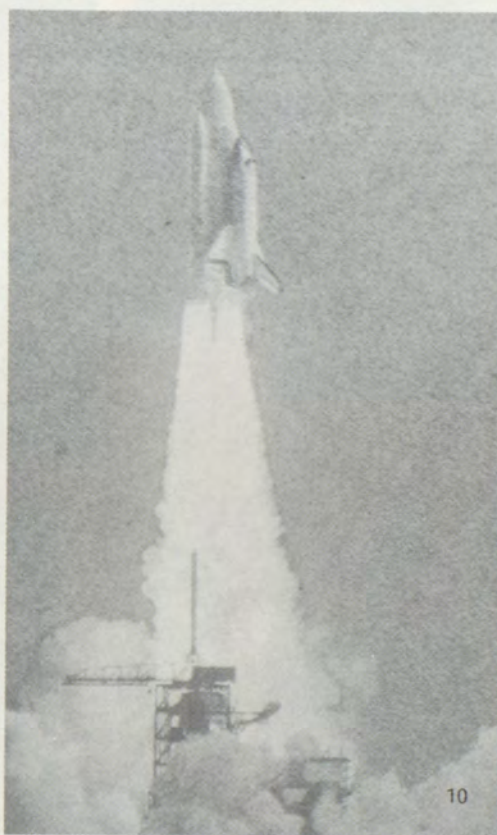

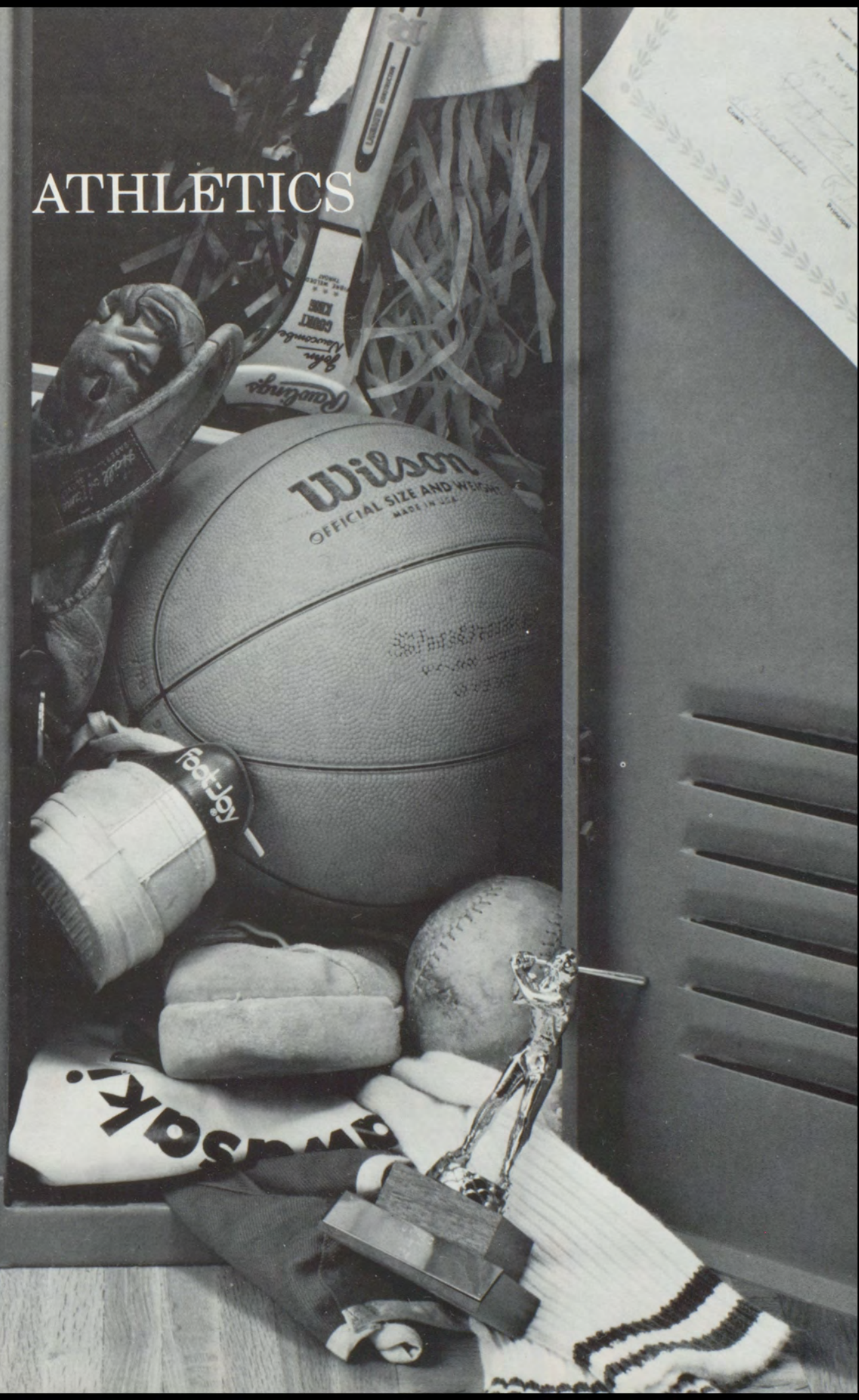

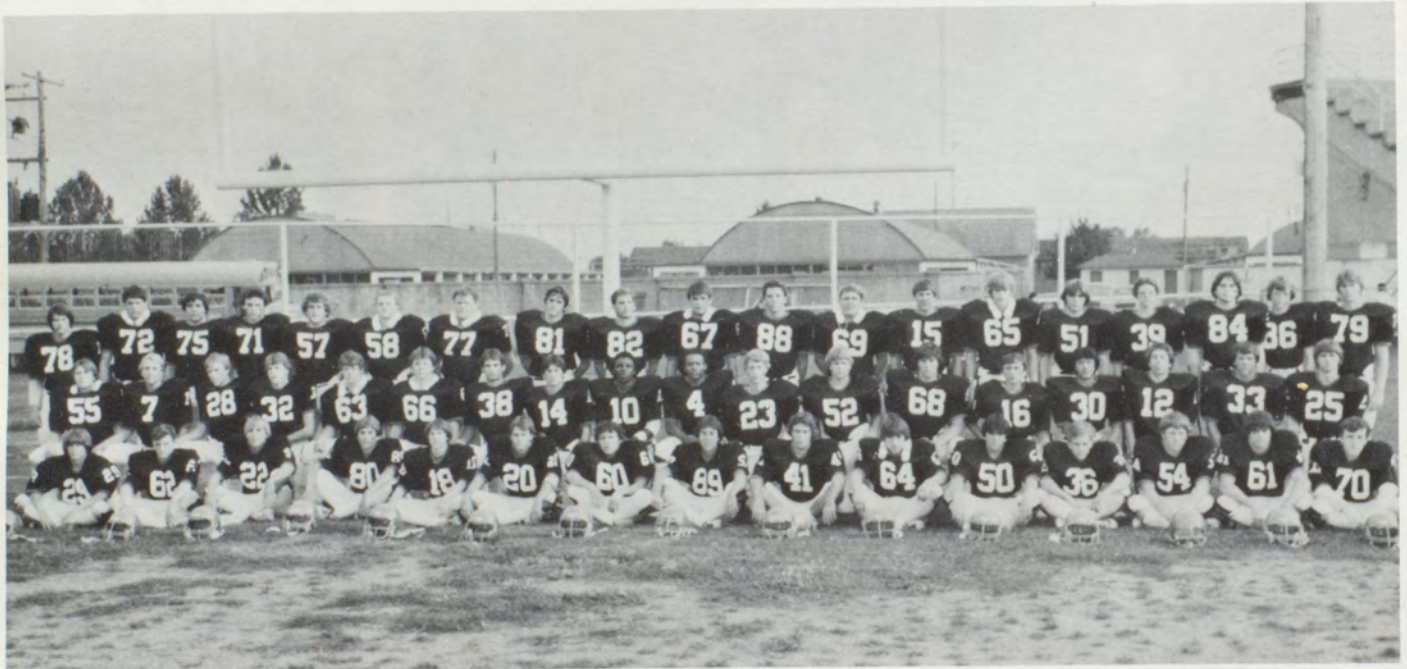

