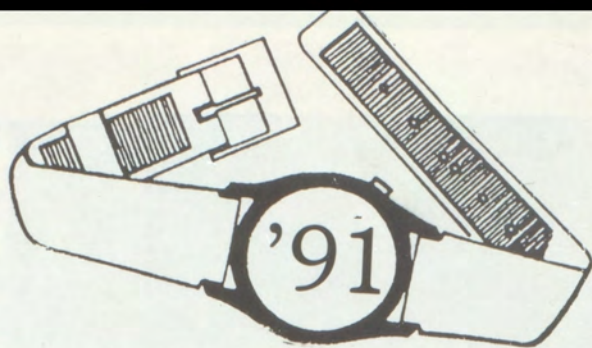

Thomas Ewing believes Friday the thirteenth is a bad day, and walking under a ladder is bad luck.

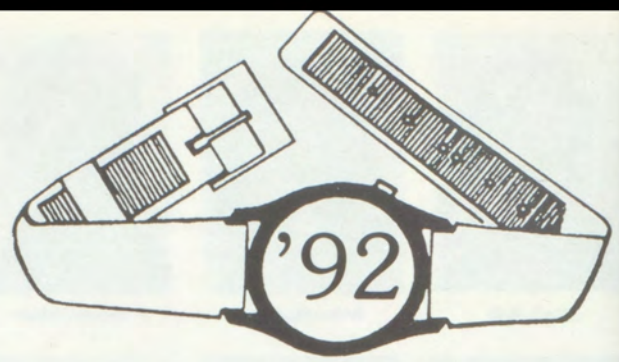

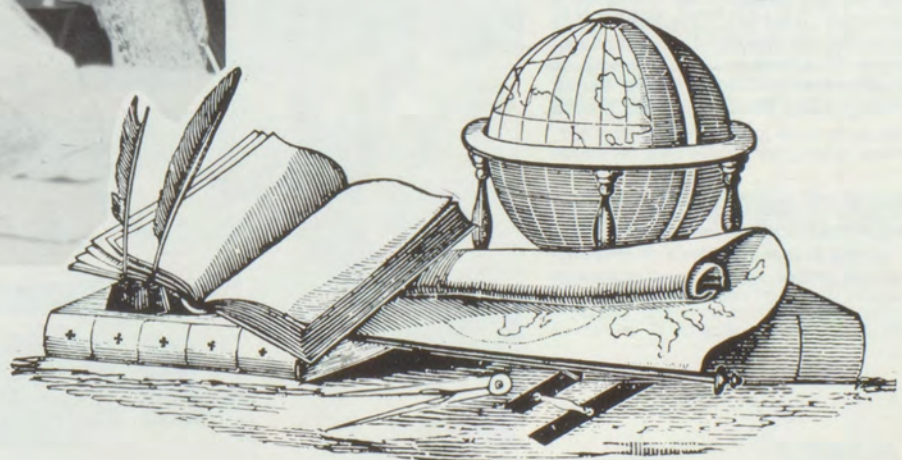
social sciences

The Foreign Language department tries to provide a basic foundation in French I and Latin I instructed by Gloria Winder, and in Spanish I by Rocky Shire. Students gained new insight by listening to the language labs, watching films, and learning foreign customs. Even more enrichment occurs when students progress through Spanish IV, French IV, and Latin II. 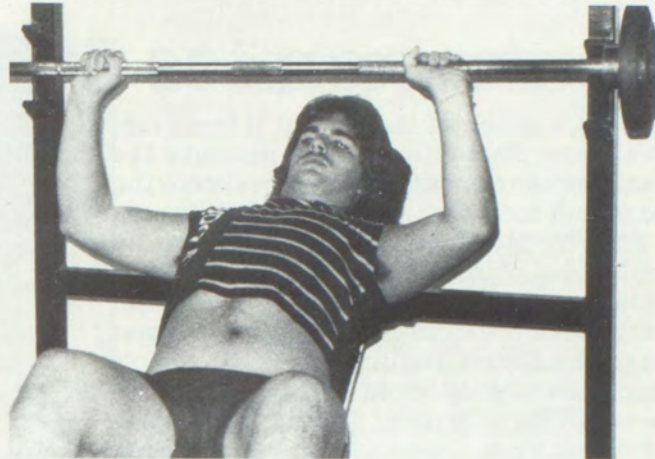
business

