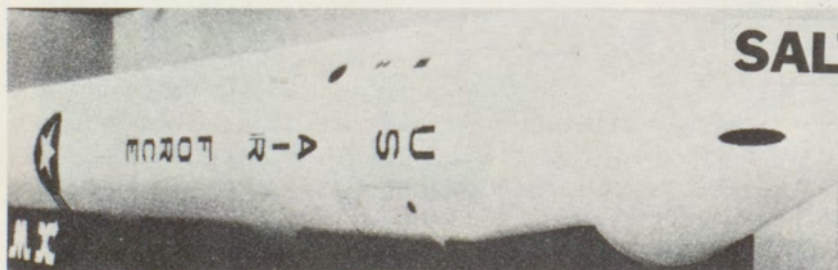

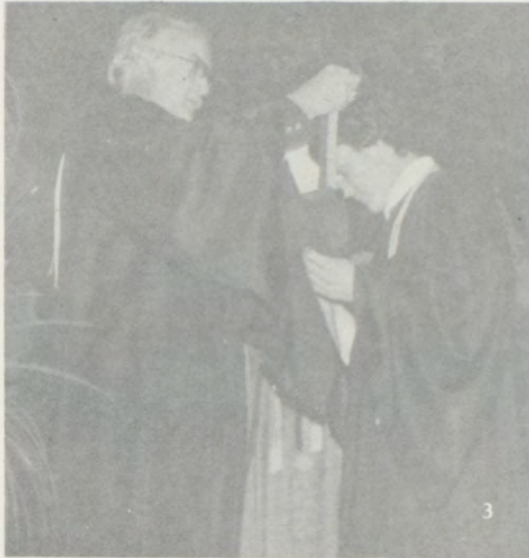

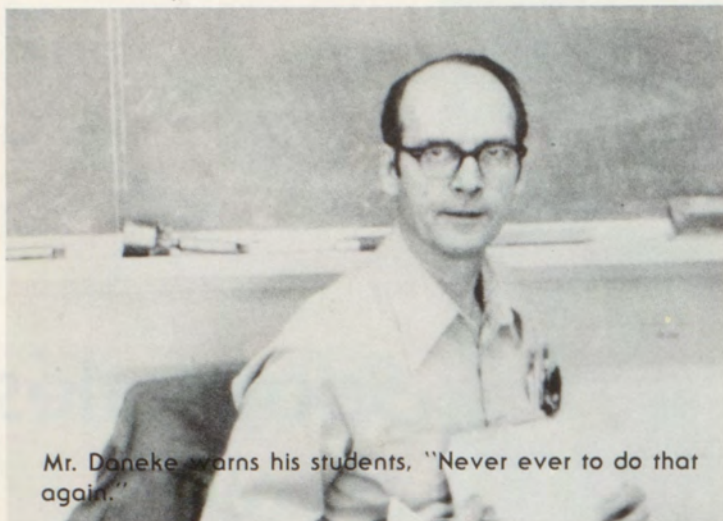

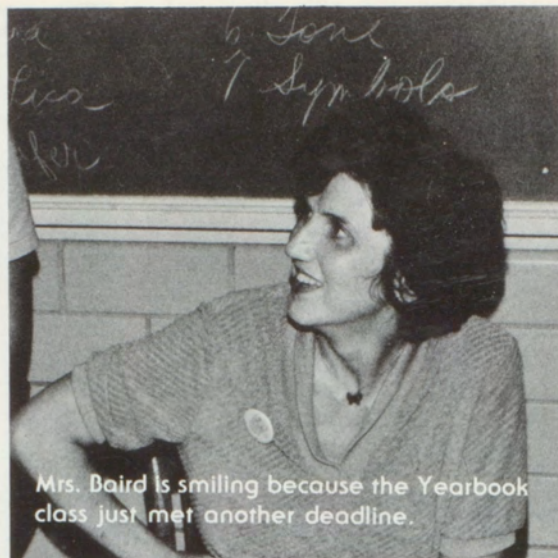

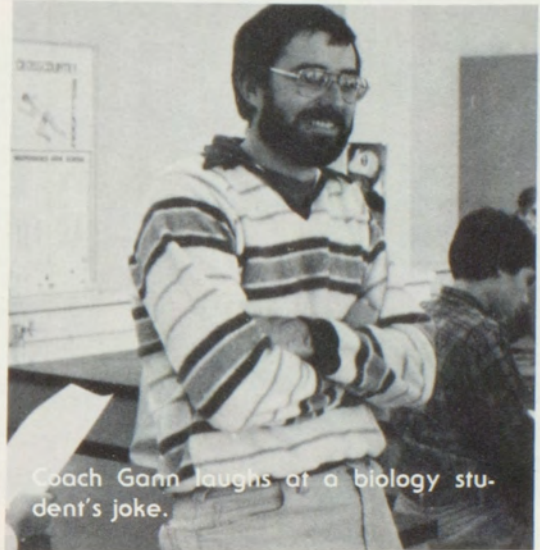

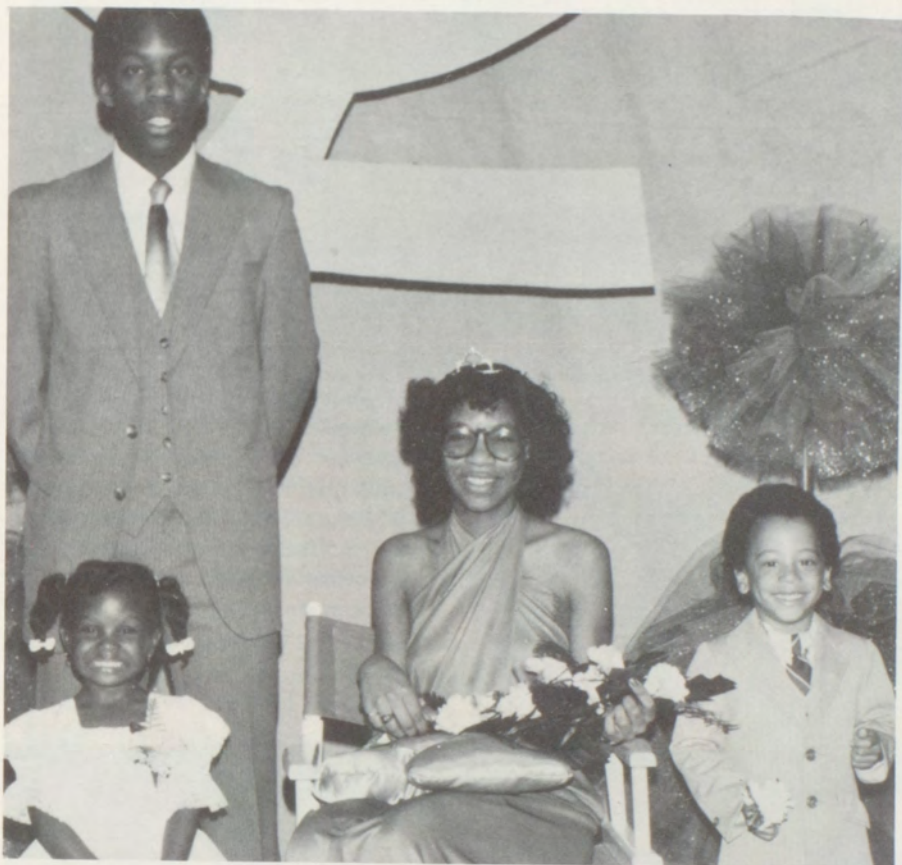