'dogs win upper division championship

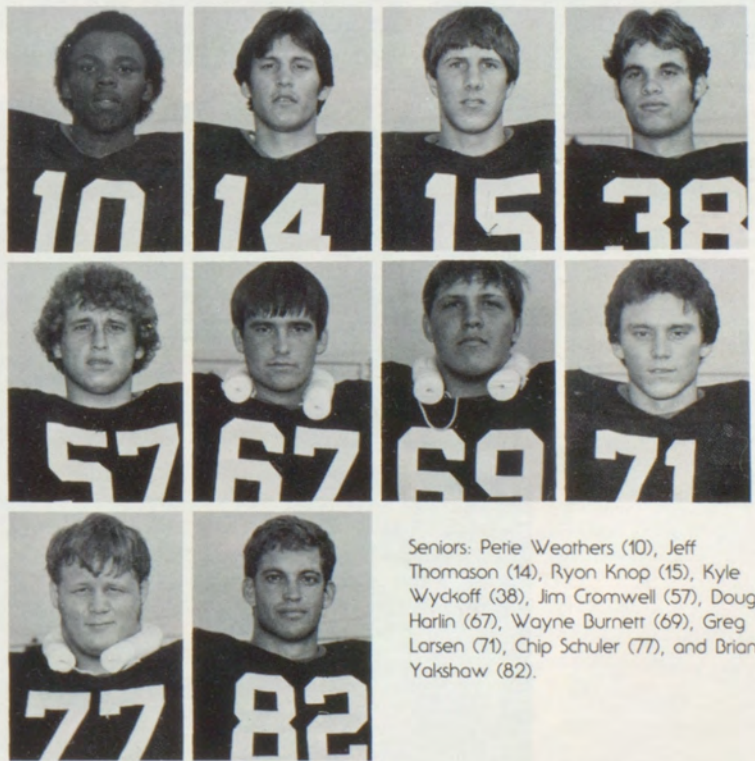
