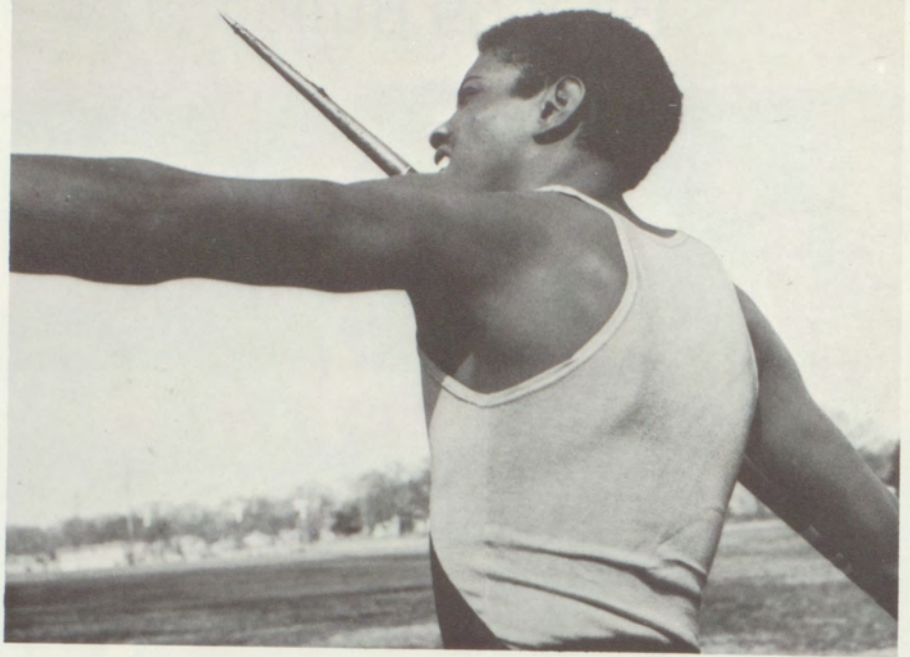

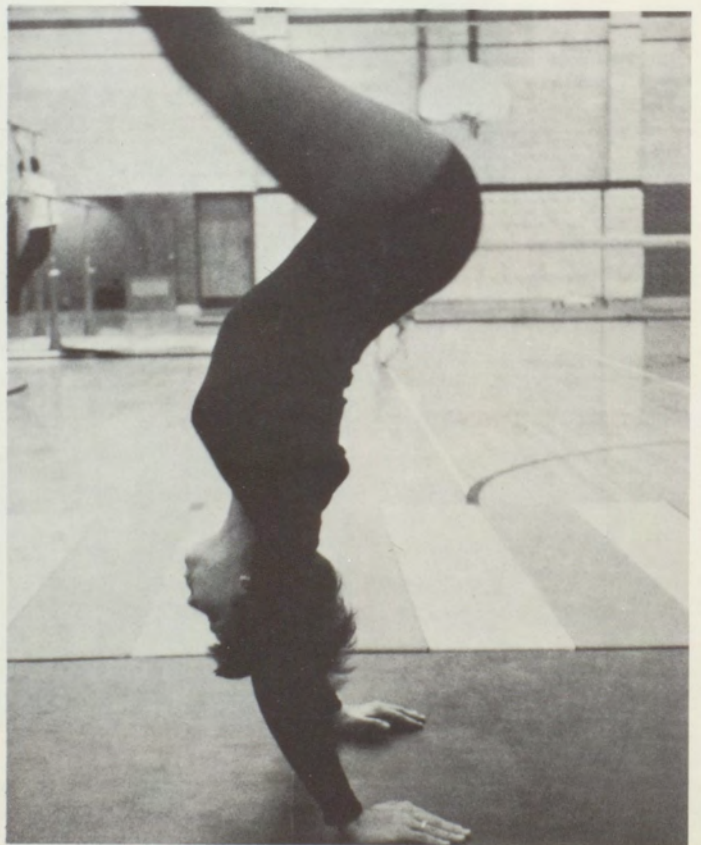

