

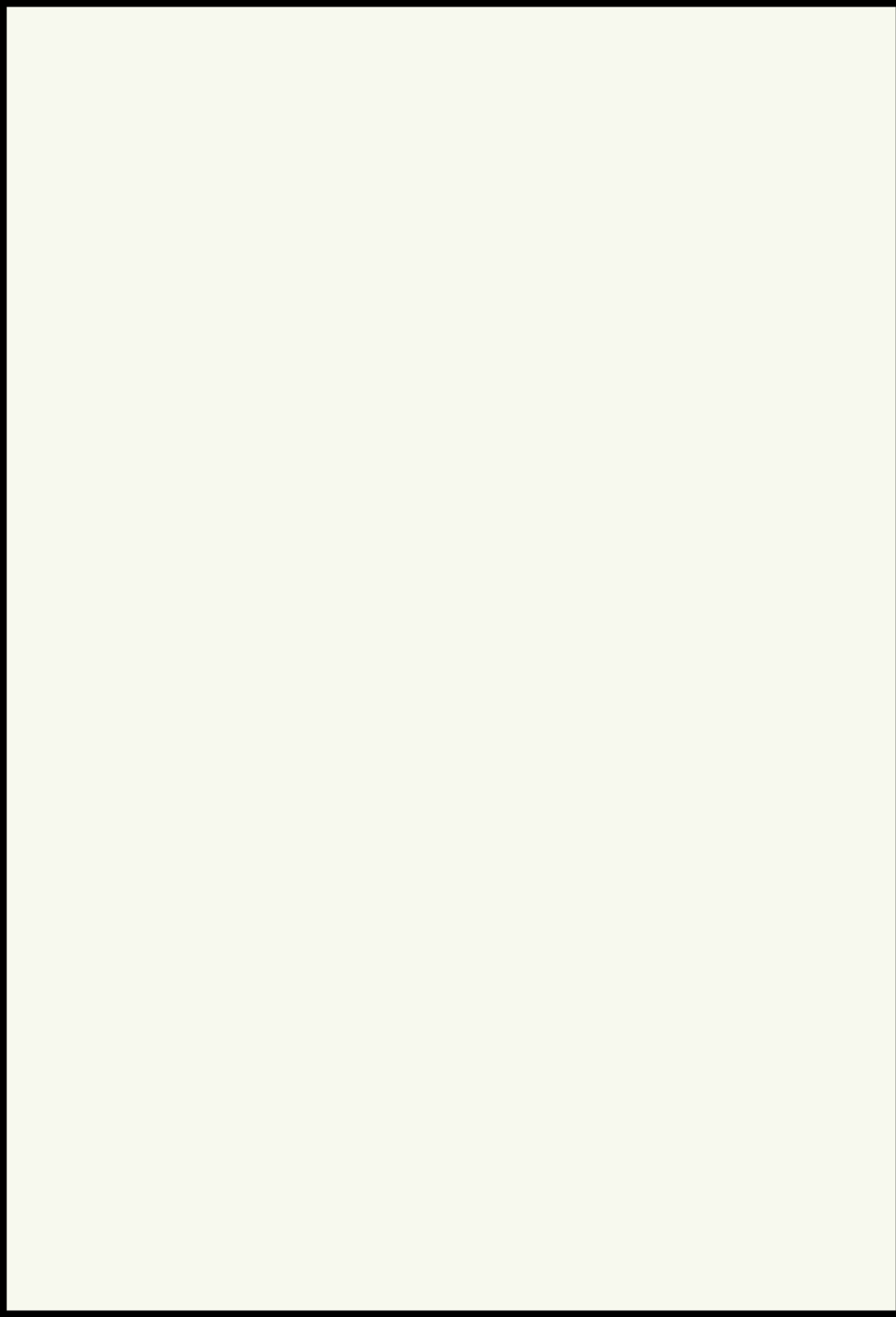

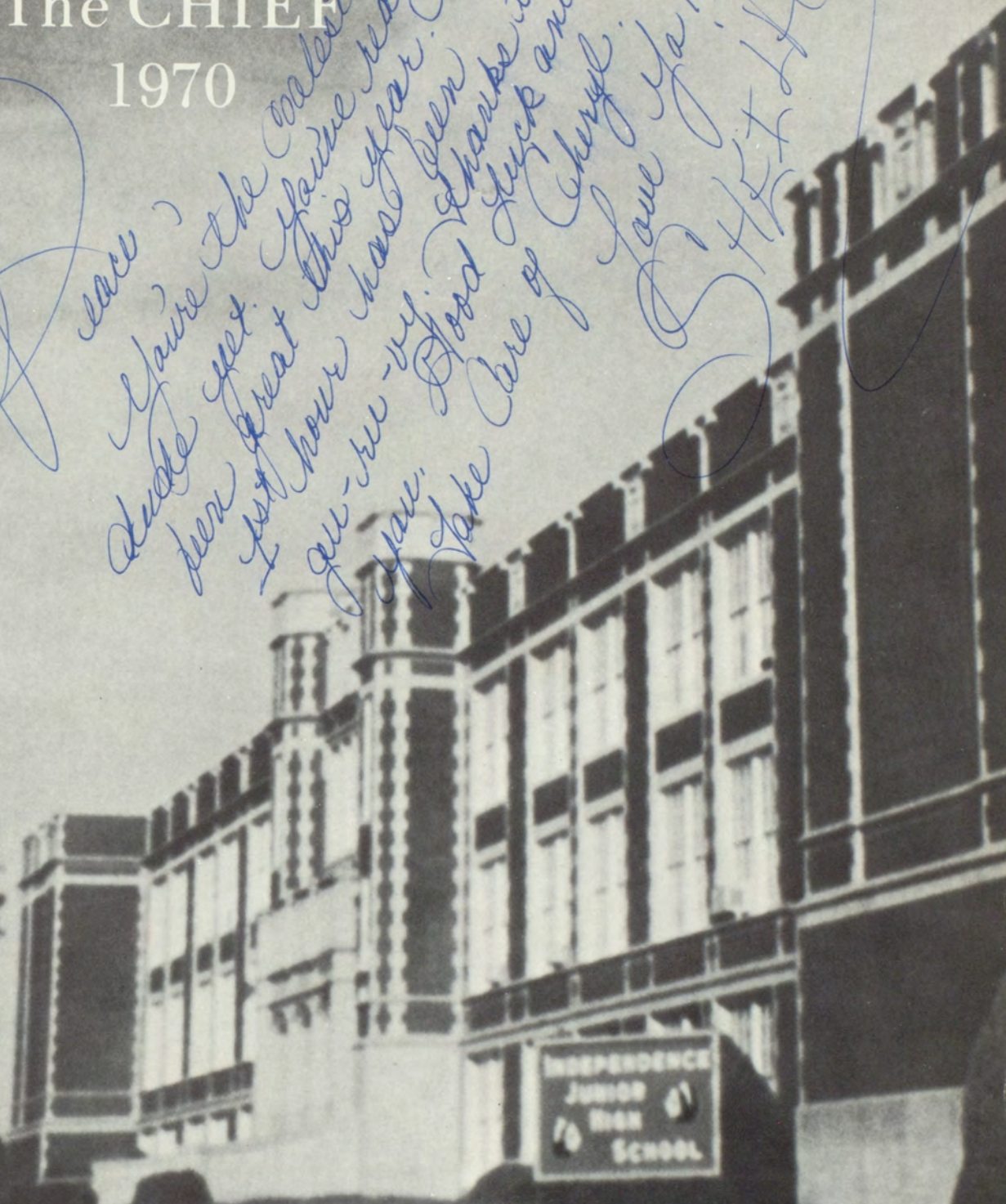


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Seeing it as it was in '70

Day begins quietly – suddenly changes,

Those who must come to school early as their parents go to work, find it to be a quiet, lonely place. Until the building opens, they must fend for themselves.

Soon, however, areas of concentration are to be seen on sophomore corner, in front of the school, and at the west entrance.

On rainy, cold days, the scene shifts to the gym bleachers where students seek refuge from the elements or to meet and chat with friends.

Five minutes or so before the first bell, a mass of humanity surges outside each

As the echoes of the flag pledge ebbs away into silence, the business of the day begins, and some 925 students dig into the problems of the day.

