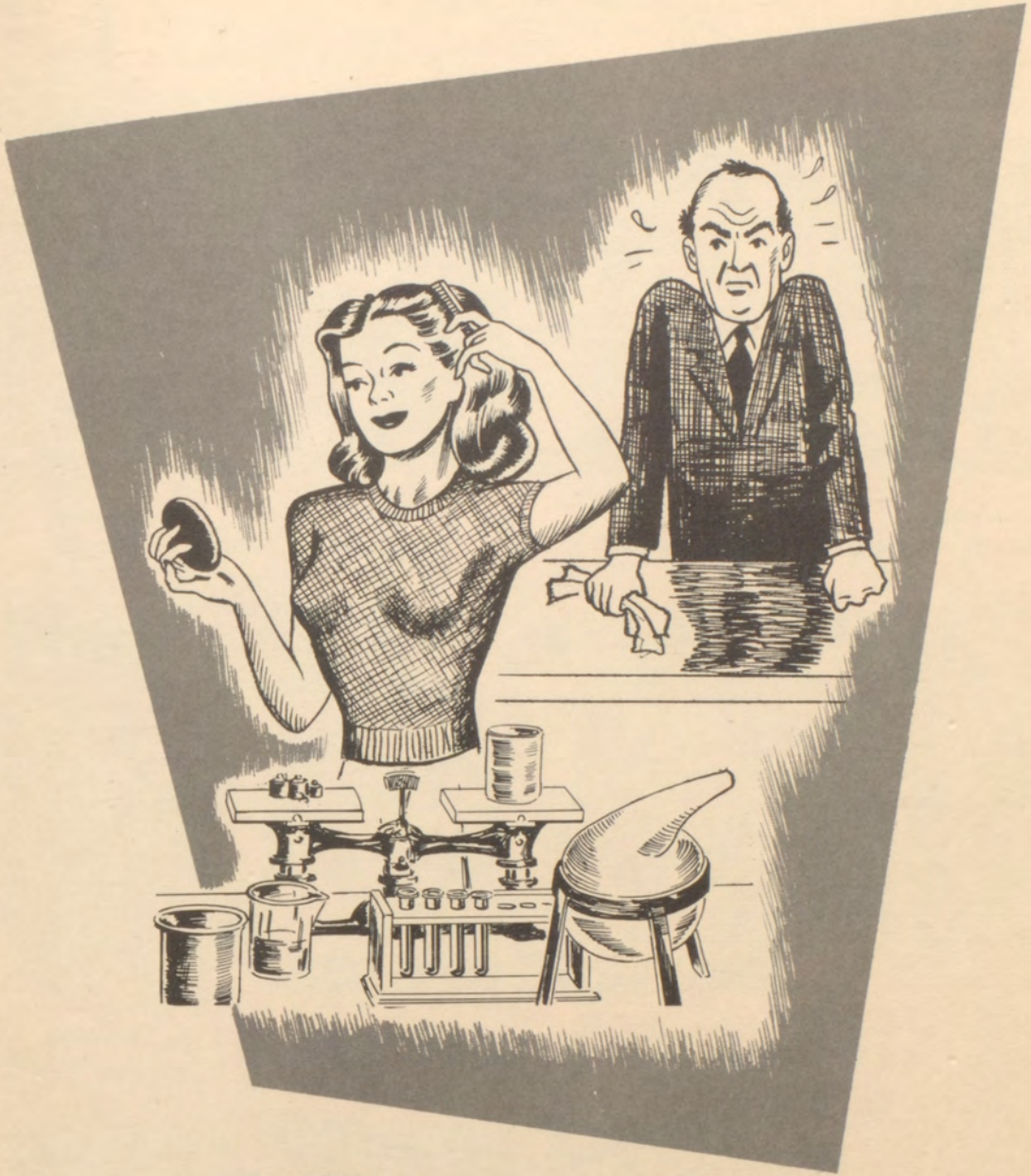
We ordered our Class Rings at the first of school, and we received them in January; we are quite proud of them.

CLASS C: Kay Barnhard first and Twyla Finney second in ball throw; Twyla Finney third in 50-yard dash.