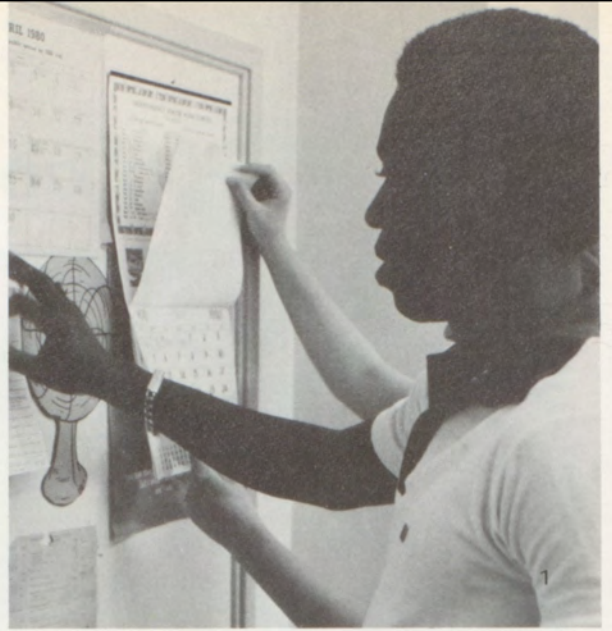

The social science department consists of many history, law, and current event classes. This department gives the students an awareness of current and past world events and problems. More importantly, it prepares the students for the "real world".