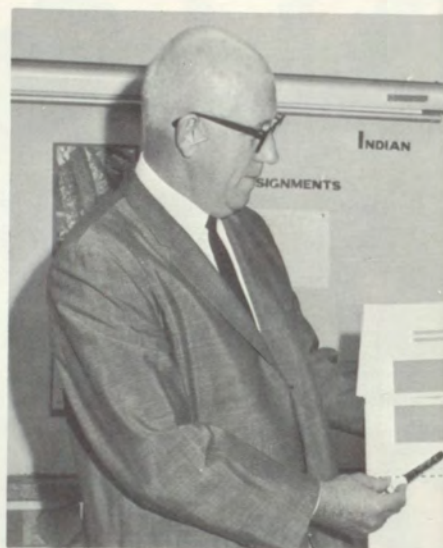
Language arts sees it like it is, was, may be.

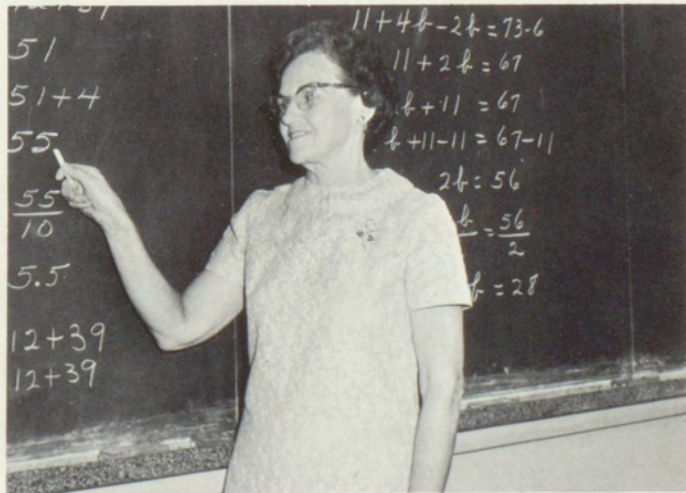

Next year, the students will have greater opportunity for experimentation in the classroom in order to better help him see it as it happened, how it happened and why it happened.