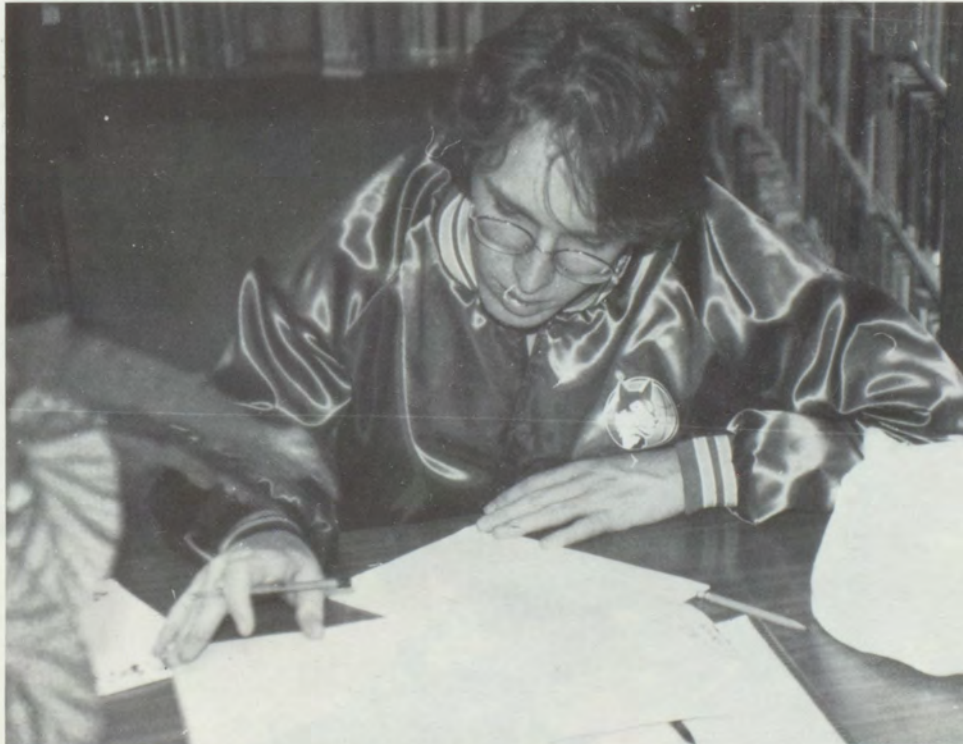

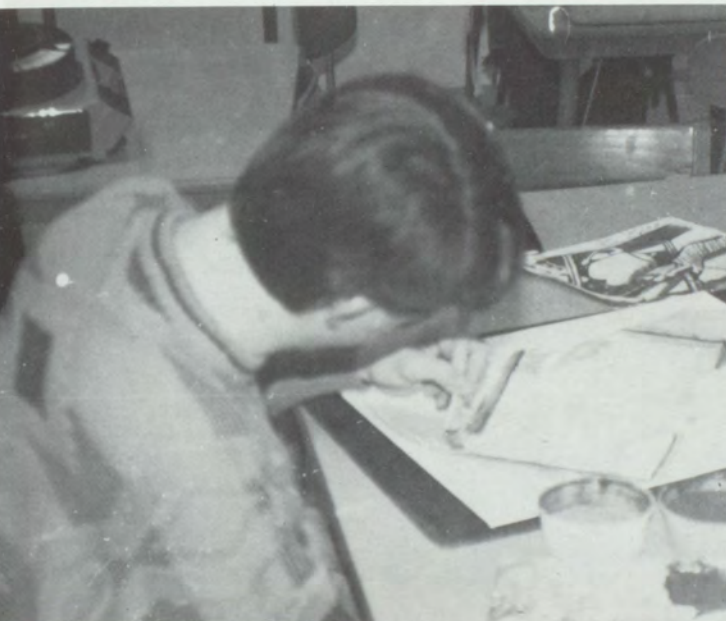


Top Ron Fosnight, junior, carefully shapes the clay into a vase using the pottery wheel in Trouski's Ceramics class.