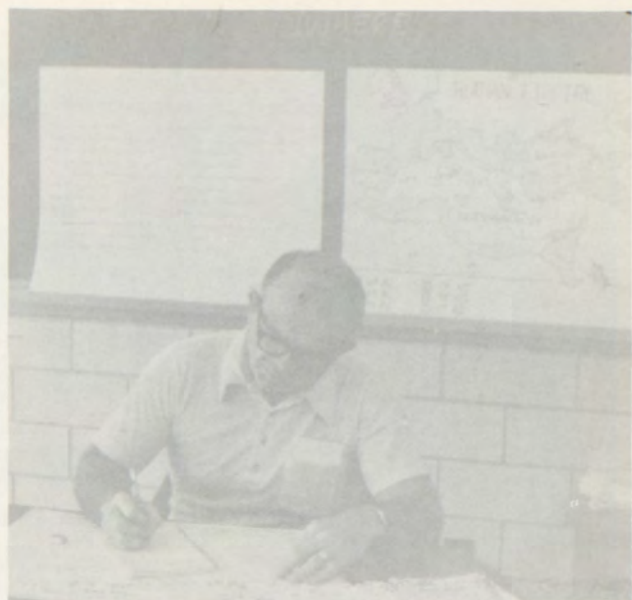

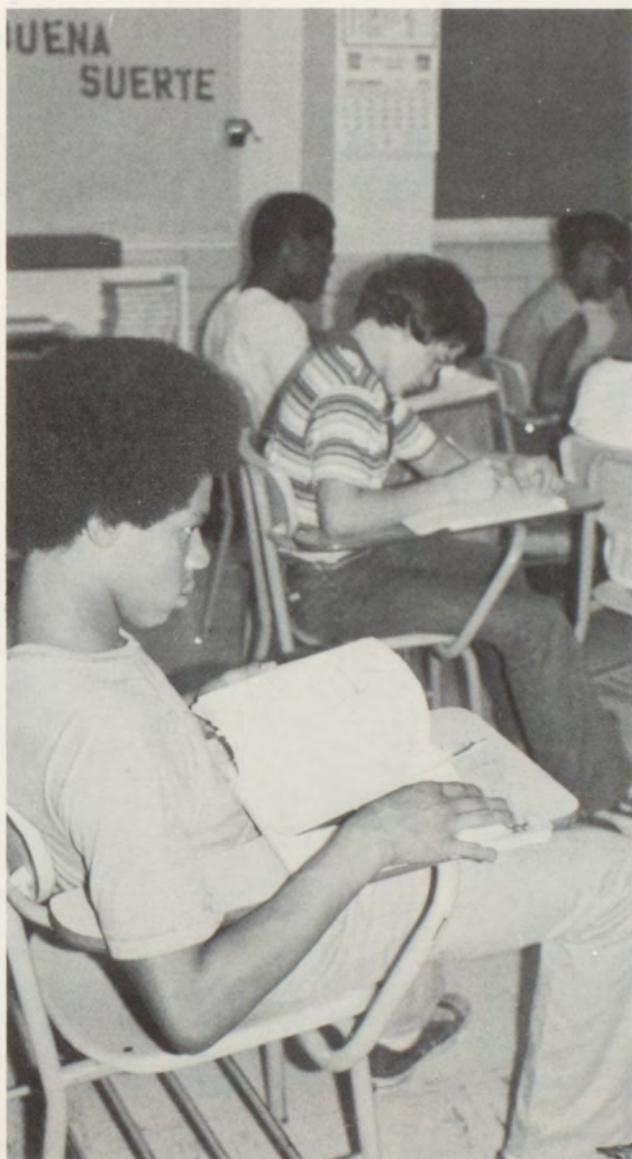

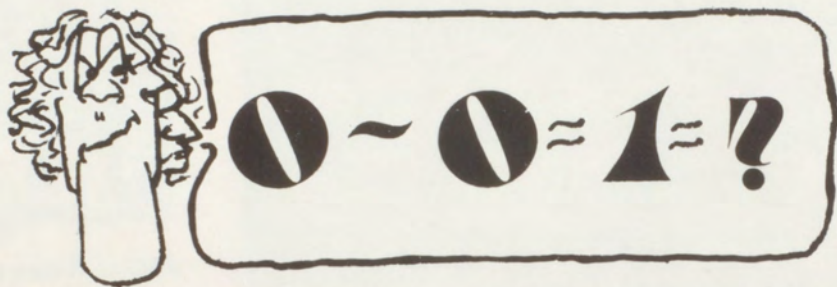


Math and Science test the mind