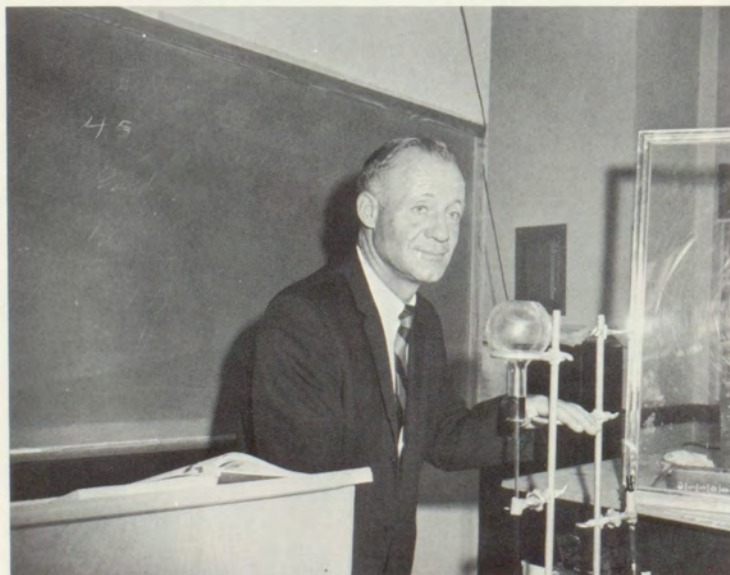

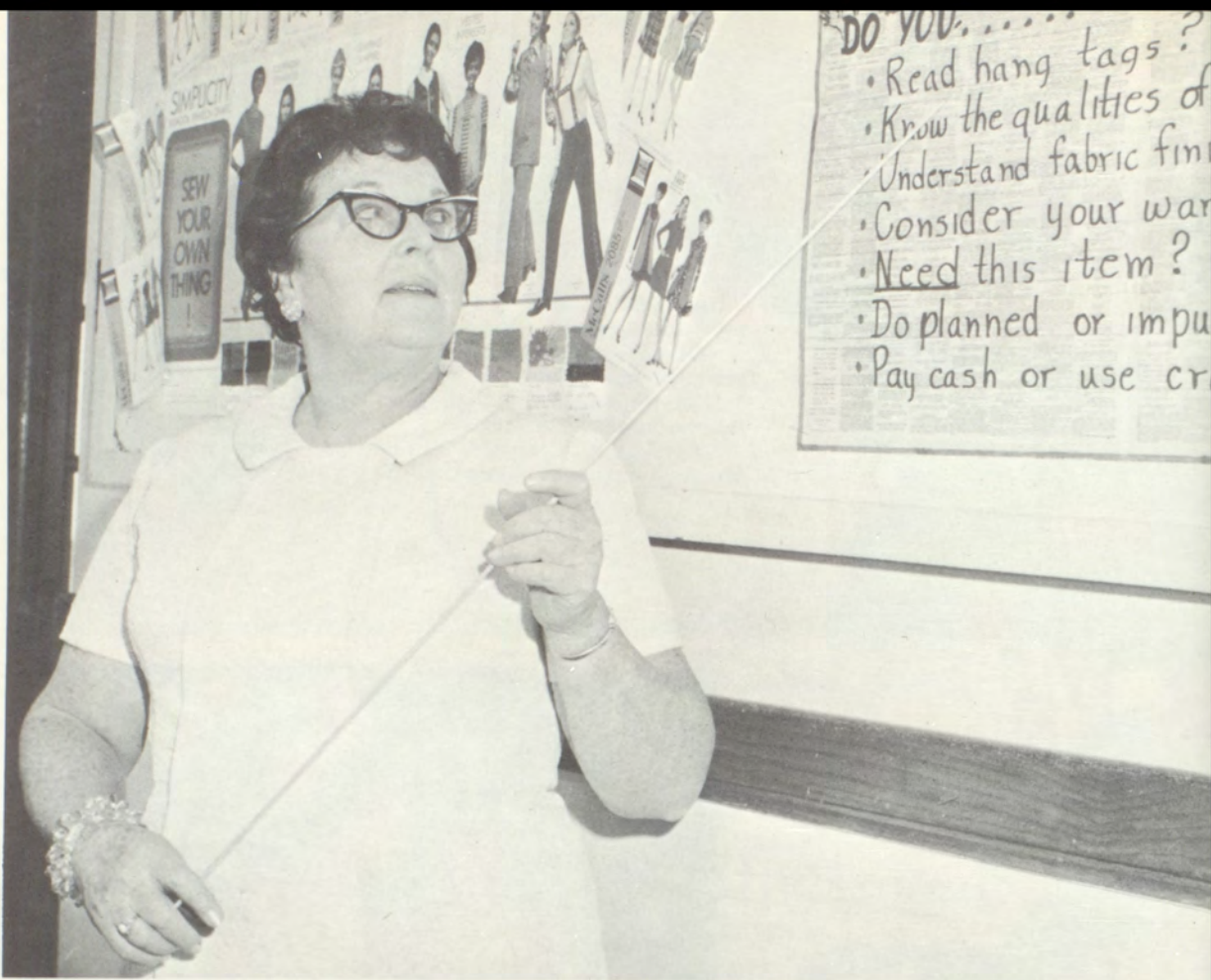
Shop strives for an industrial awareness