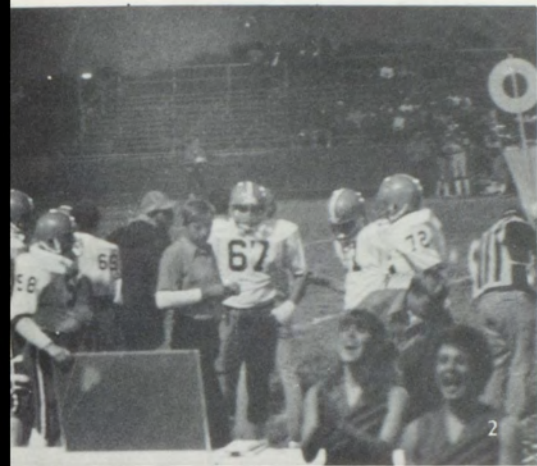

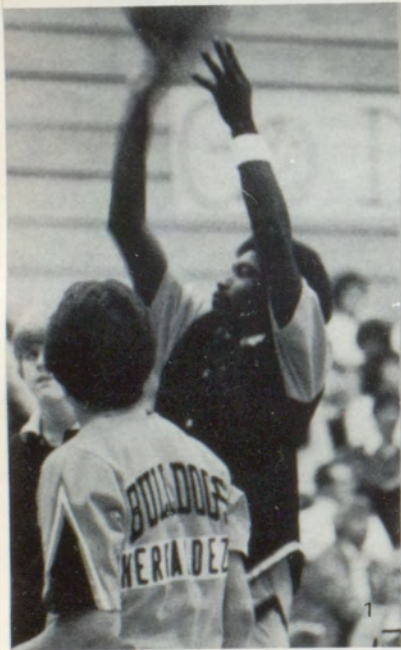
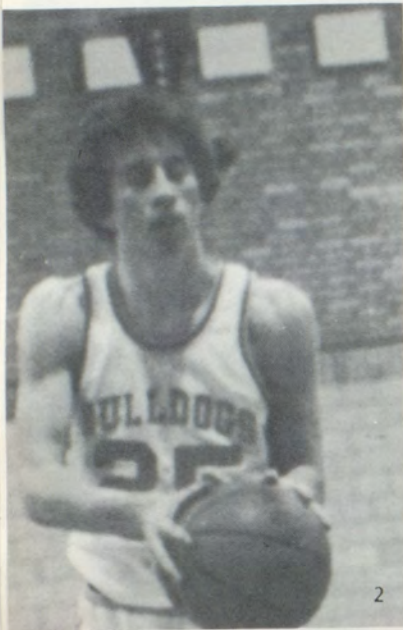

