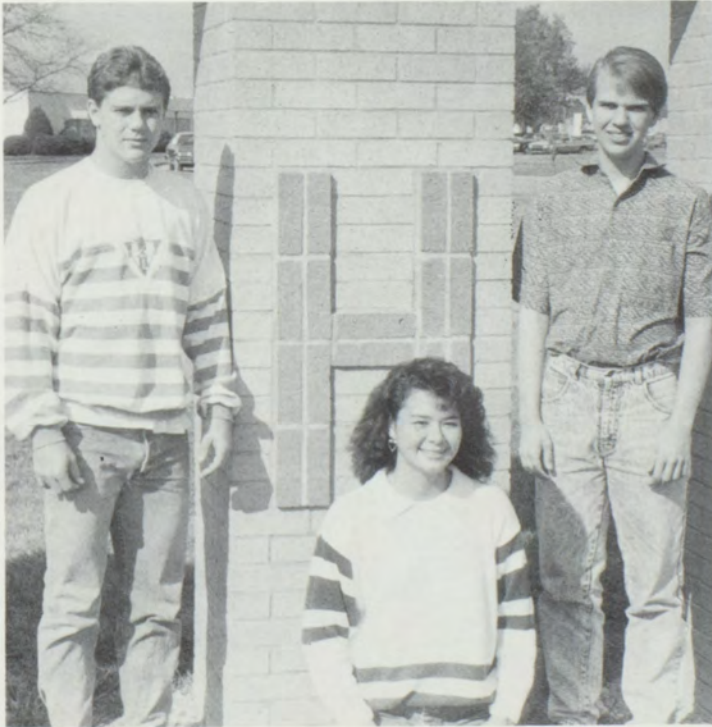

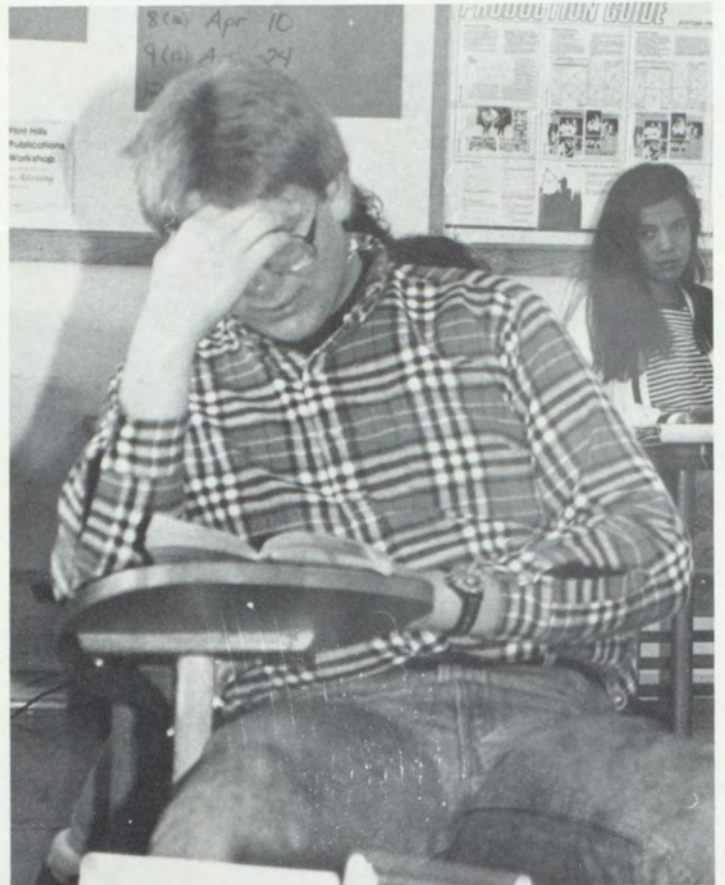


Enthusiasm Runs Amuck

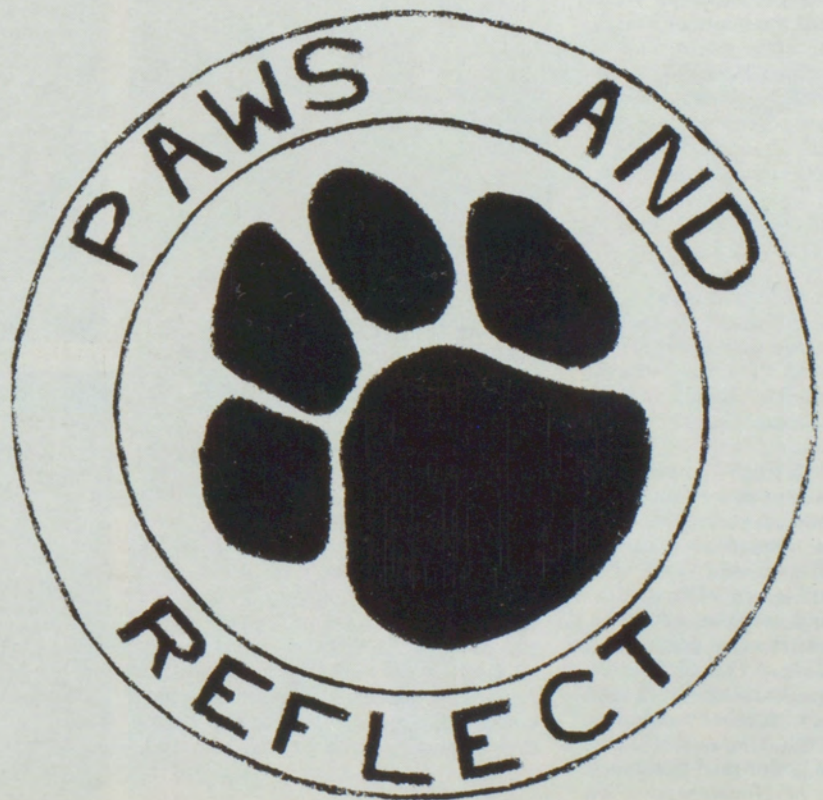

Classes

Social Sciences

The Social Science department offers many courses including Current Events, Government, and Criminal Law taught by Ray Emmot; Consumer Survey taught by Wayne Landwehr; Psychology, Kansas History, Citizenship and Advanced Citizenship taught by Mark Coder; American History and World History I and II taught Bill Ferguson; and Citizenship and American History taught by Bill Singleton.