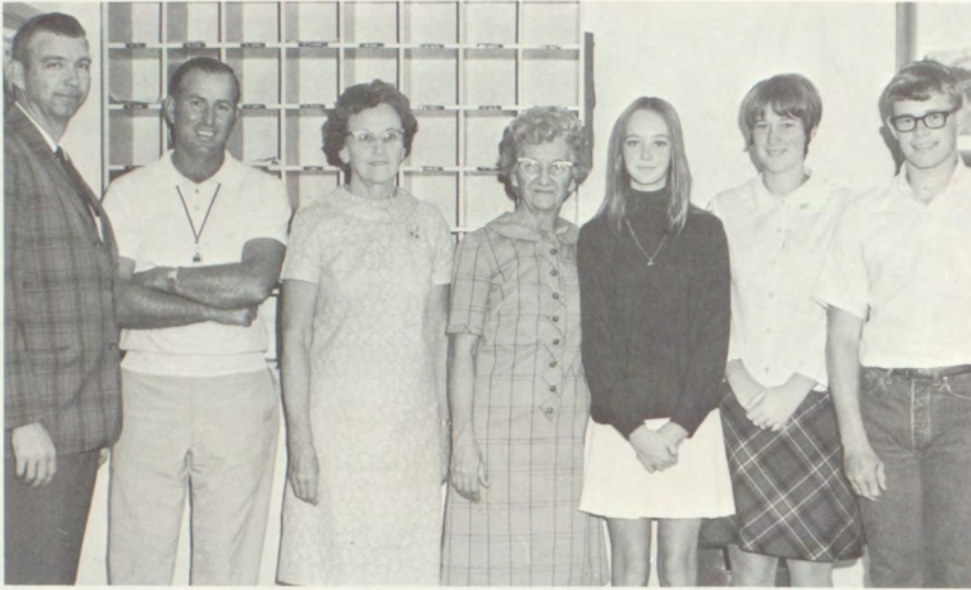

Committees plan school activity program

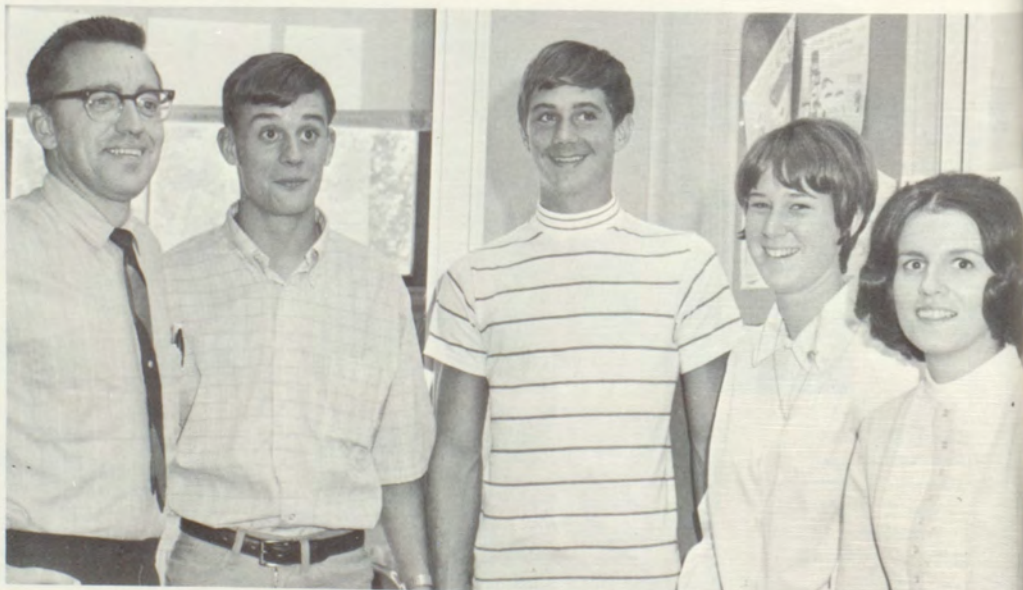
For the past four years, the fifth period has been set aside for club meetings, intramural games, special assemblies, parties, and homeroom study halls.