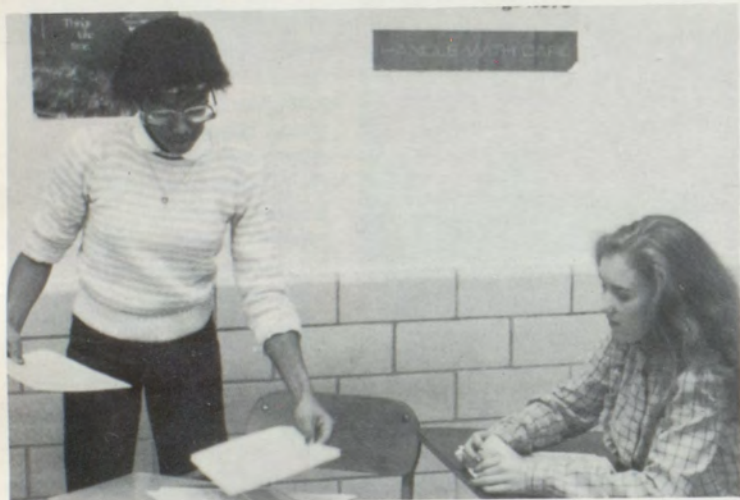

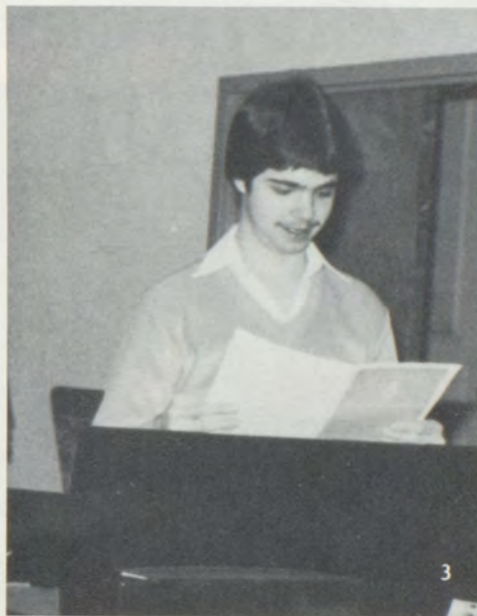

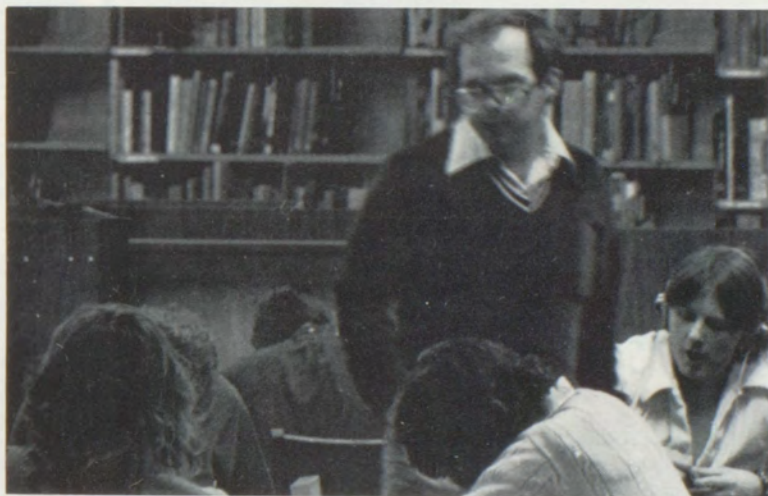

The IHS curriculum offers a wide variety of social science classes. In addition to the required history and government, it includes world history, current events, occupations, psychology, and sociology.