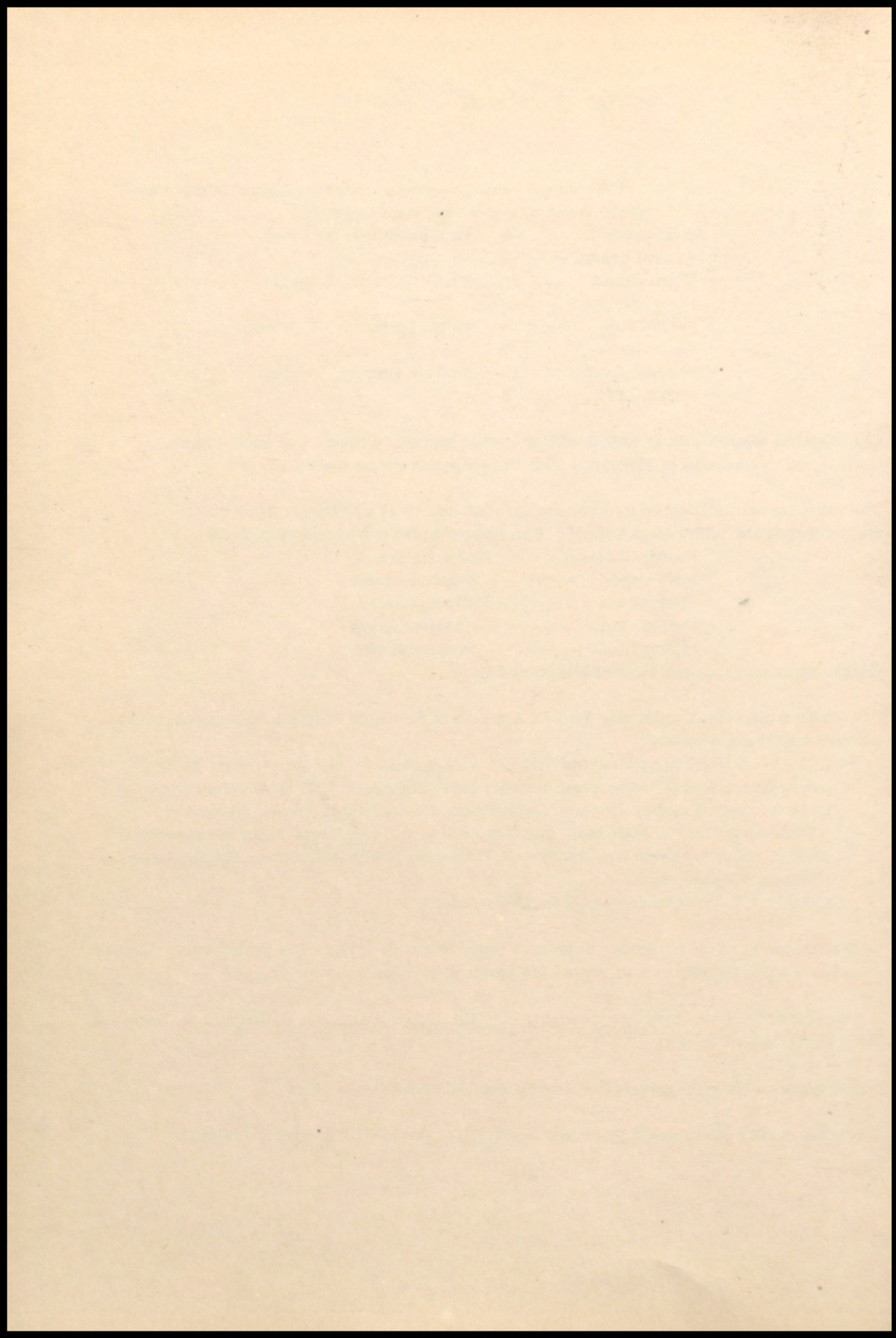

## Wayside Defeats Elk Falls 46-41

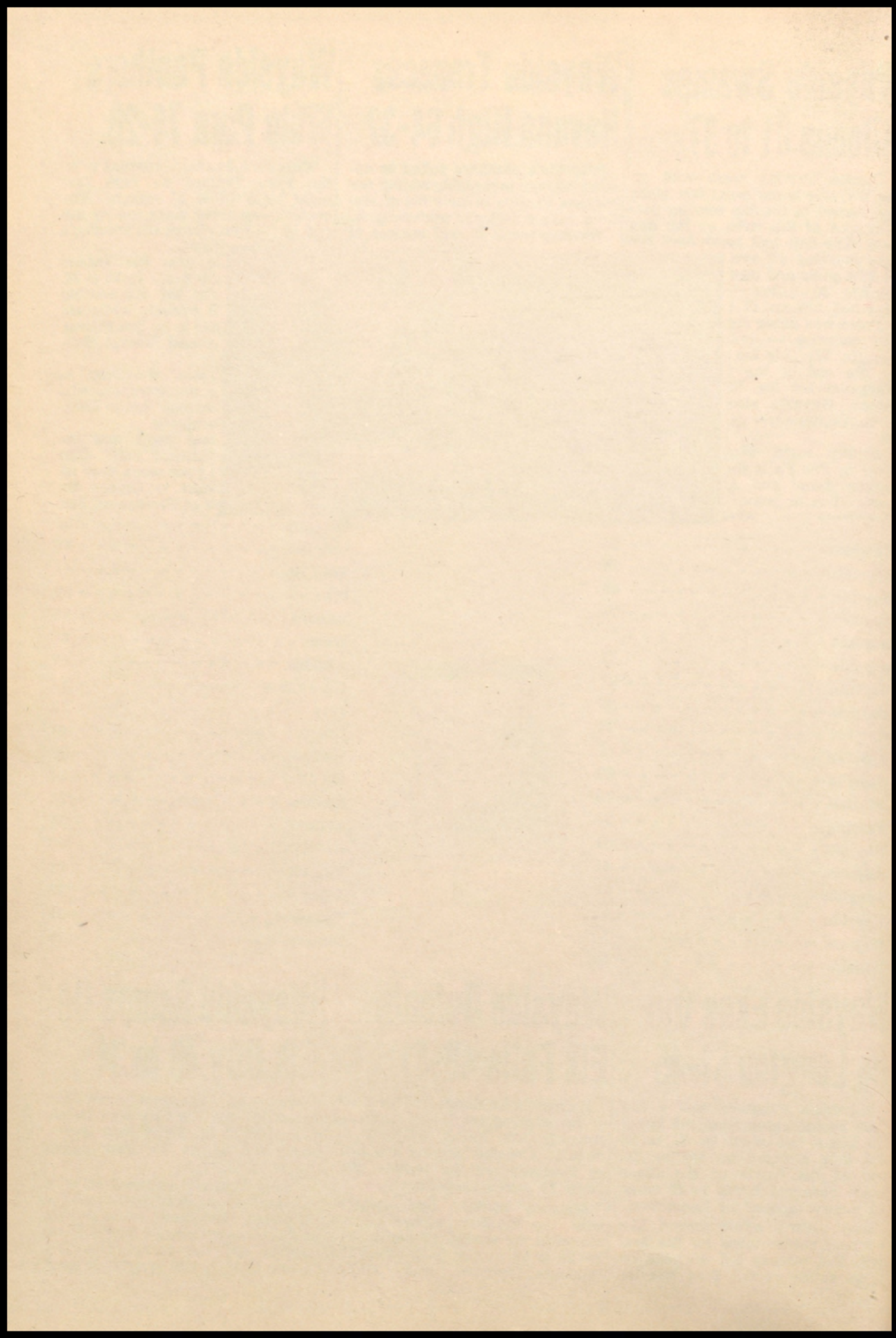

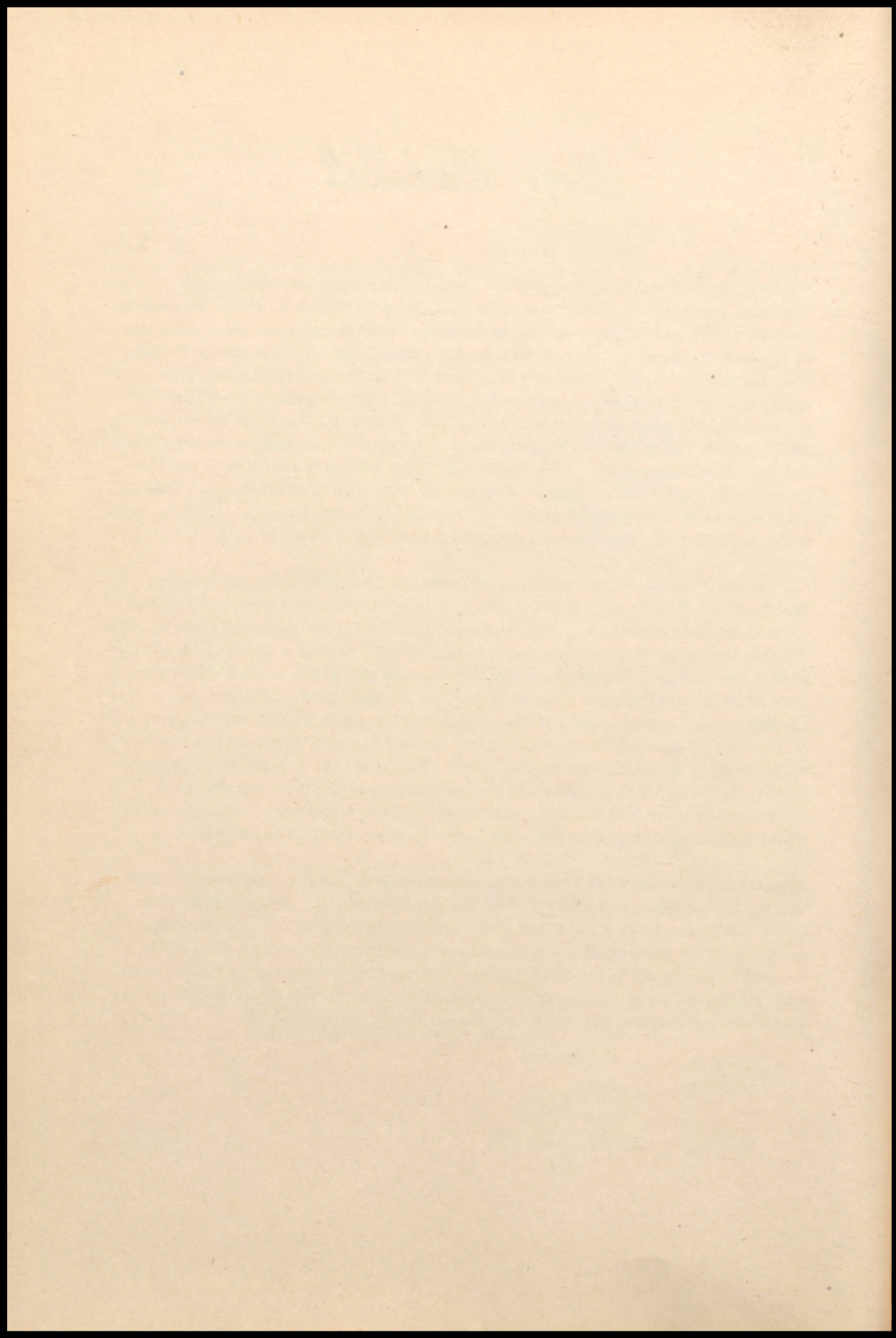


# Boys' Basketball

The Wayside Panthers have just concluded another successful basketball season. The first three games of the season were perhaps the toughest played all year. Wayside defeated Elk City and Elk Falls but lost to Longton. In all three games there was a total of 12 points difference. The next four games were all easy victories for the Panthers. They snowed-under Peru, Wann, Havana, and Altoona in rapid succession. The eighth game of the year was a real thriller with Elk Falls. Wayside played good ball at the last, but could not overcome a first-half deficit. Elk Falls won by two points, 38-36. After this setback the Panthers breezed through six consecutive victories and due to sickness some of the games were close. This brought Wayside up to the final game of the regular season against Coffeyville "B." The "Golden Breeze," with a great advantage in height and manpower, were too much for Wayside. Still the score was only 49-41. This concluded our regular season with a record of 12-3.

Our District Tournament was at Galesburg where we drew Walnut for our first game. Beating them 60 to 33 gave us the privilege of playing Vilas, the winner of the previous night over Lafontaine, Vilas also went down under the moderate shooting of the Wayside Panthers, who were still not too familiar with so large a court. This win, putting the Panthers in the finals with Galesburg, who had beaten Mound Valley the same night by eight points. Galesburg, playing on their home court had a slight advantage but Wayside playing far better ball than the two previous nights, jumped off to an eight-point lead at the half time. Finding that they could not penetrate our defense, they started shooting long shots. This lead slowly dwindled as we were but five points ahead at the third quarter and two points with three minutes to go, but going into a fast weaving stall the Wayside Panthers managed to hold the ball until the gong rang giving them their first district tournament title in 20 years.