To fulfill requirements for graduation, the student enrolls in Citizenship as a freshman, where he learns a little about his community; as a sophomore, he applies himself to Consumer Survey and discovers taxes. During his junior year, learning about his country in American History tops his schedule. English

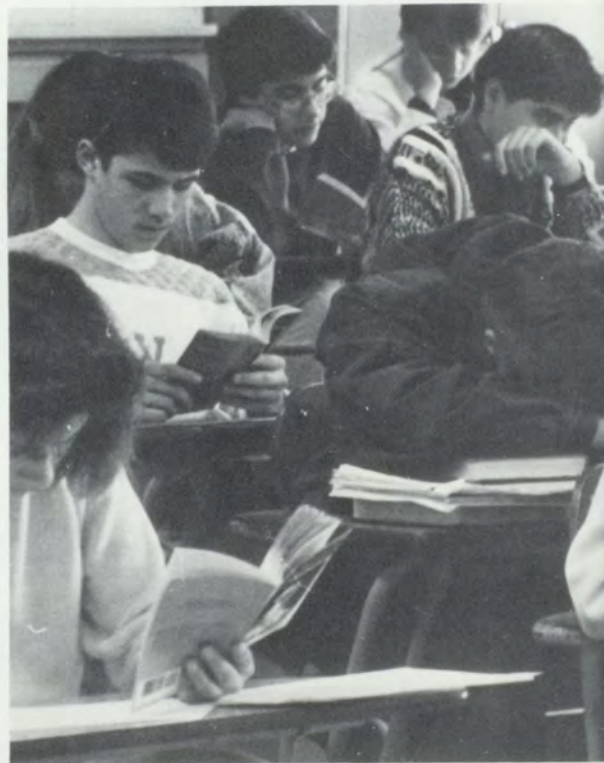
The English department offered Basic, General, and Advanced English at all grade levels, along with Debate, Forensics, Drama and Play Productions, Speech, Developmental Reading, Journalism, Yearbook, and Classical Literature.