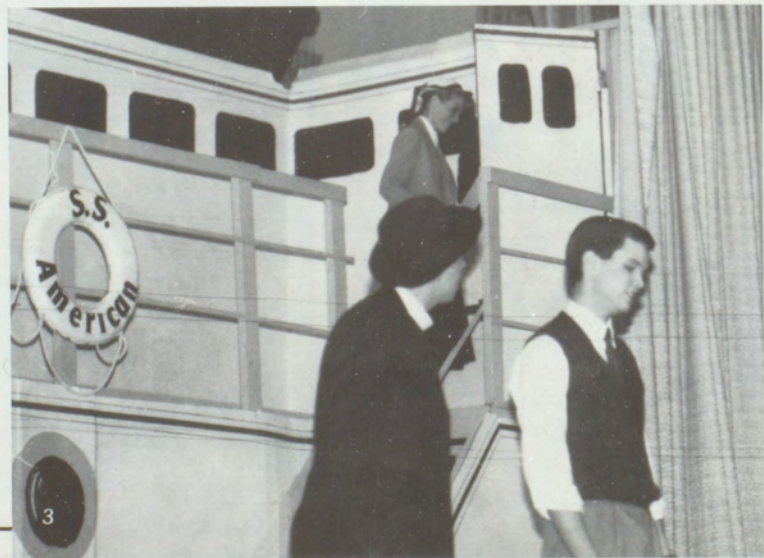

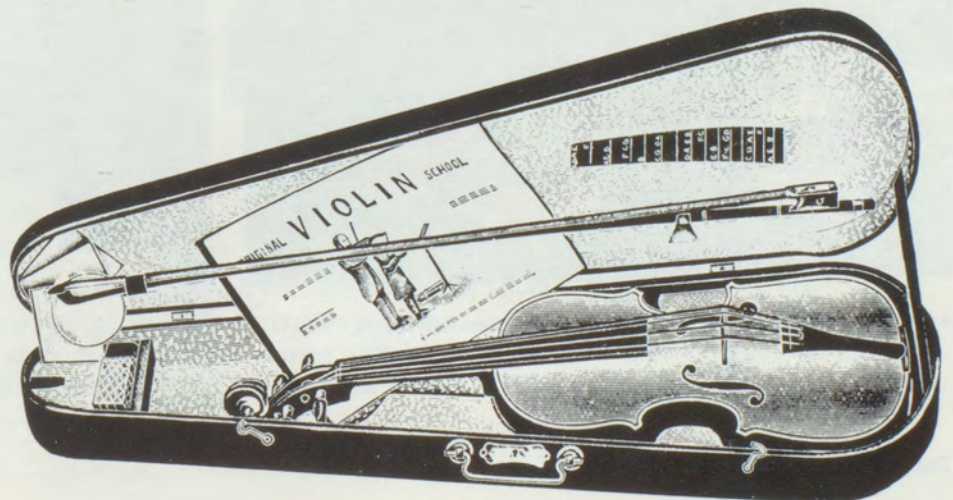

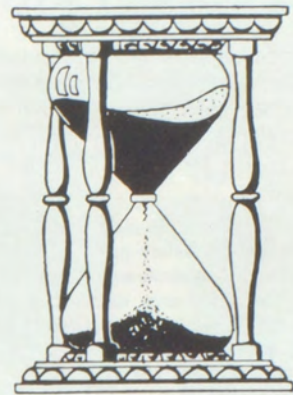