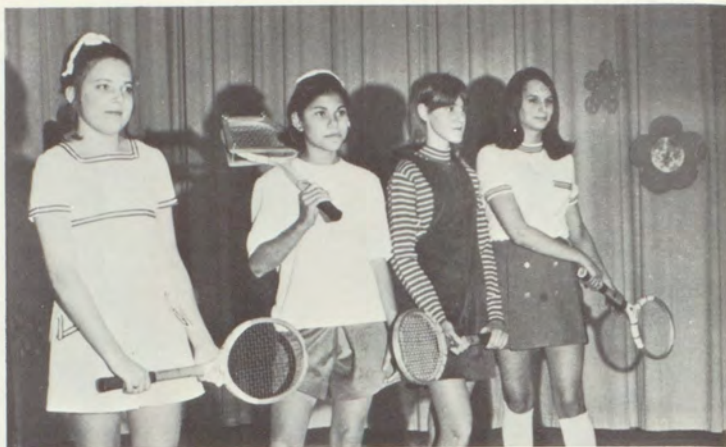

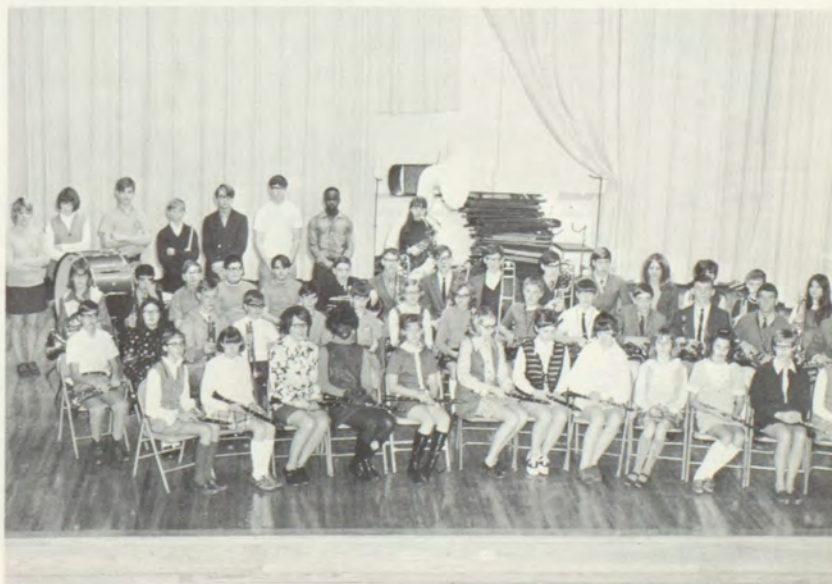

Following its organization fairly late in the year, the members of the Spanish Club began focusing their efforts on the raising of money for the trip to Mexico this summer.