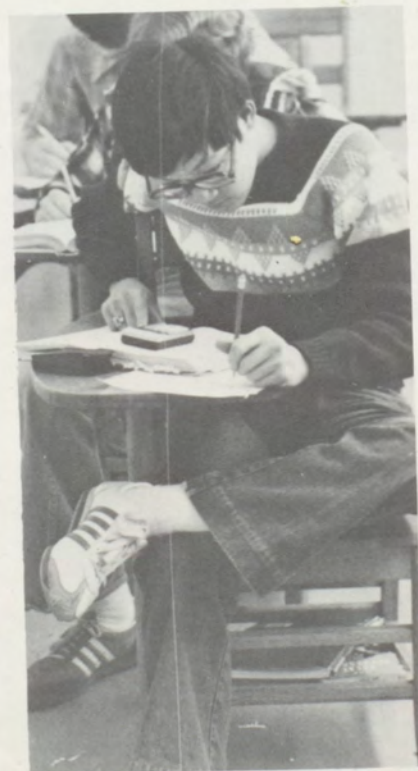

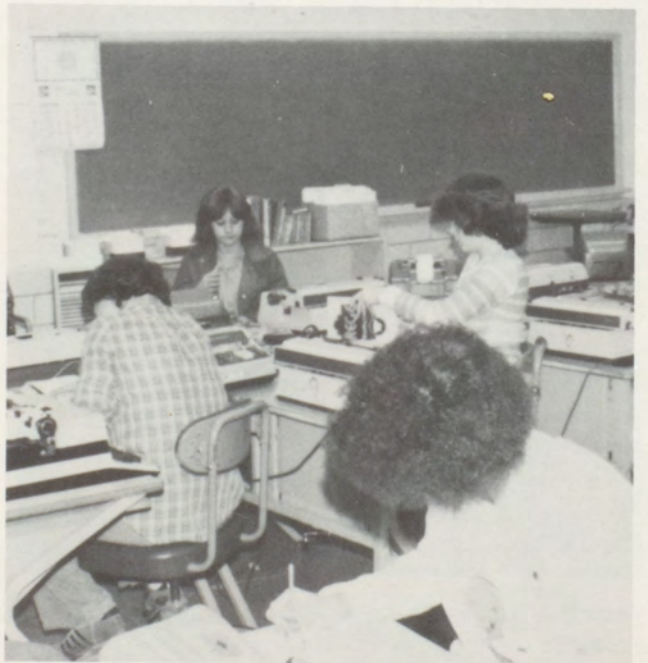

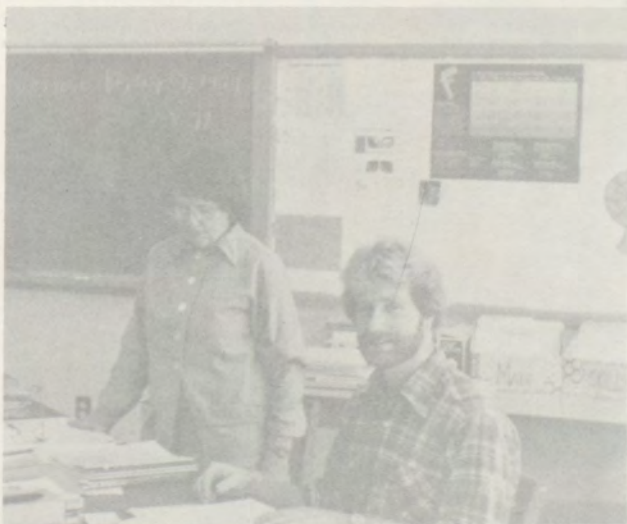

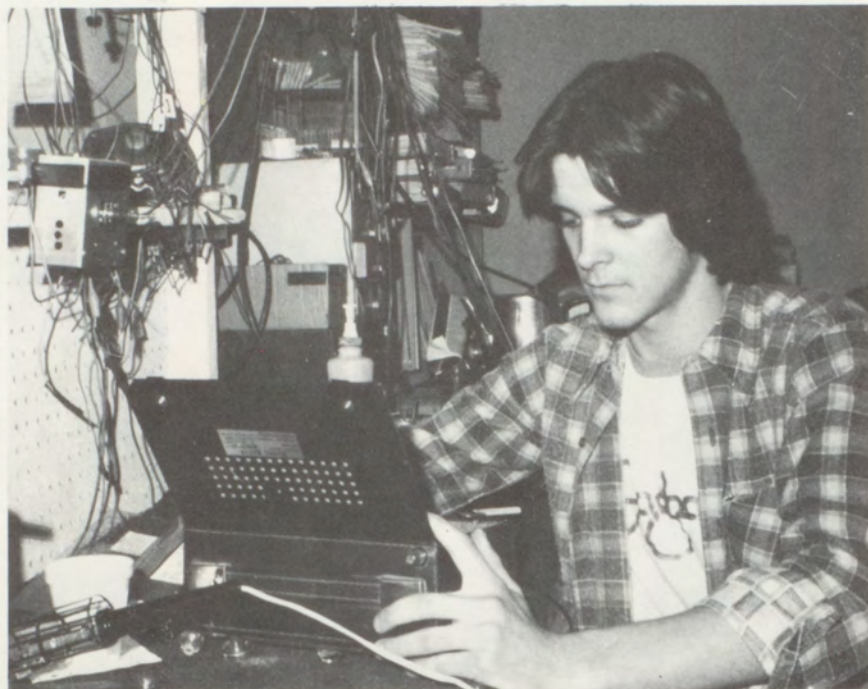