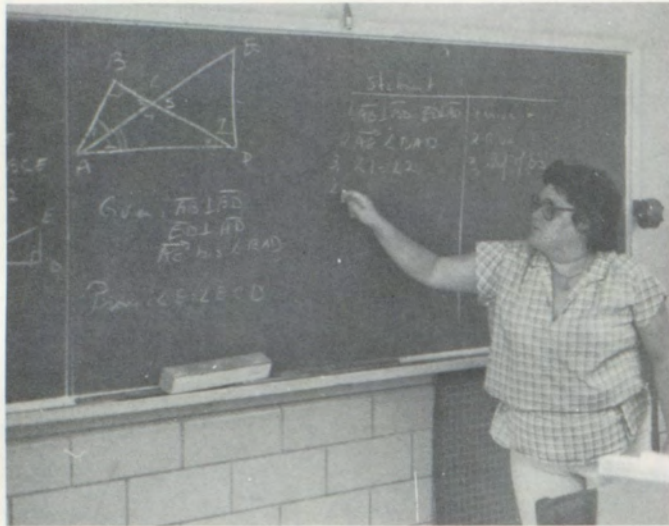

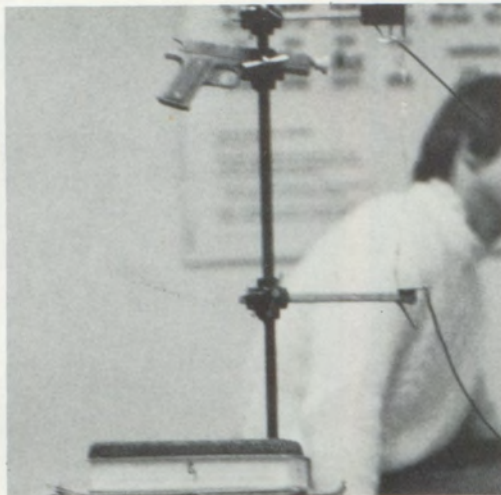
The physical education classes serve the dual purpose of helping to keep the students in good physical condition and to educate them about health and athletics. Classes include health and both beginning and advanced P.E.

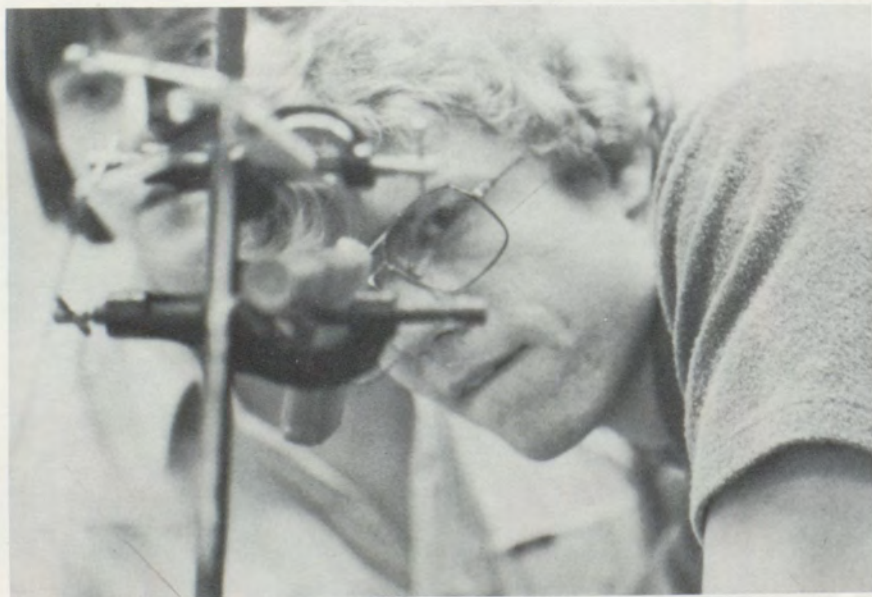
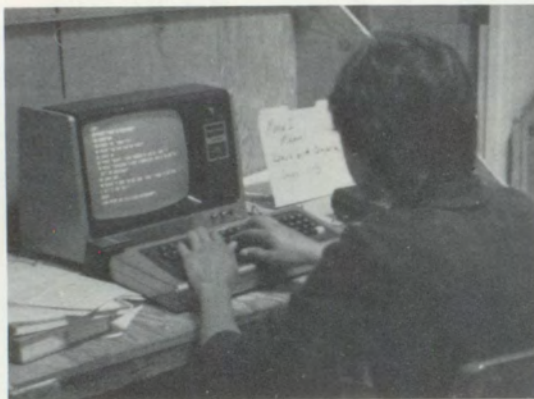

The foreign language classes teach Latin, Spanish, and French but, just as important, they show the students about culture and the geography of the countries that use the languages that are being taught.