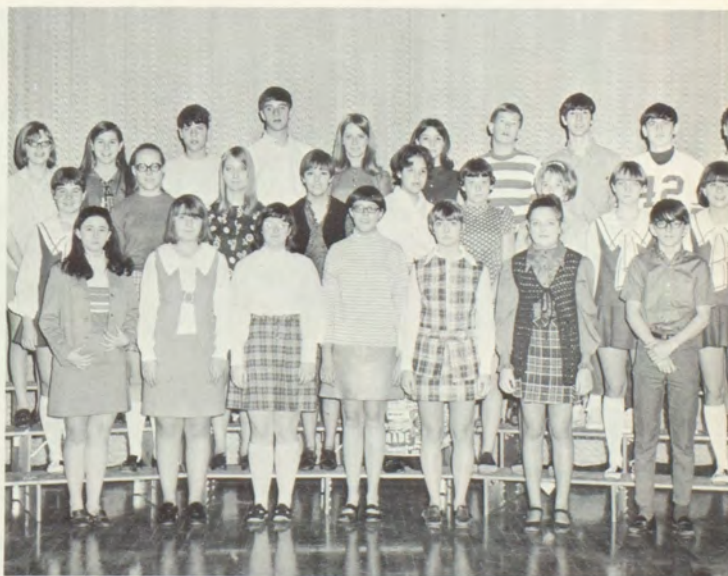

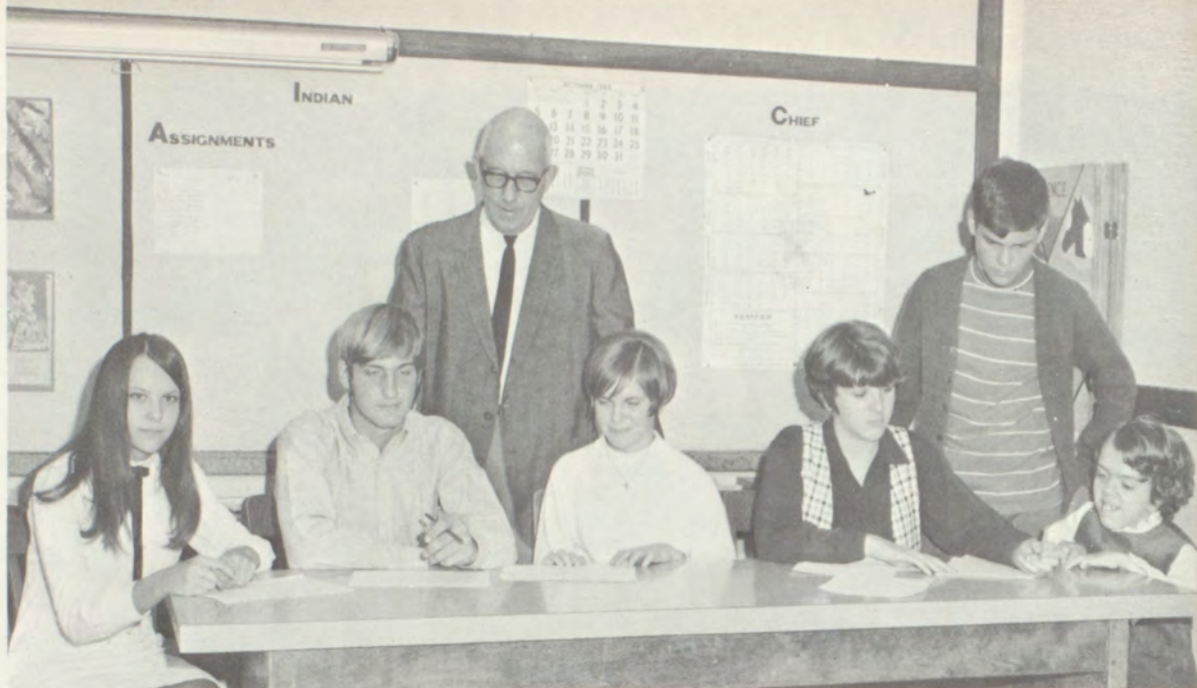

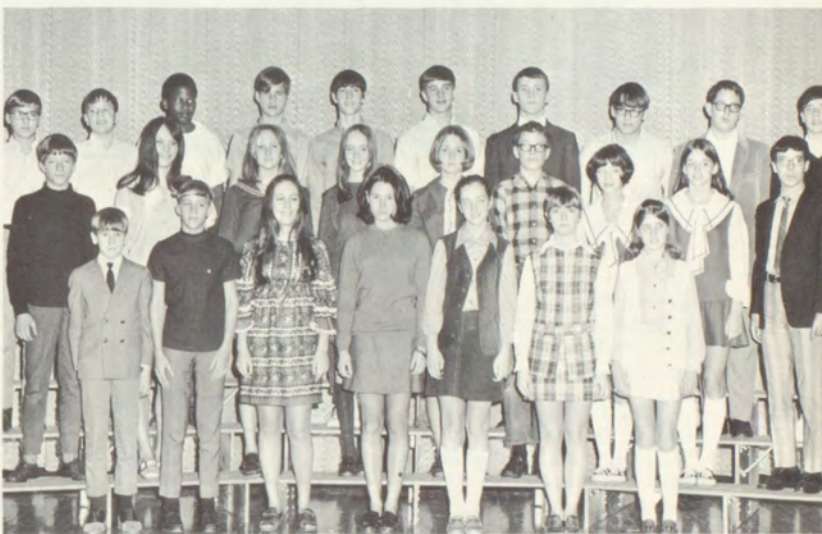

The year of '69-'70 was a busy one for the representatives and officers of the Student Council.