As a freshman in English, he studied short stories and grammar emphasizing simple sentences and paragraph writing. Sophomores memorized a variety of poems like "High Flight" and "The Road Not Taken", along with advancing to verbals and complex sentences. Examining short stories, plays, and novels like the *Tale of Two Cities* completed this year. Learning Greek and Latin roots along with other vocabulary words expanded the mind of the junior. Not only did the junior read the novels like *Adventures of Huckleberry Finn*

and *The Scarlet Letter*, but scrutinized the authors like Thoreau, Twain, and Hawthorne. Thirty-four types of analogies and several "papers" were included. Lasting one semester, or full year in Advanced Placement, seniors experienced multitudes of vocabulary words, themes and research papers, and studied selected plays and novels. 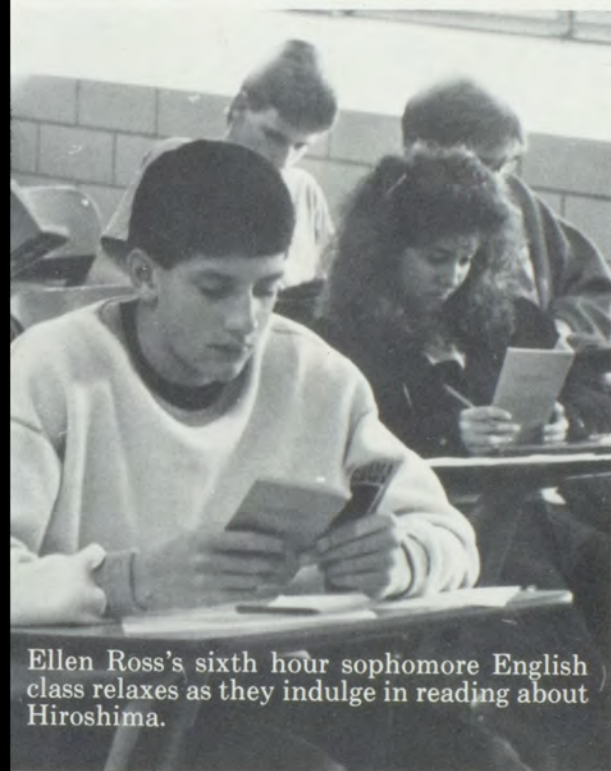

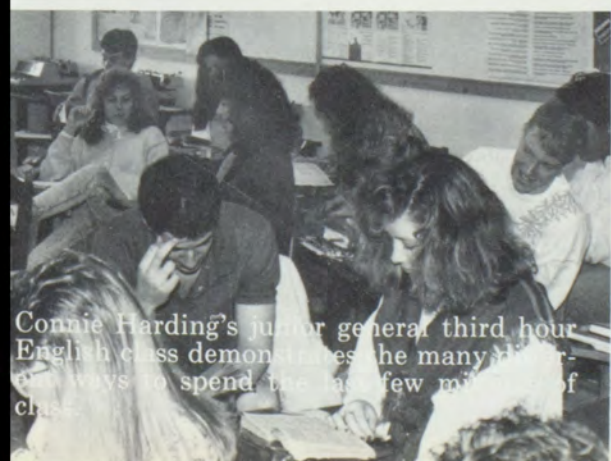
Physical Education

The Physical Education department offers a variety of courses concerning body fitness and health taught by Mike Boyd and Kristi Speicher, respectively. Among them are Boys' and Girls' Physical Education I, which introduces the student to several sports as well as calisthenics; COED Lifetime Sports, which puts greater emphasis on the development of individual abilities; Boys' and Girls' Physical Conditioning, which stresses personal fitness; and Health, which teaches first aid and how to prevent accidents.