Then entering the Regional Tournament at Neodesha to play the tough Bronson team which had finished in first place in their District Tournament. We started off to a flying start, leading by eight points at the end of the first quarter. The large gym soon told on the Panthers as the lead slowly dwindled to a slim margin of 21-20 at the half. 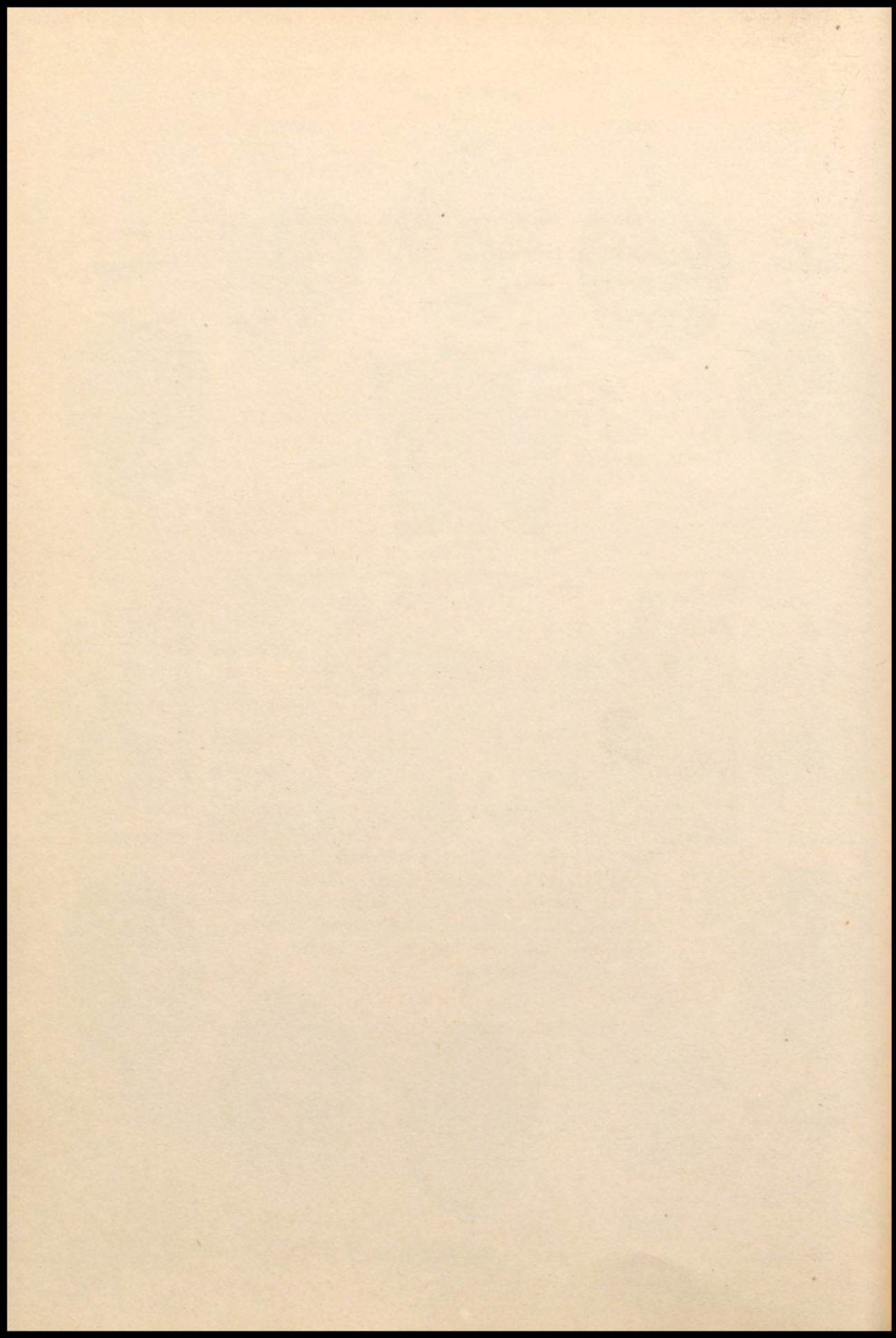

# Boys Baseball

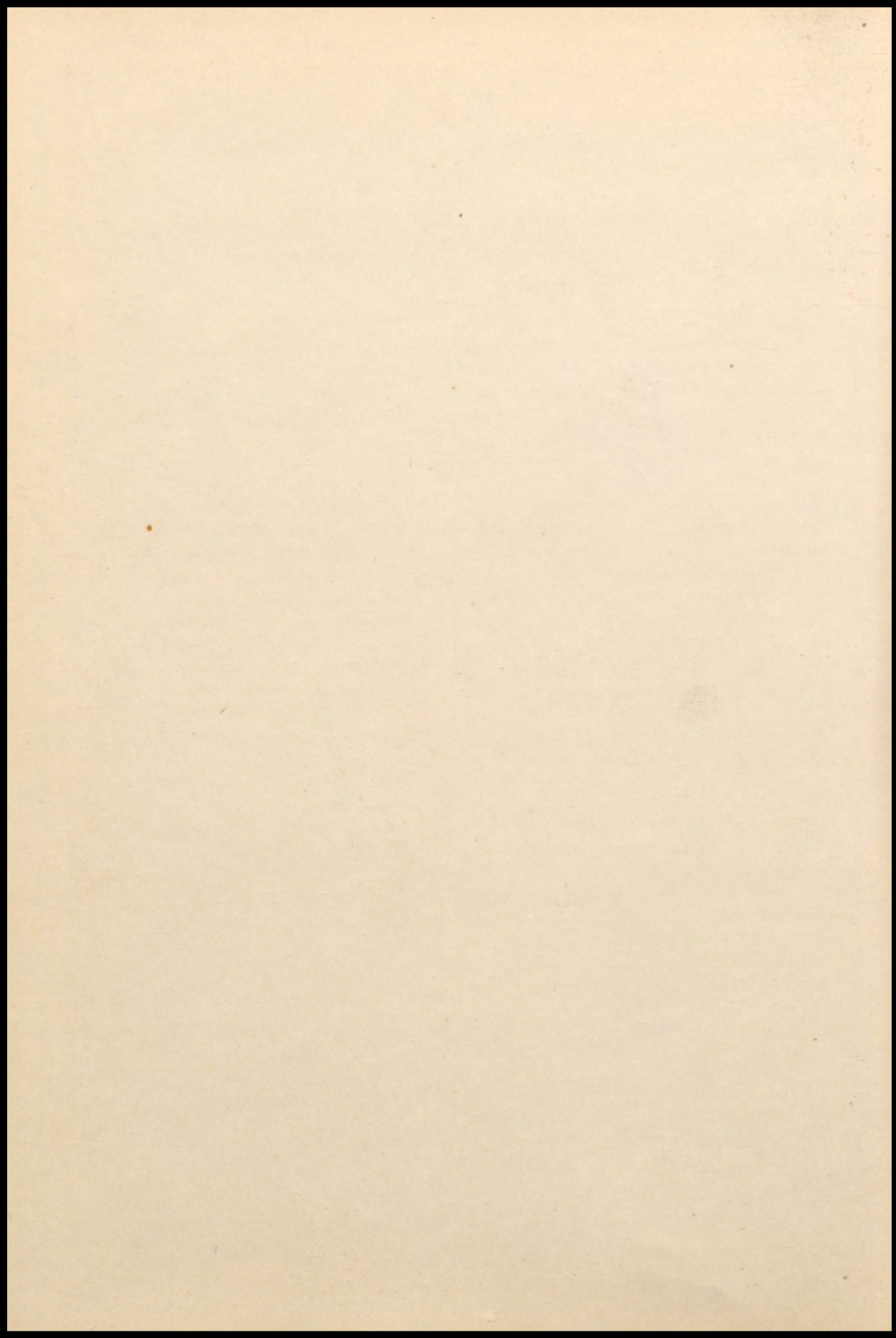

