Our homeroom presidents were Jim Pritchard, Stan Indlecoffer, Phyllis Grinlinton, Nathan Wick and Mike Wilman. Our athletes pulled through in fine shape; eight lettered in football and five in basketball. The peppy cheerleaders (B Team) were Gail, Kathie Gardner and Vicki. Five per cent of the class entered the National Honor Society: Sandy, Gail, Kathie, Cheryl Stith, Paul, Vicki and Carolyn.

At the end of our sophomore year, we elected Bill Jones, president; Sandy Decker, v.-p.; Sandy Bailey,

sec., and Vicki, treas.

Junior boys were participating in athletics in a big way and Skip Page, Kathie and Paul took leads in "The Diary of Anne Frank." In the play, "The Miracle Worker," Bill, Nancy Bartlett, Darlene Dietrich and Barby Denton, took parts. Phil Gettig, Bob Hyde and Glenn Clingenpeel were chosen to attend Boys State in Lawrence and Vicki represented AHS at Girls State, also held in Lawrence. The National Honor Society initiated Nancy, Bill, Marianne, Tom, Anne Tuggle, Marcia and Sandy Decker.

Our prom, "Stairway to the Stars," was our going-away present to the seniors. It was a gay success and the seniors, in turn, gave us a fun-fest picnic. Everyone agreed these two events were among the outstanding events of all times.

Summer school proved to be the goal for Carolyn, Darlene and Treasure Maul. Carolyn and Treasure studied in the cool mountain air of Colorado and Darlene hit for below the border to study Spanish in Mexico City. Marianne studied Science for six weeks in the fun-capitol of America, Las Vegas, Nev.

September, 1962, we finally made it to the top of the peak. We were, pardon the expression, "Seniors!" The Krafty party made a grand political sweep, taking into office Paul, as president; Stan, vice-president; Marcia, secretary and Tom Stone, treasurer. Politician Bill stepped into the presidency of student council. Kayettes were led by enthusiastic Anne Tuggle.

In the sports field, Vicki was president of A Club while Carolyn headed the Pep club. Nancy was given the job of editor of the OPTIMIST.

Kathie Gardner, also a cheerleader, was our winter formal queen and Phil Laurie, her king. Mike Daniel, Bob Wilburn lettered in football. Stan Indlecoffer, Clarence Lierz, Doug Miller, Bill Carey, Phil Laurie and Dave Sutely were basketball lettermen.

Kathie Gardner was elected Daughters of the American Revolution representative from our school and Nancy and Paul placed first in the district ratings in poetry and duet acting. Maraienne rated superior in the district playing her French horn.

Doug Miller was selected as captain of the all-area basketball team while Bill Carey was center on the second team. Bob Wilburn was sixth in the state in gymnastics and Letcher made quite a name for himself as a record breaker in track.

Now we anxiously await Kid Day, with all its frivolity; the annual jr.-sr. picnic with all its eating-swimming and skiing and the prom, with its dancing, late movie and again, eating!

Our school days have drawn to a close or rather the days we will always remember with joy. Our future from now on will be more complicated but we hope that we have learned to live happily with our fellowman.