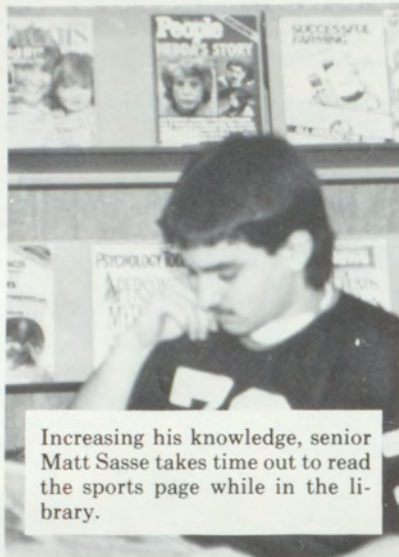

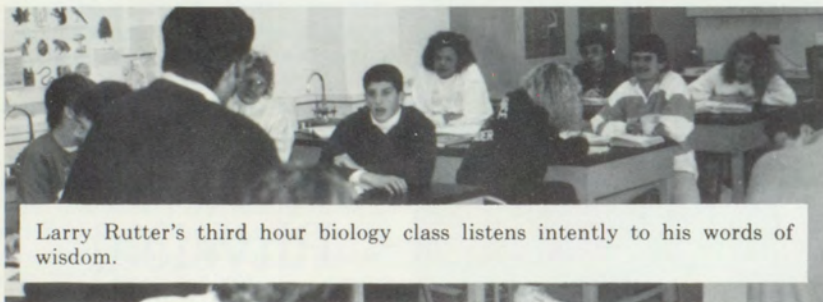

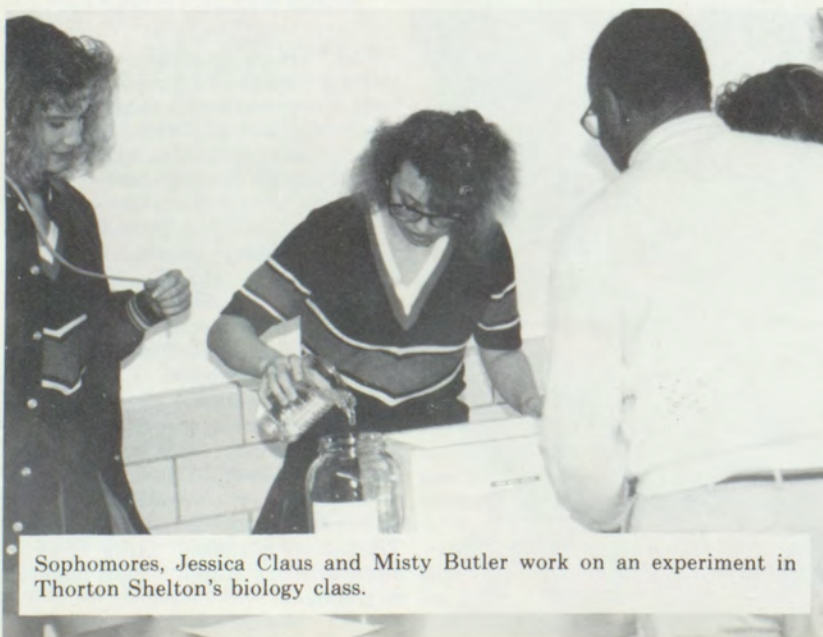

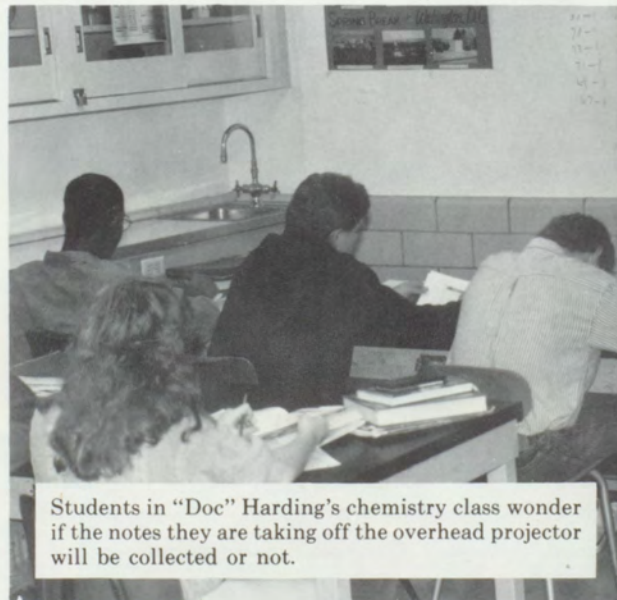