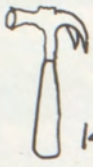

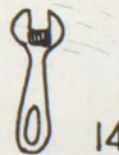

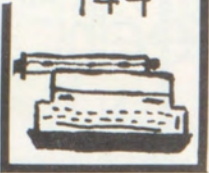

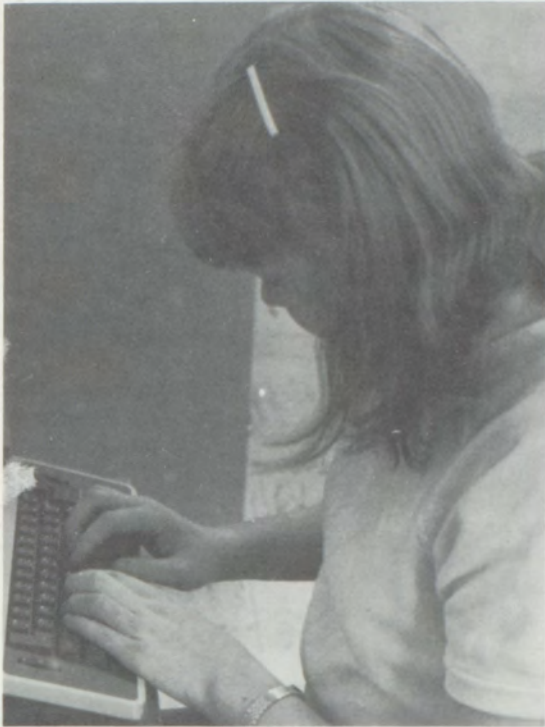


The Business Education classes provide an opportunity to learn methods and skills used in the business world. Classes include Typewriting Cycles 1-4, Making Our Money Do