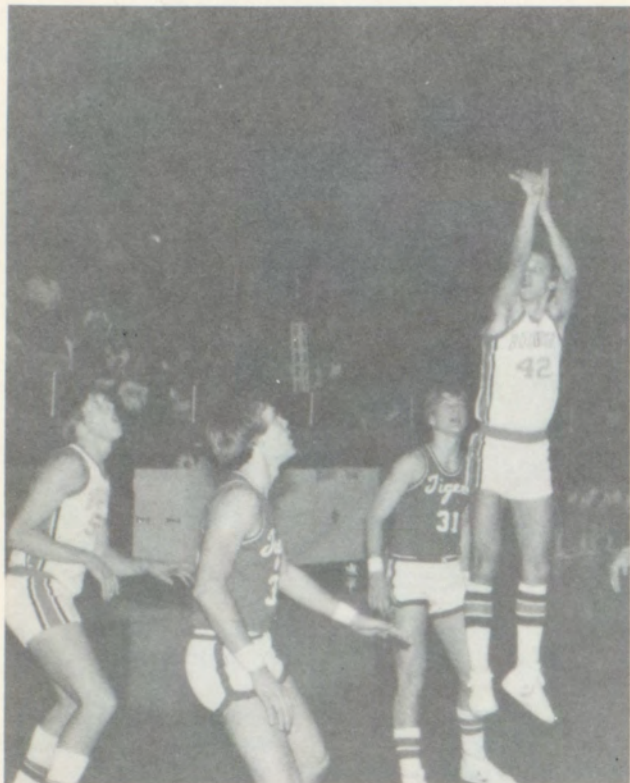

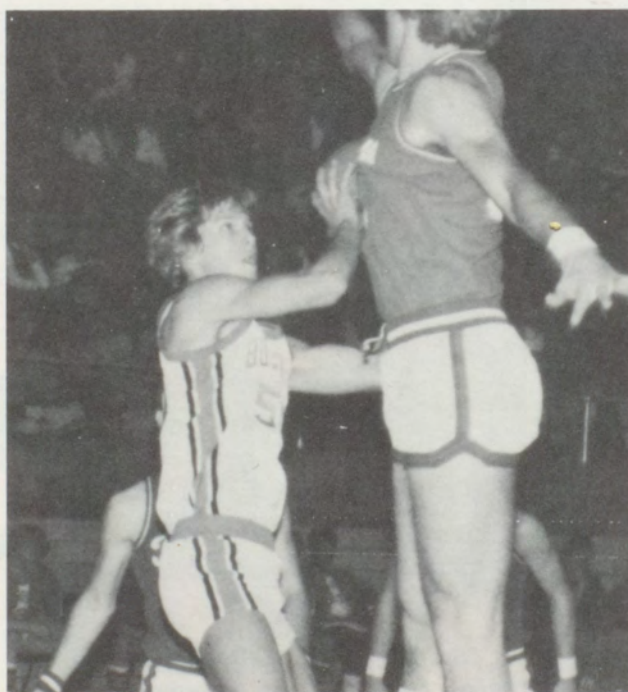

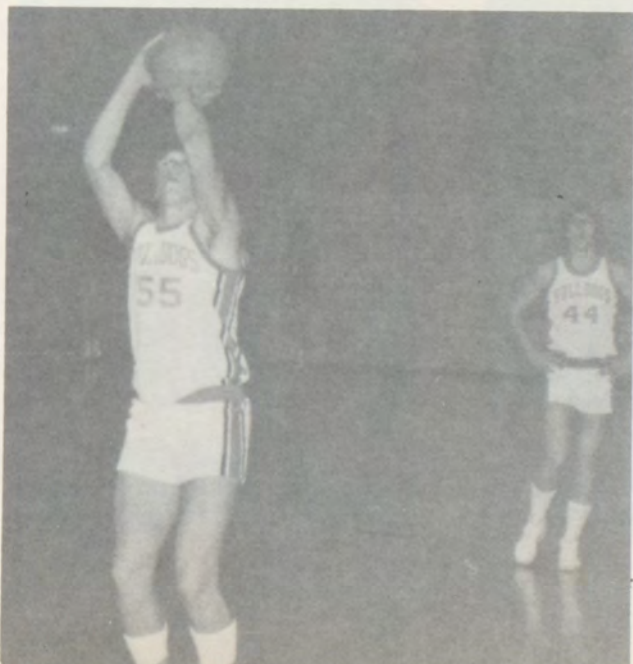