Science

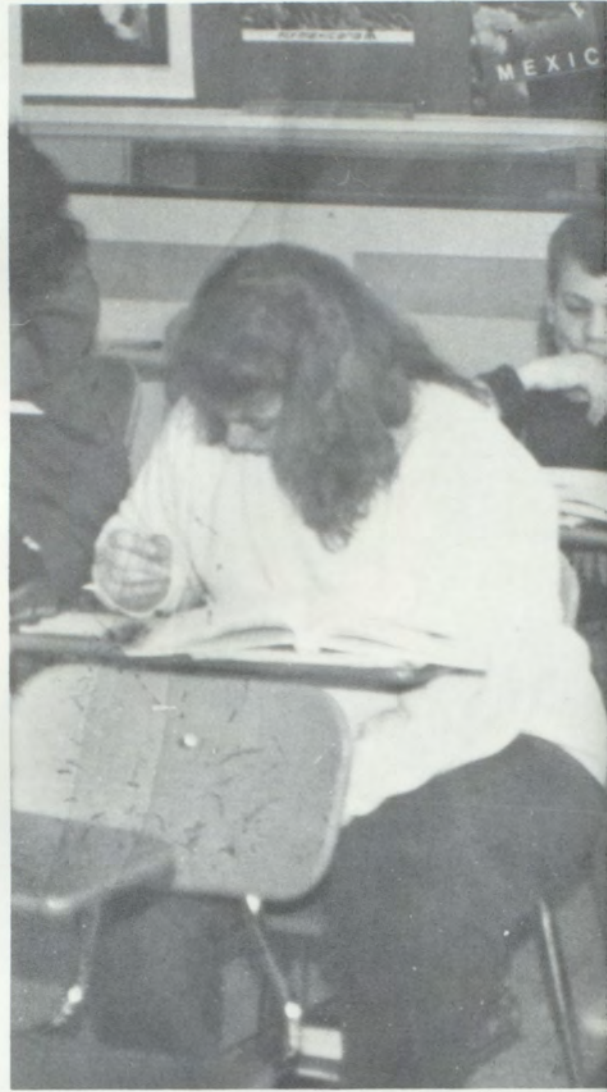

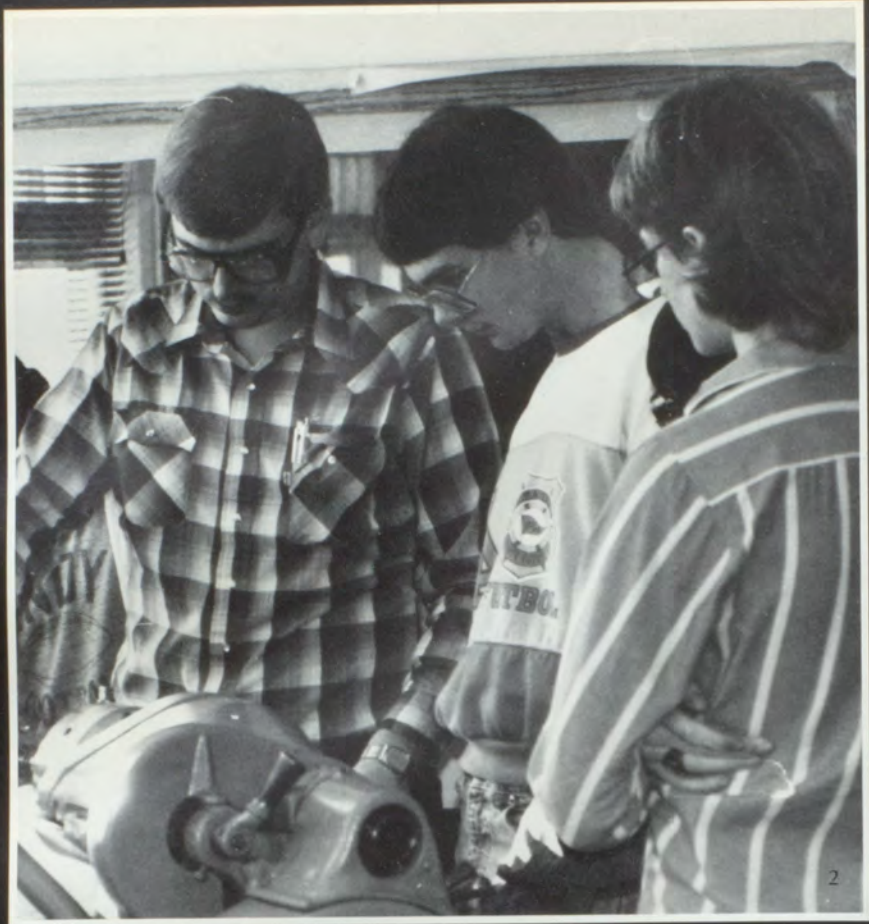

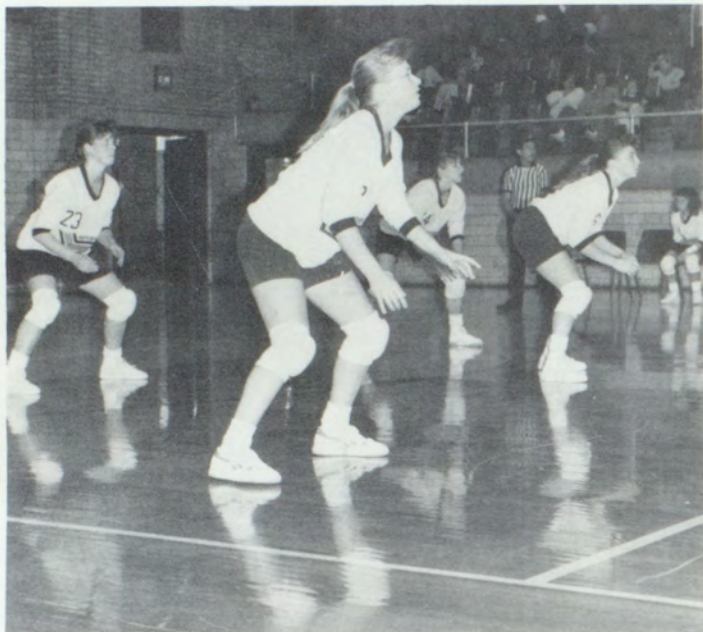

Coming up with a loss to LCHS in the Sub-State finals gave the Lady Bulldogs a second place finish in league action and an impressive 8-1 record.