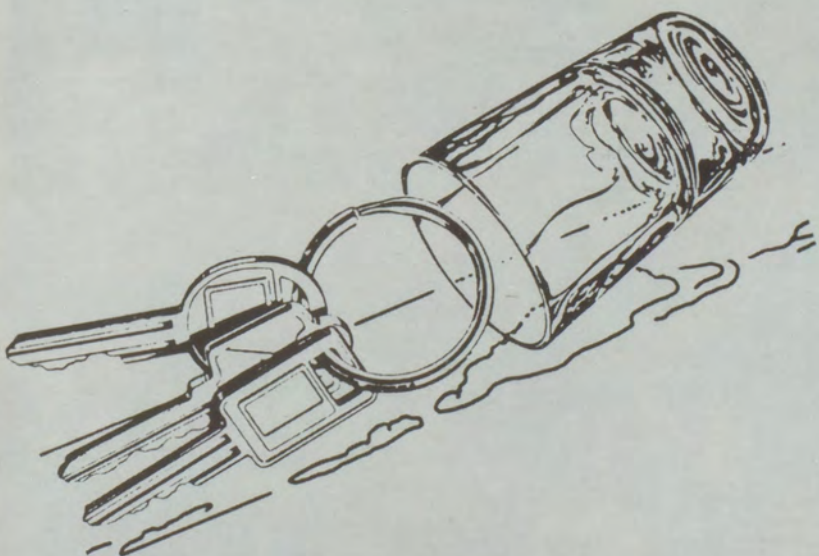

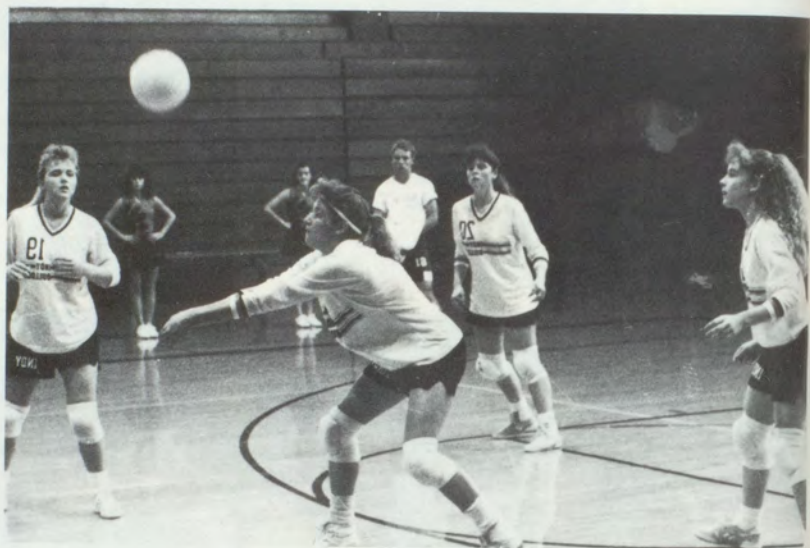