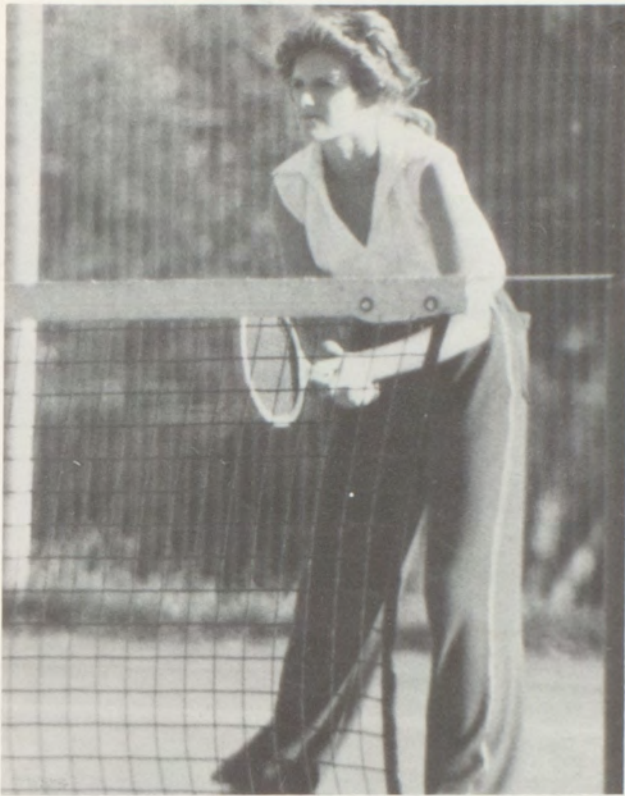

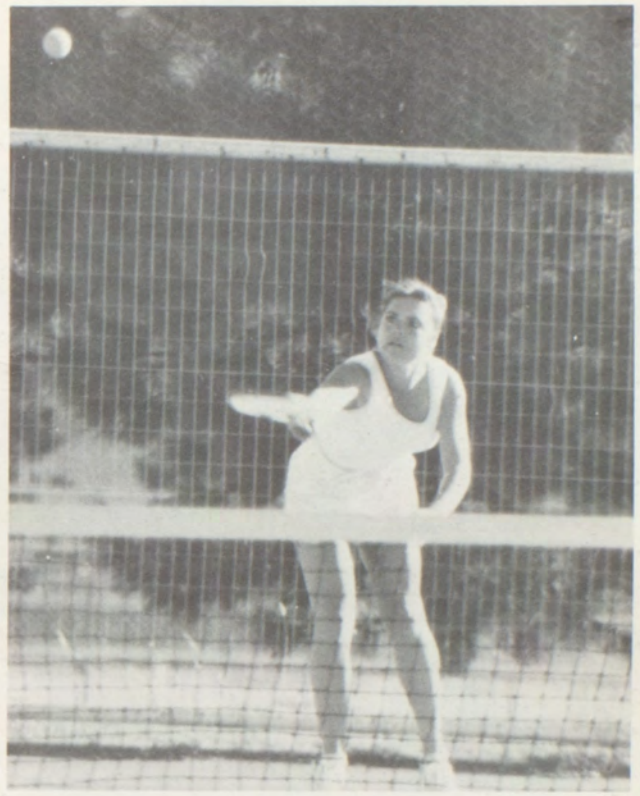

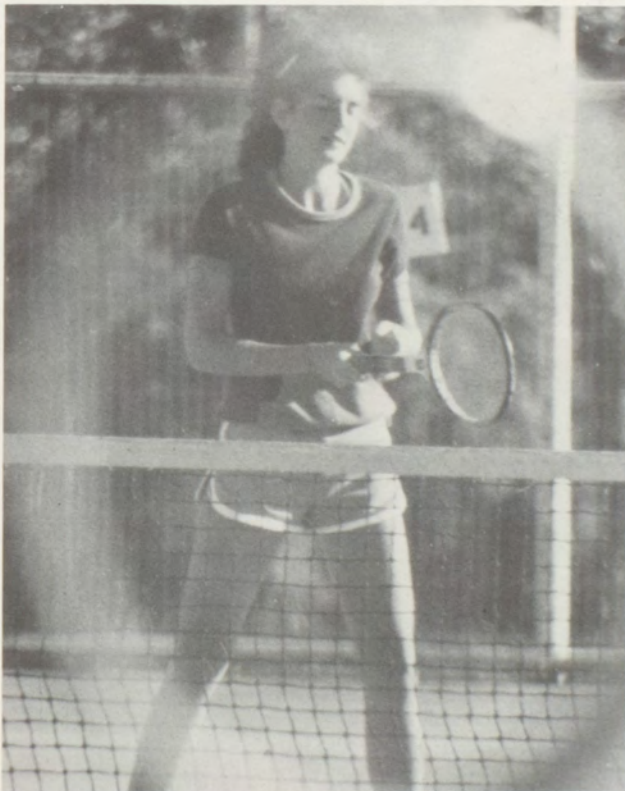

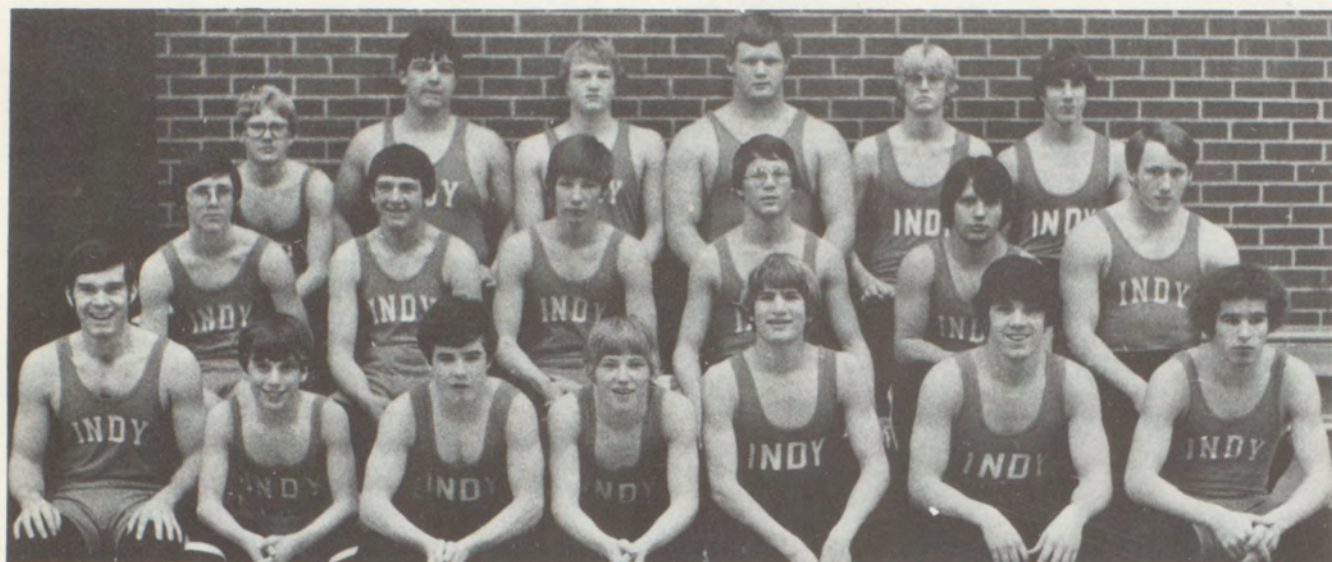