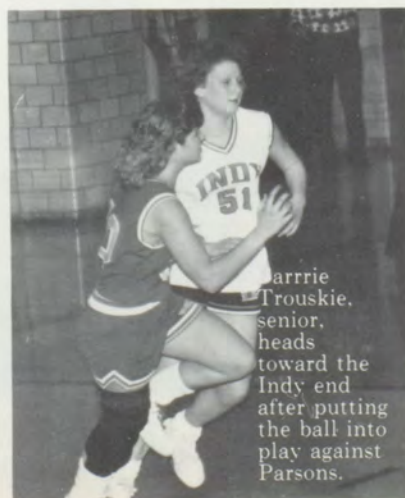

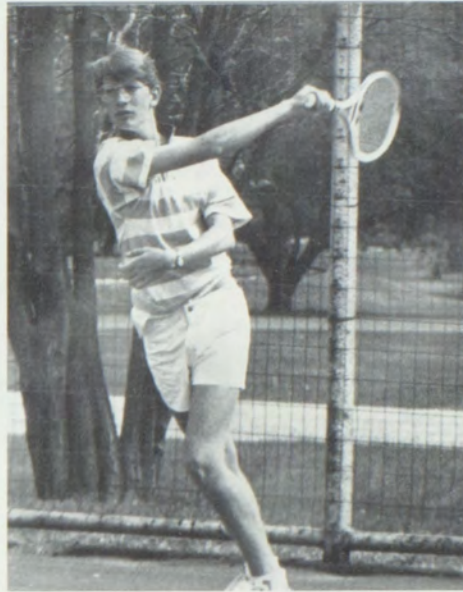

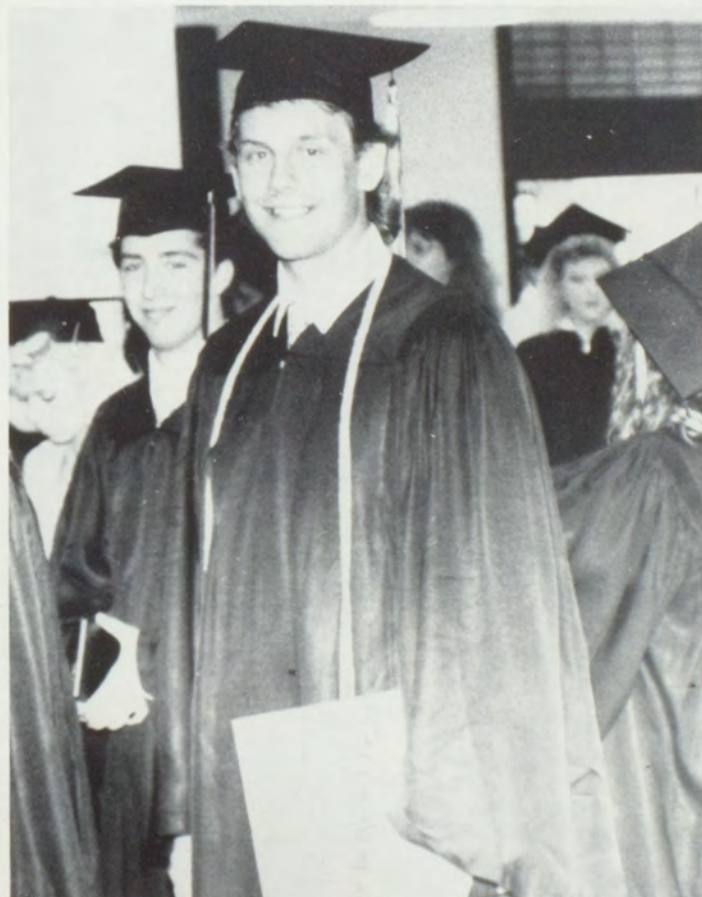
Bigger And Better Things

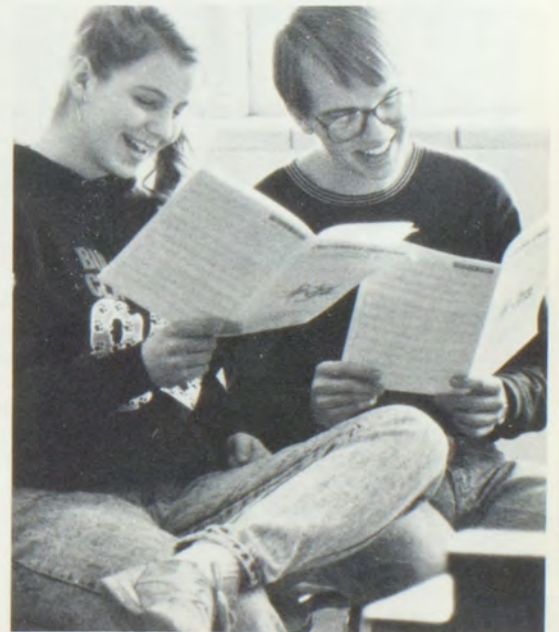


Indy Ensemble . . . "That's A Plenty"