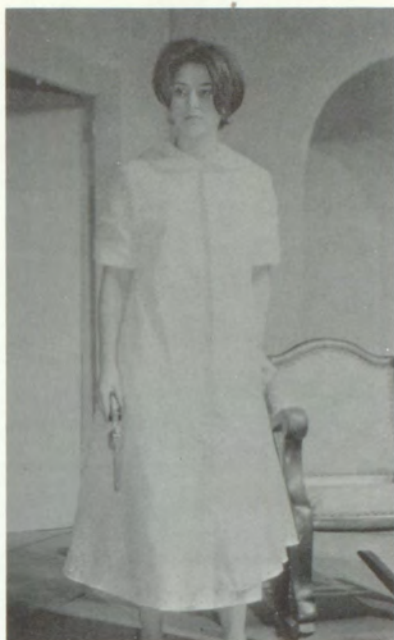

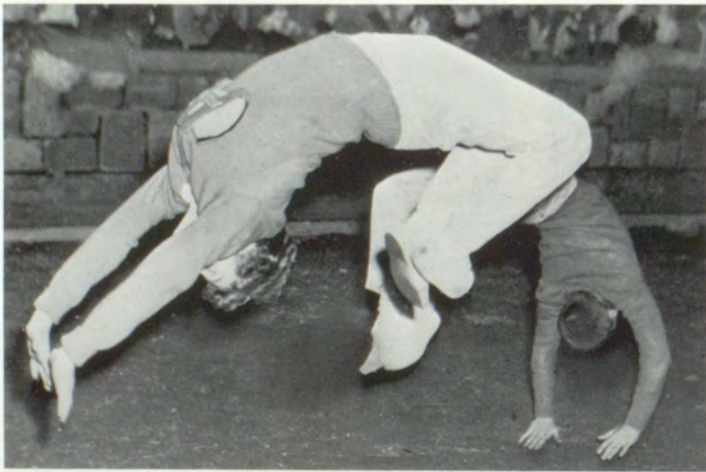

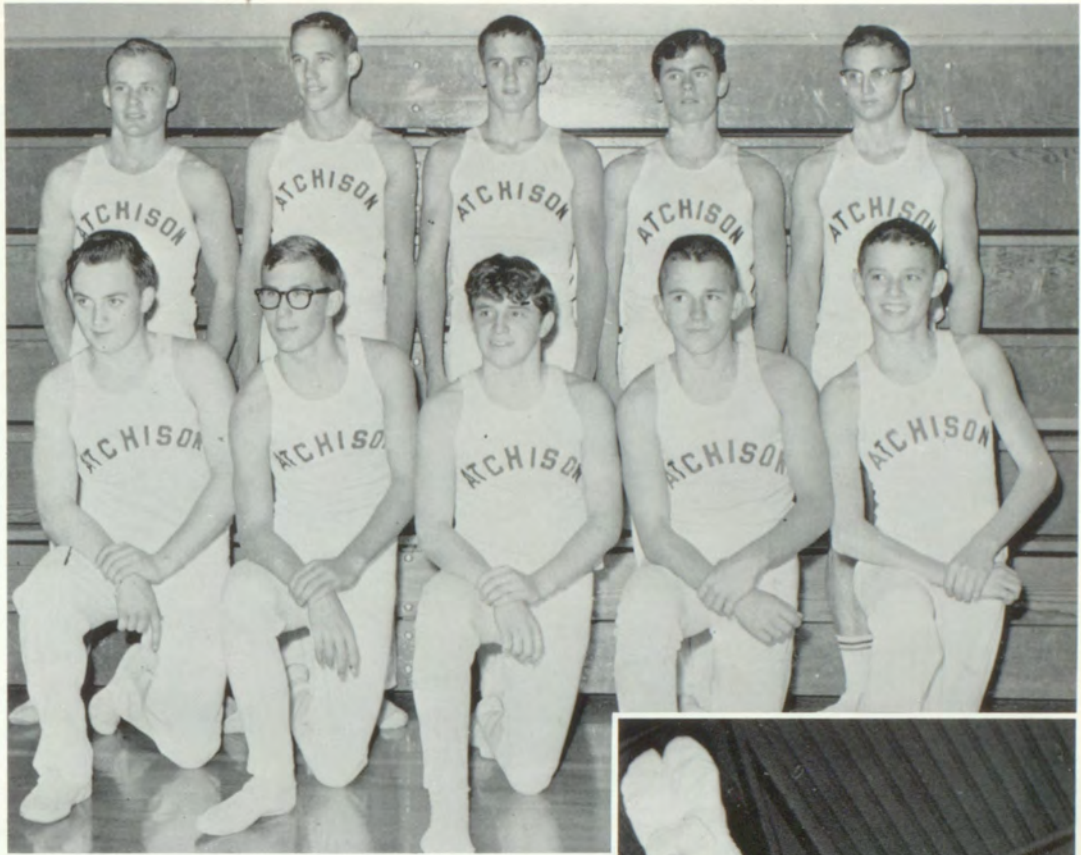

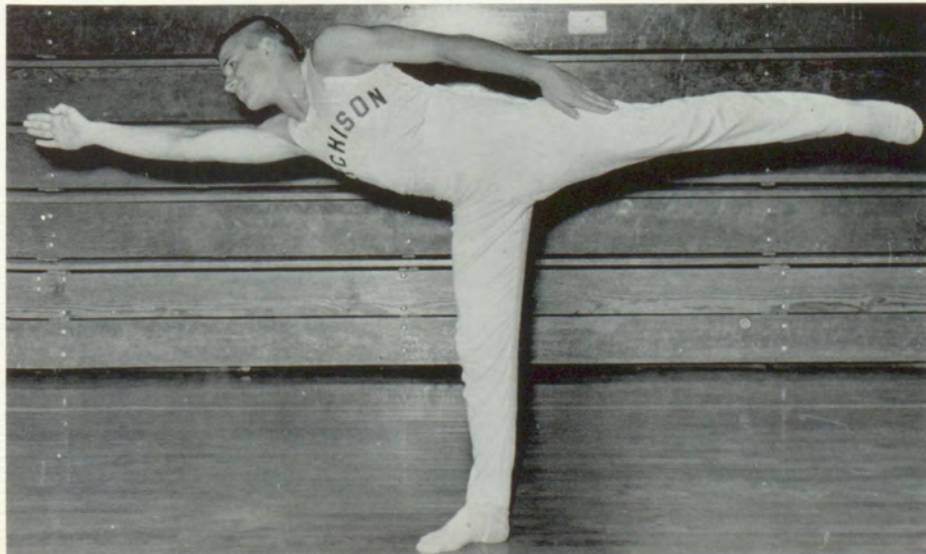

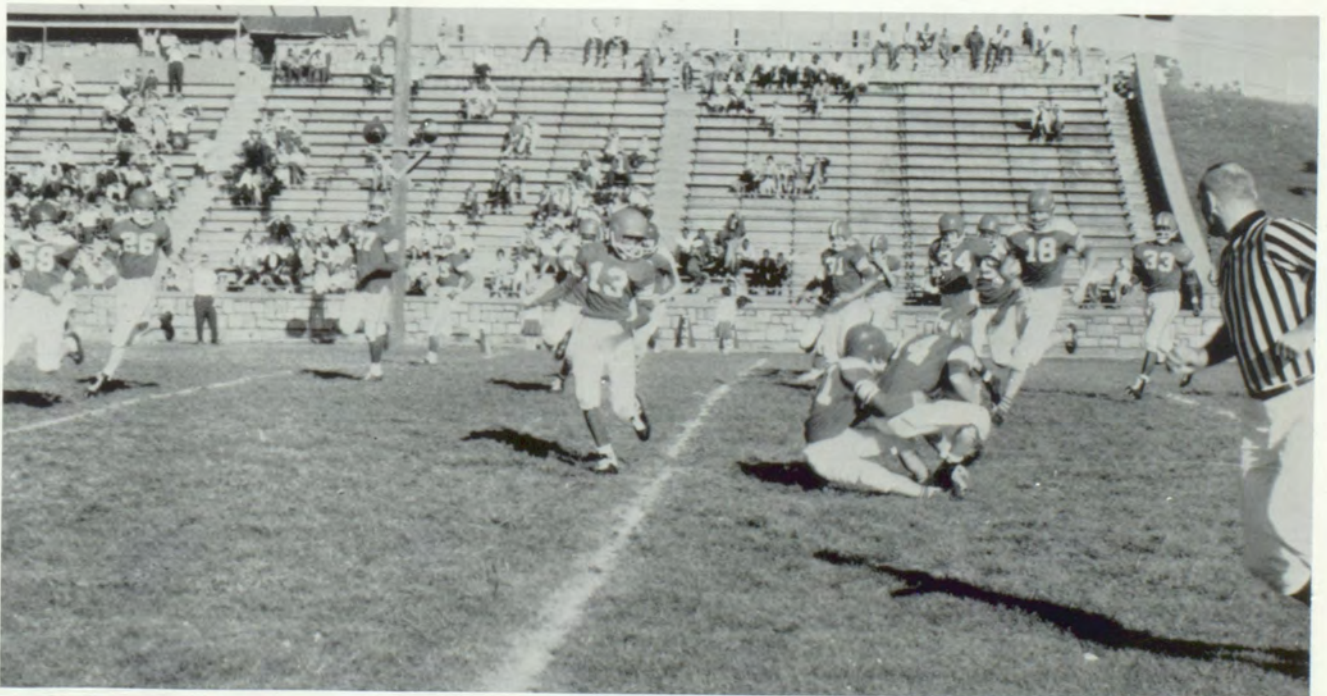

Atchison High School debate squad had 13 active debaters on the circuit this year, which definitely did not prove to be an unlucky number. Included in the group were four seniors—Paul Widick, Steve Tramel, Nancy Bartlett and Skip Page. For the season, the entire squad won 135 rounds of debate and lost 90. A break-even season is considered a successful year so we are most proud of our record. The squad won seven debate trophies and awards including a District First Place in the Class AA, at Topeka. It tied for sixth place in the State.

In September, 1963, Atchison debaters will provide a demonstration team for the pre-season clinic, held by the Activities Association. The squad considers this a high honor, being asked to furnish the team.

Atchison Speech squad, made up primarily of debaters, had a successful season, placing second in the largest invitational festival held in the state, the Shawnee Mission East invitational. At the National Forensic League State Festival at Emporia, Steve Tramel was a fifth place winning medalist. At the District, Shawnee Mission West, Atchison compiled the best record out of 41 schools by earning seven I ratings and five II ratings. Nancy Bartlett, Steve Tramel and Paul Widick earned individual medals in open competition in other festivals.

Jeff Wainscott received a medallion as second place best speaker in a debate tournament of over 130 debaters.

Members of the beginning speech group competed for some of the festival spots and Sharon Wheeler won a position on the team, which placed second.

The purpose of our organization is to promote good public speaking in or out of the classroom; to stimulate the growth of competitive debate and forensics; to provide programs to local groups and prepare students for college and/or adult life.