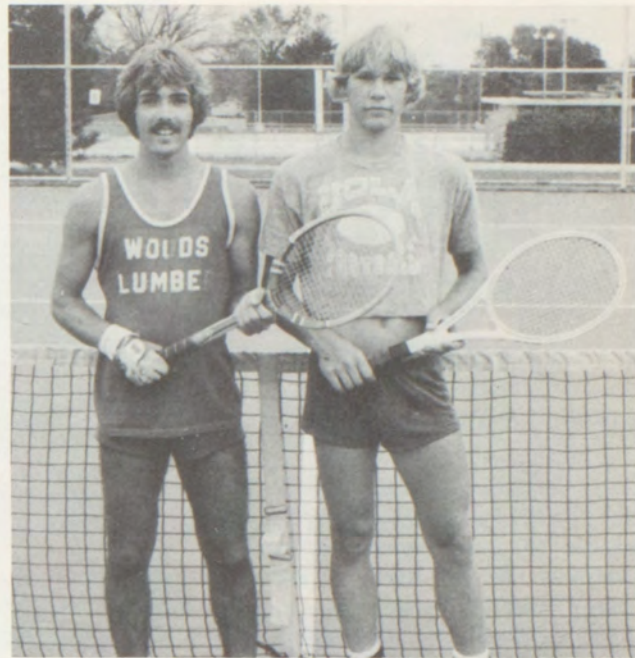

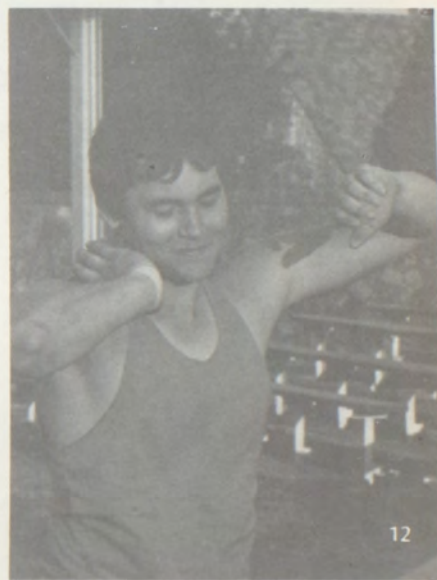

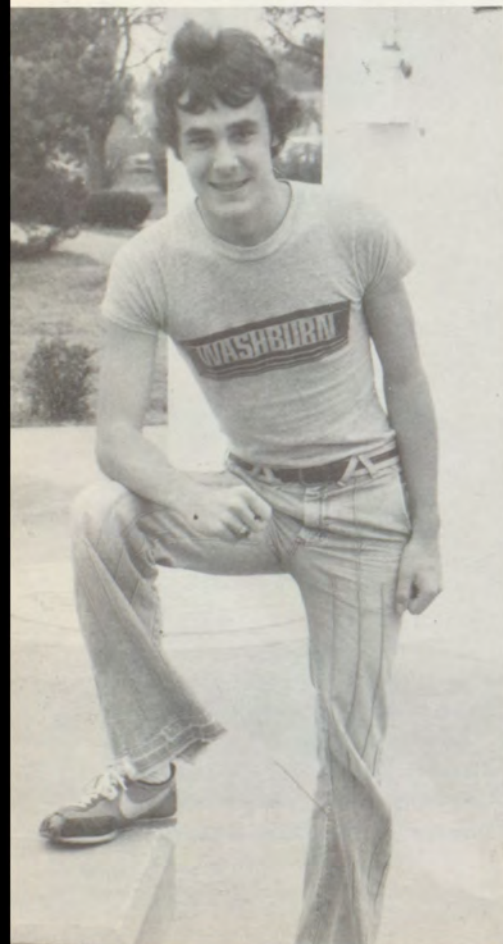
Cross Country is new to I.H.S.