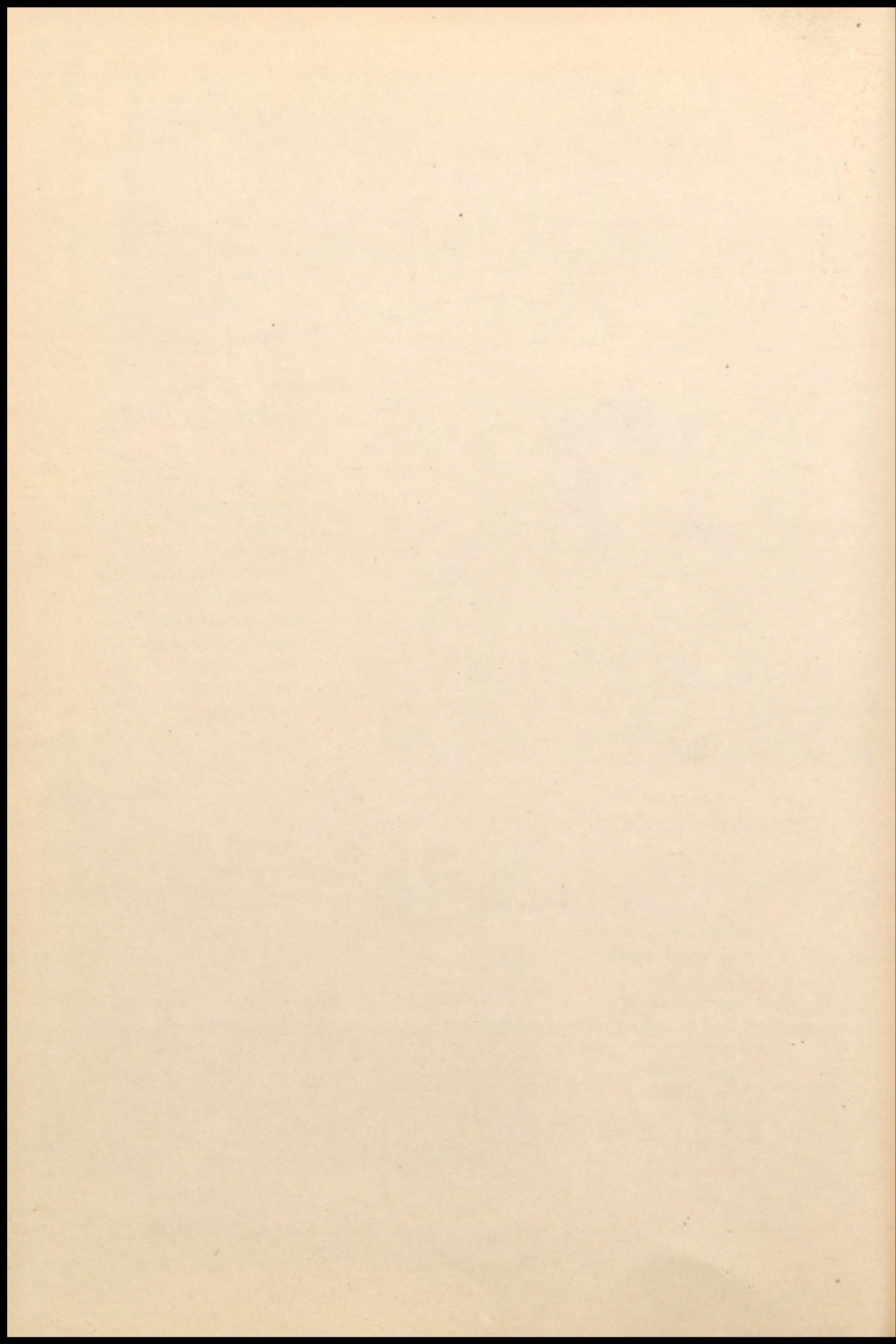

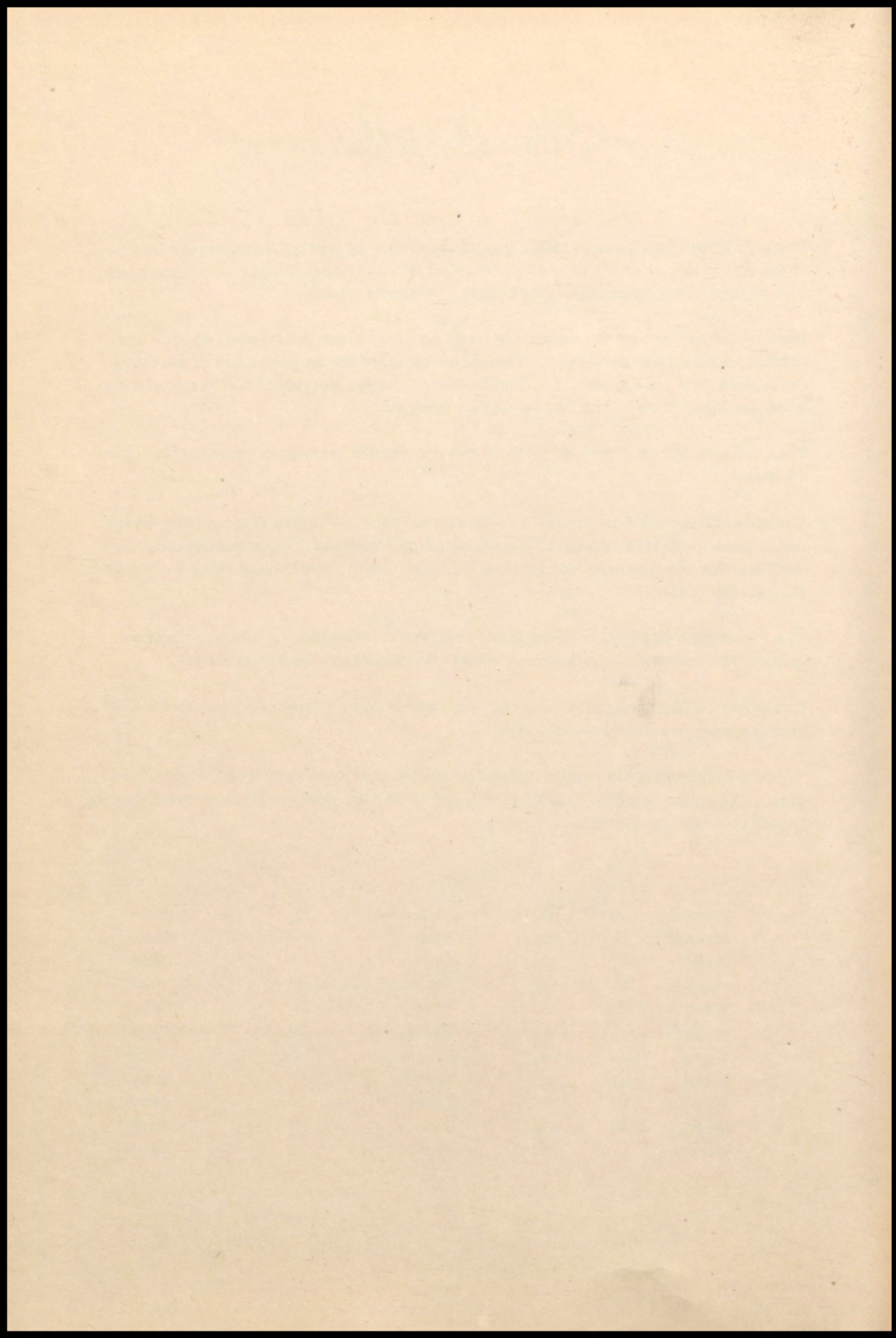
Now it was time to play the return game with Wann. It was only a recap of the first game. The powerful, well-balanced tribe from Oklahoma again defeated us.