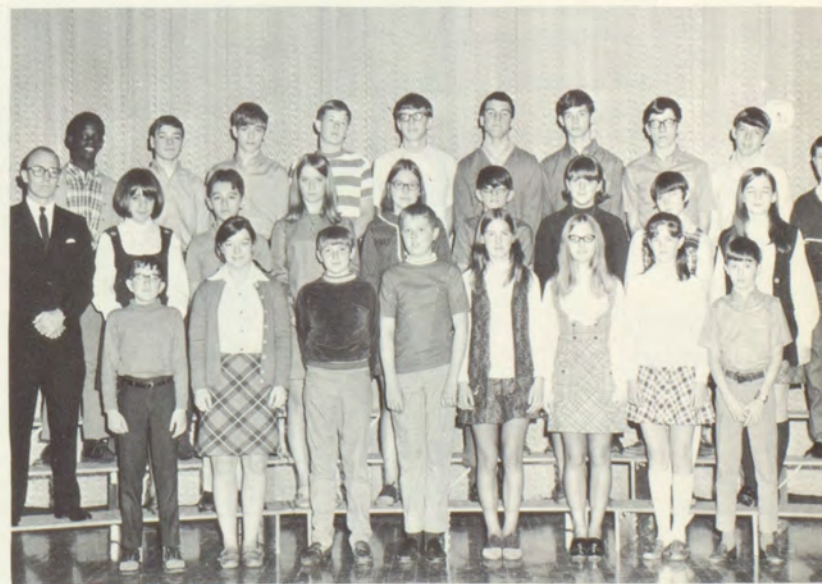

The season included three home games and three games away.

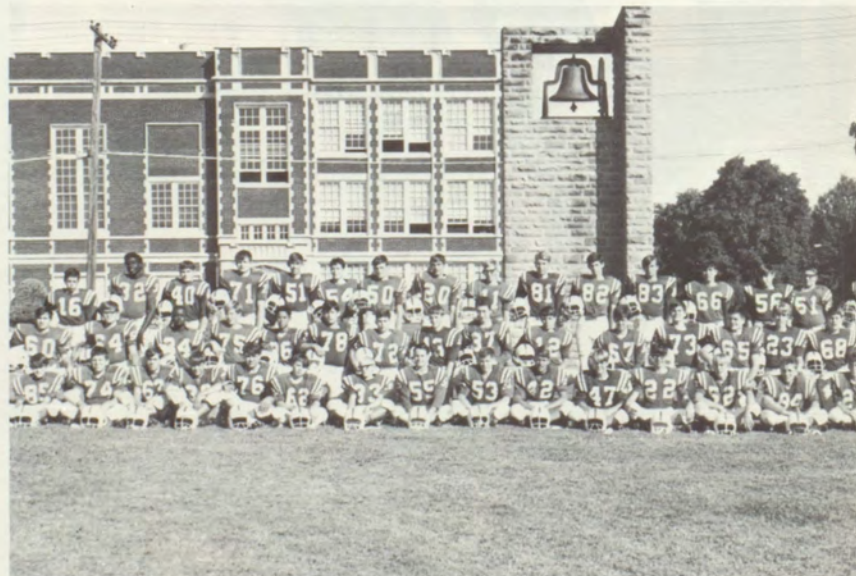

That's how it was in '70 for the Independence Indians.



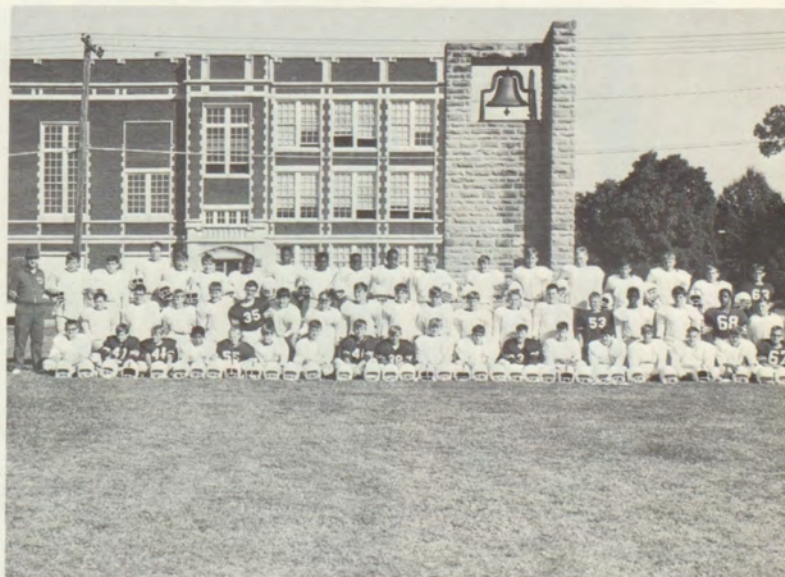