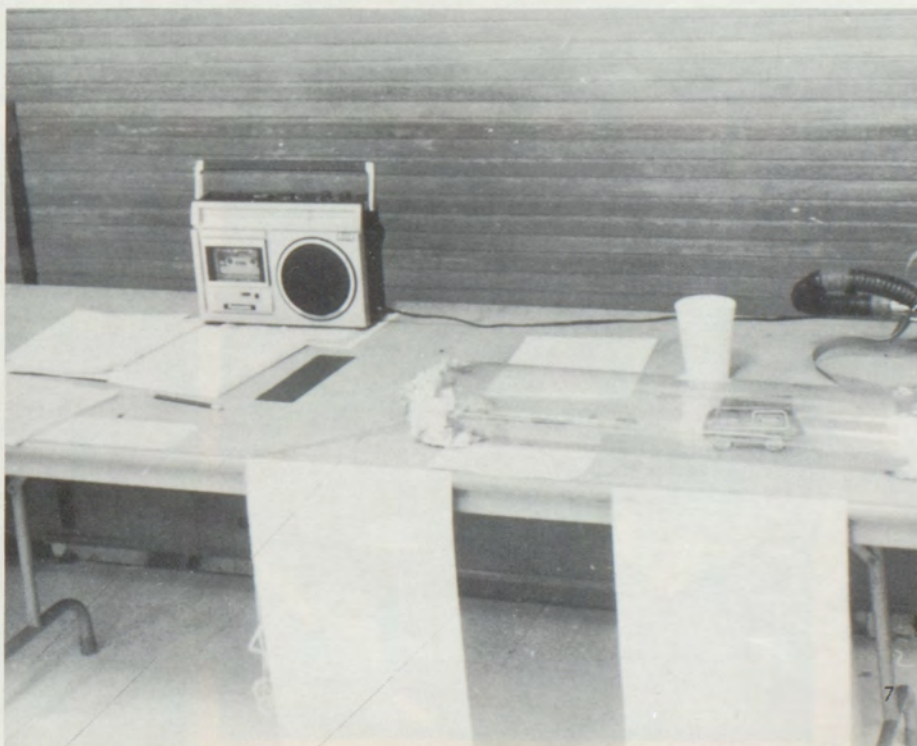

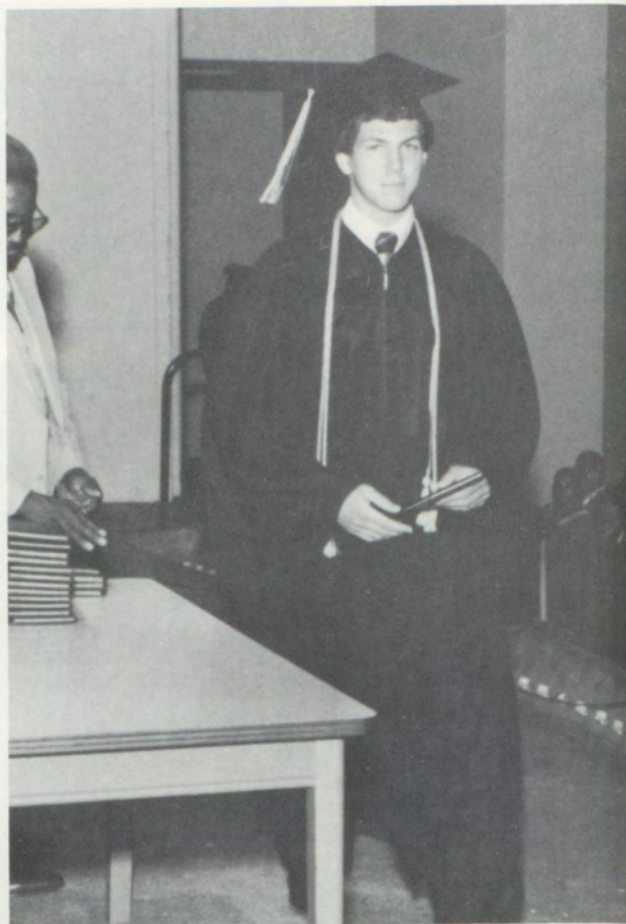

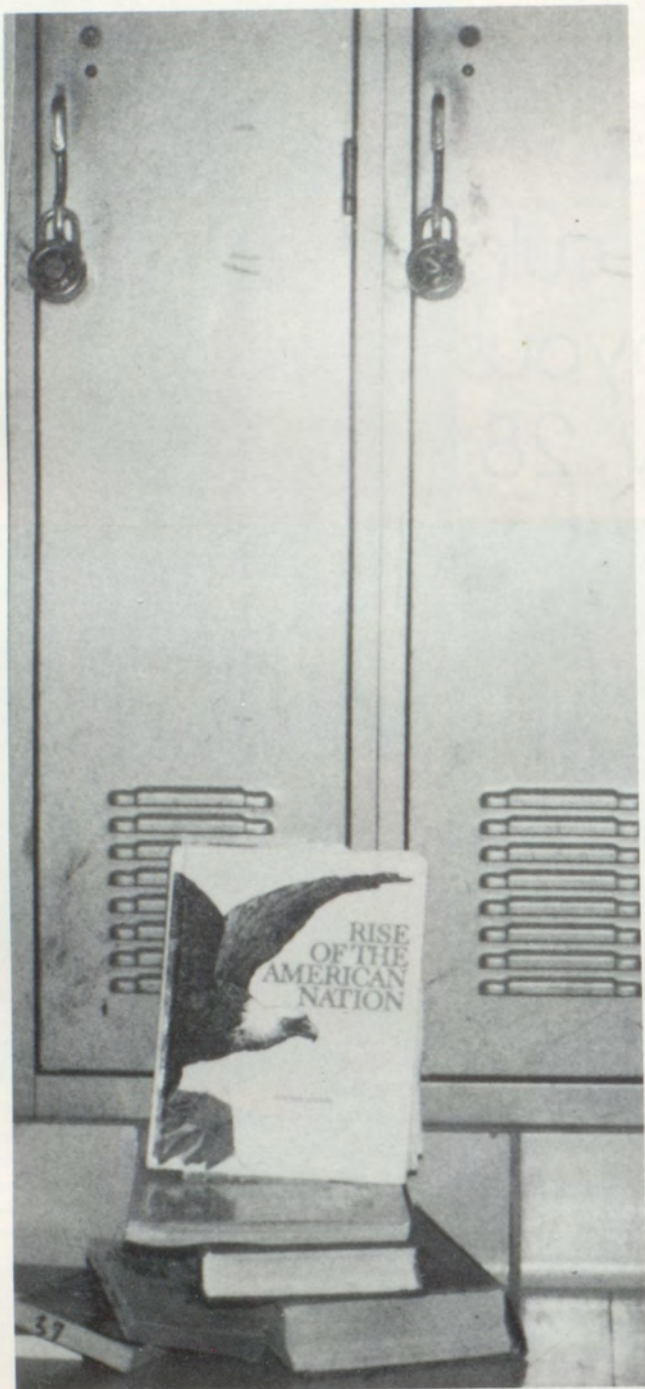