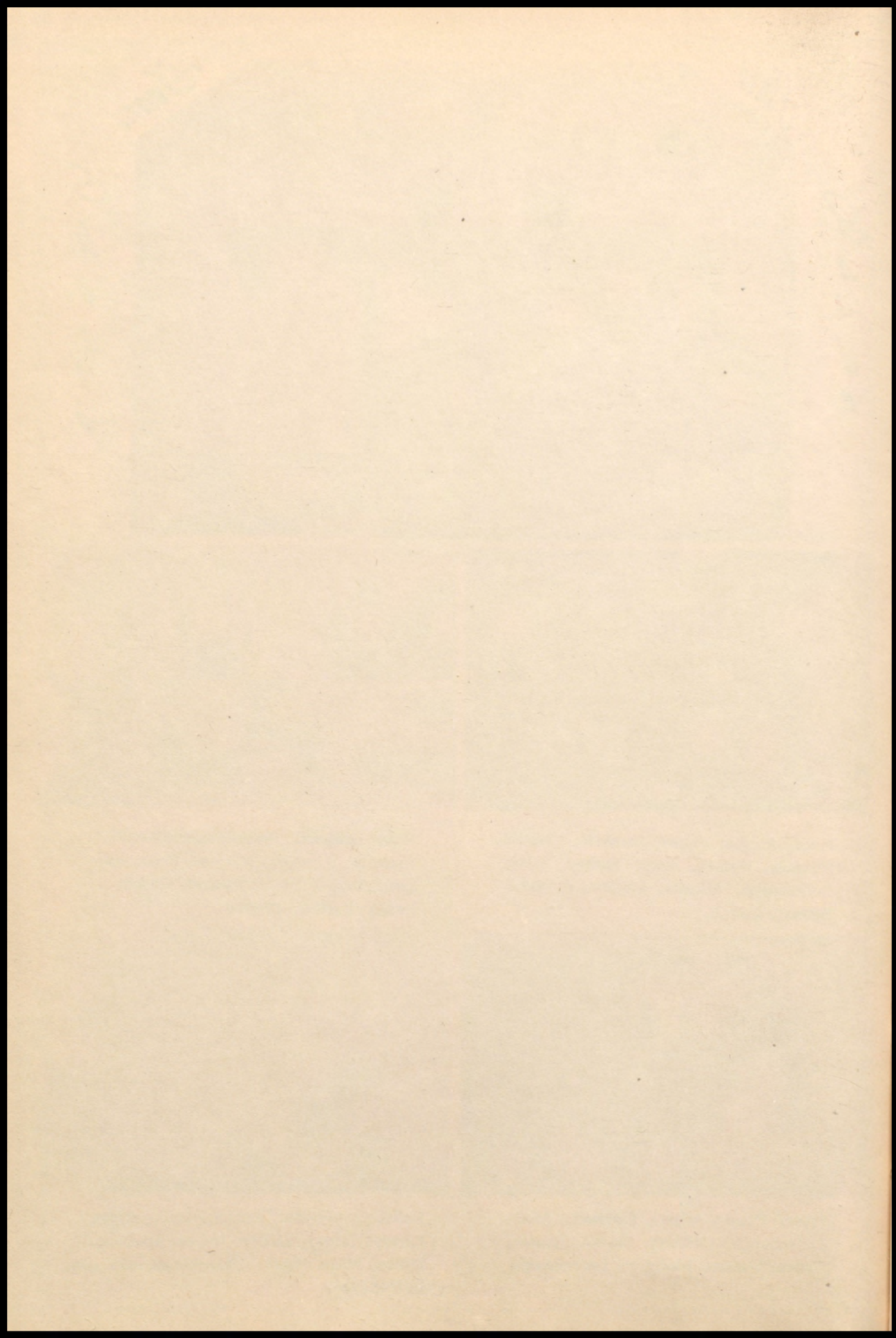