“Paws” And Reflect On The Magic

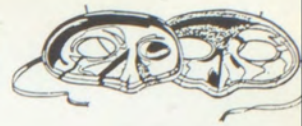

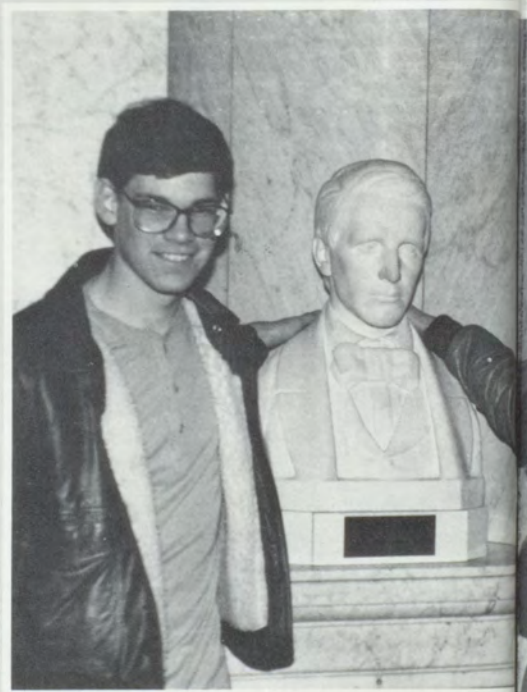

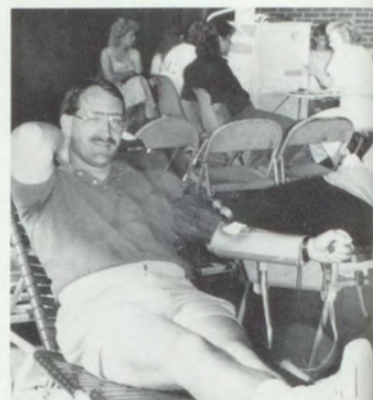

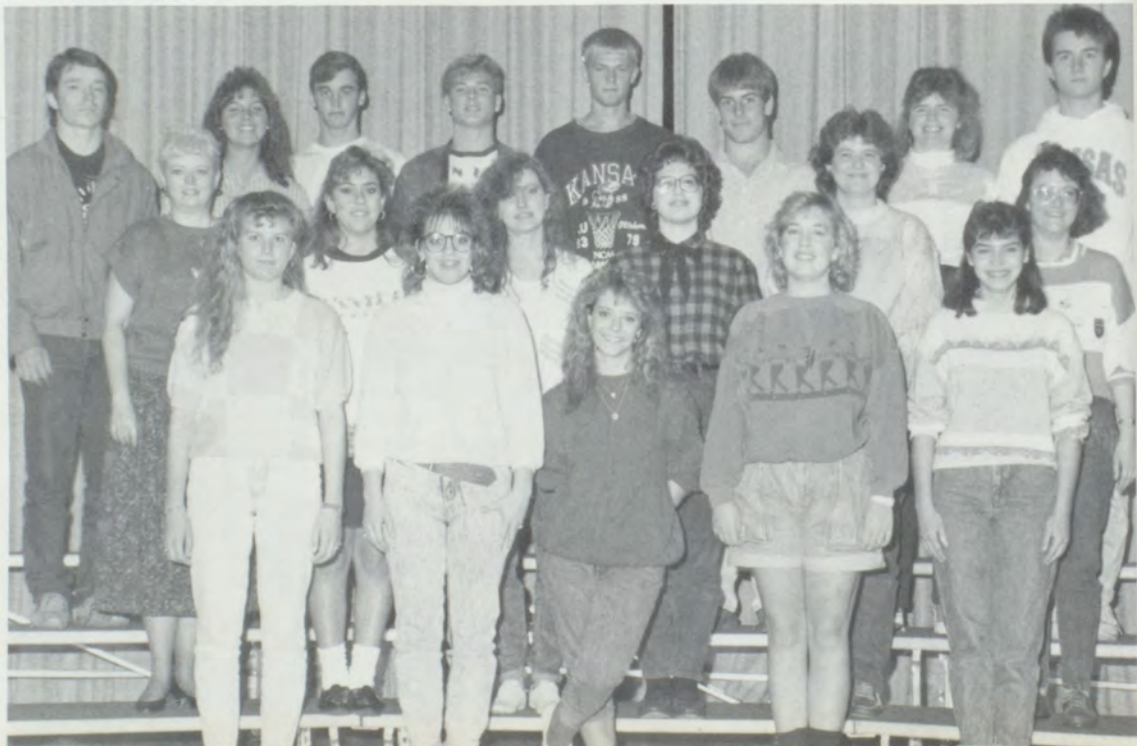

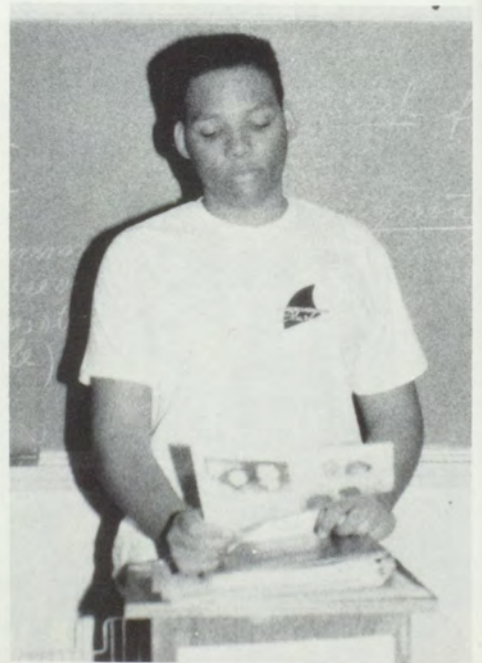

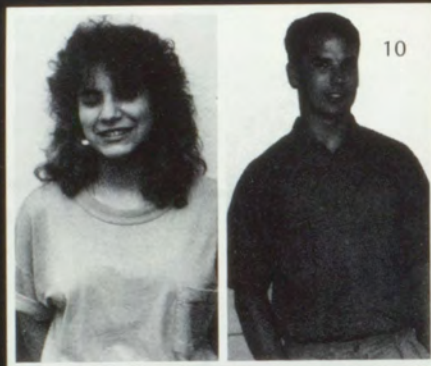