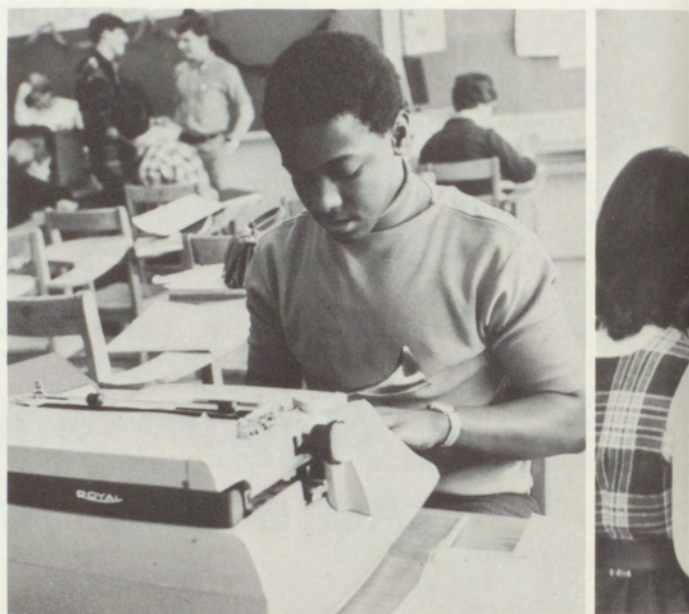

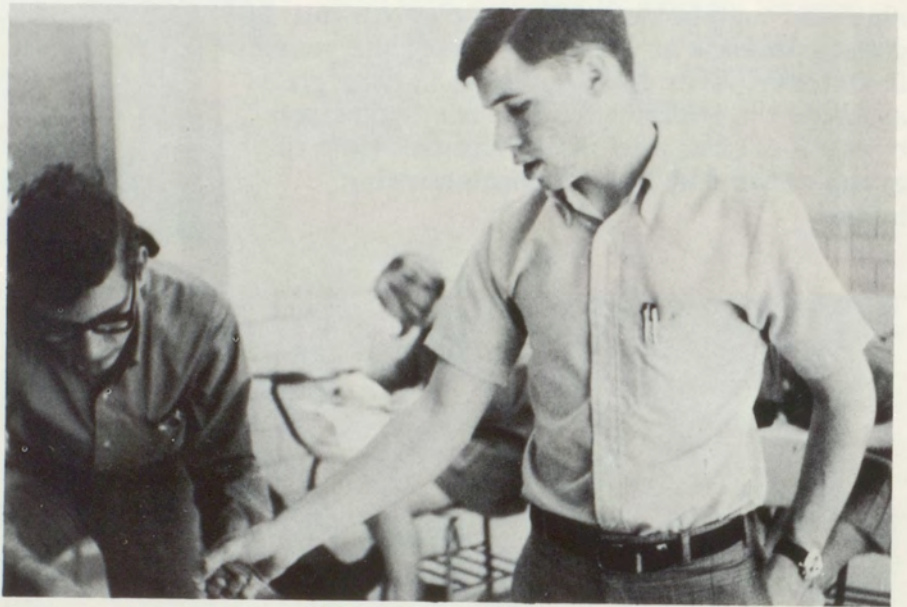

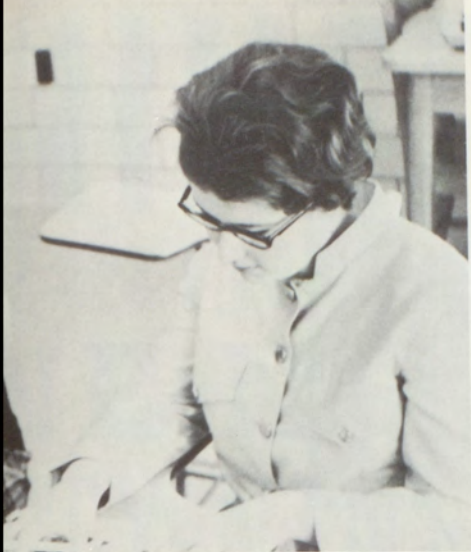