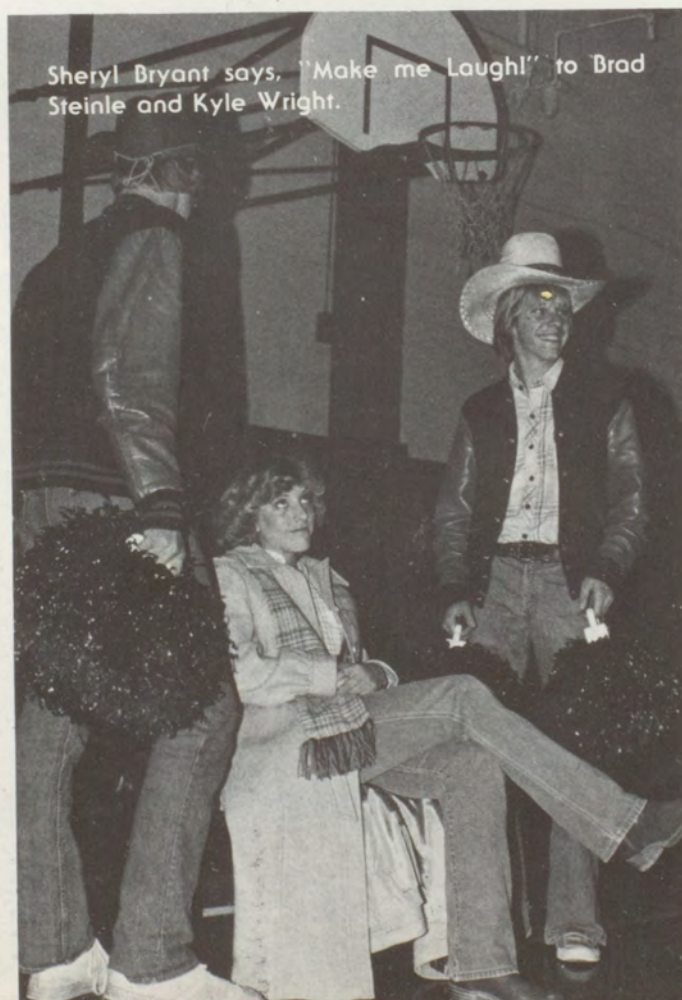

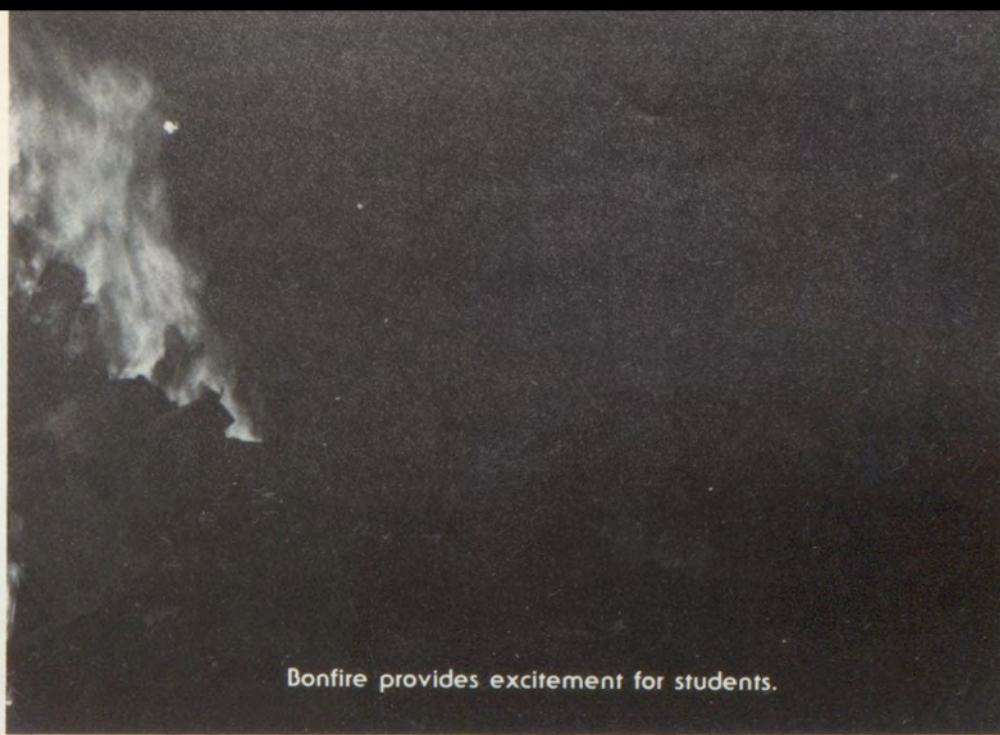

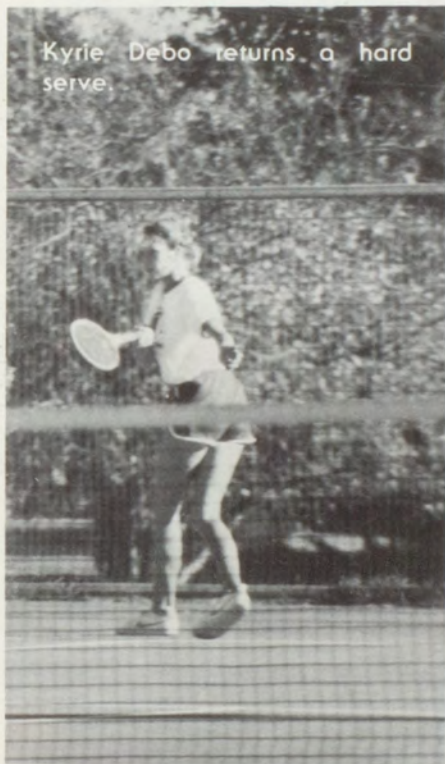

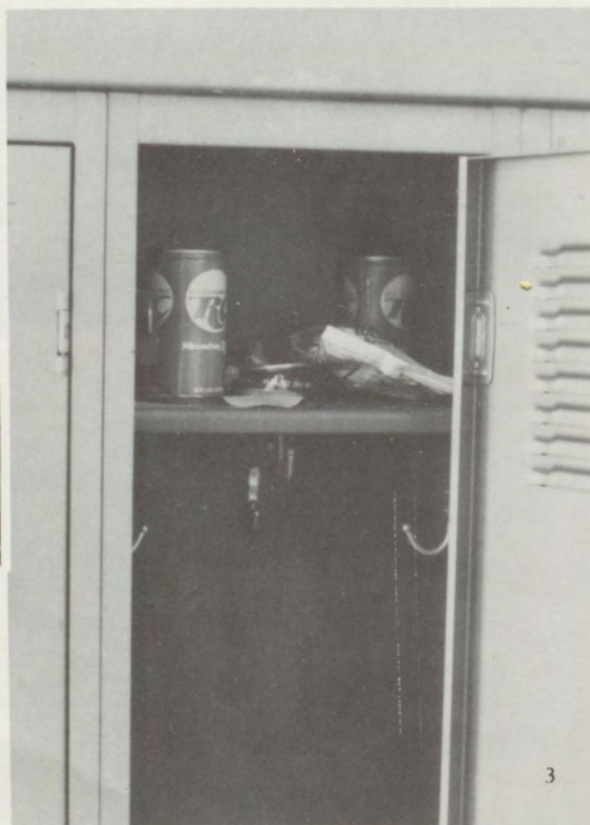

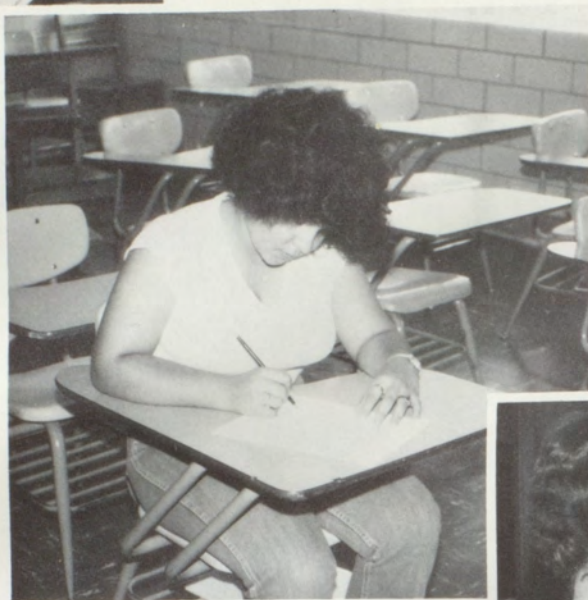