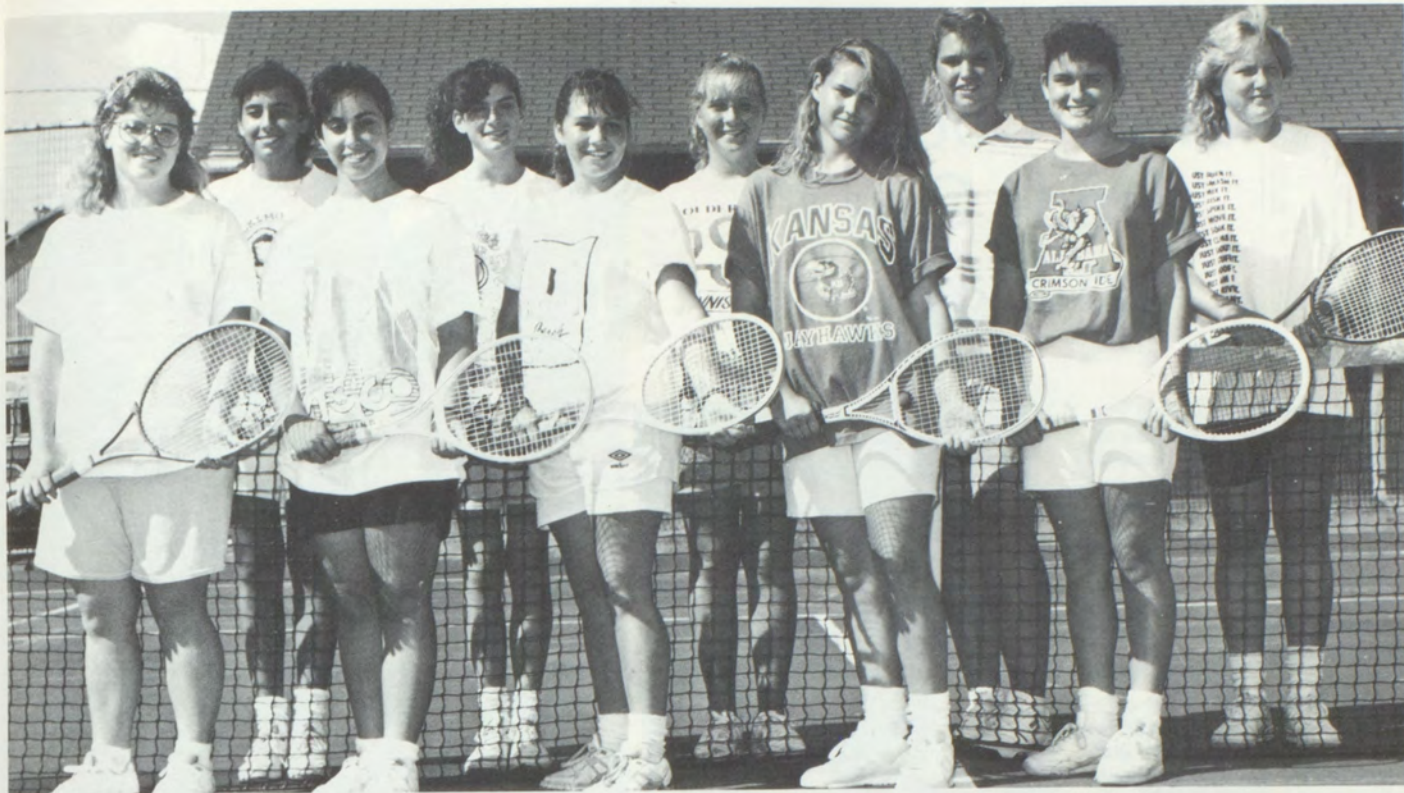

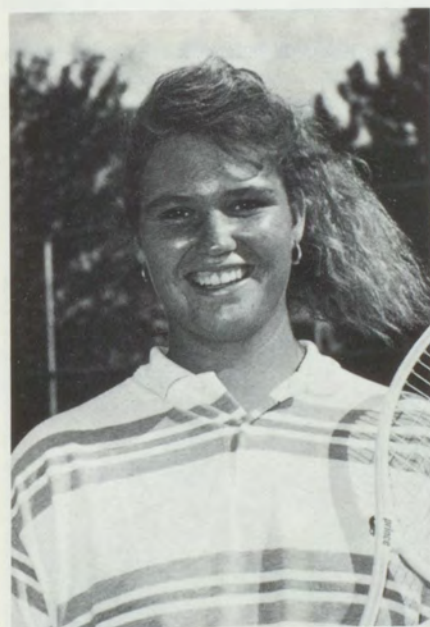

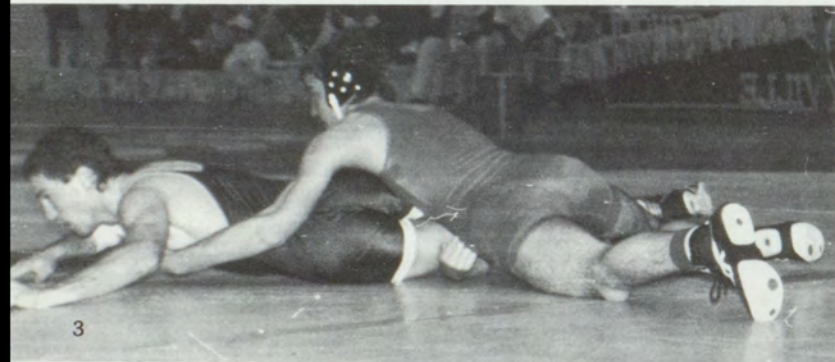
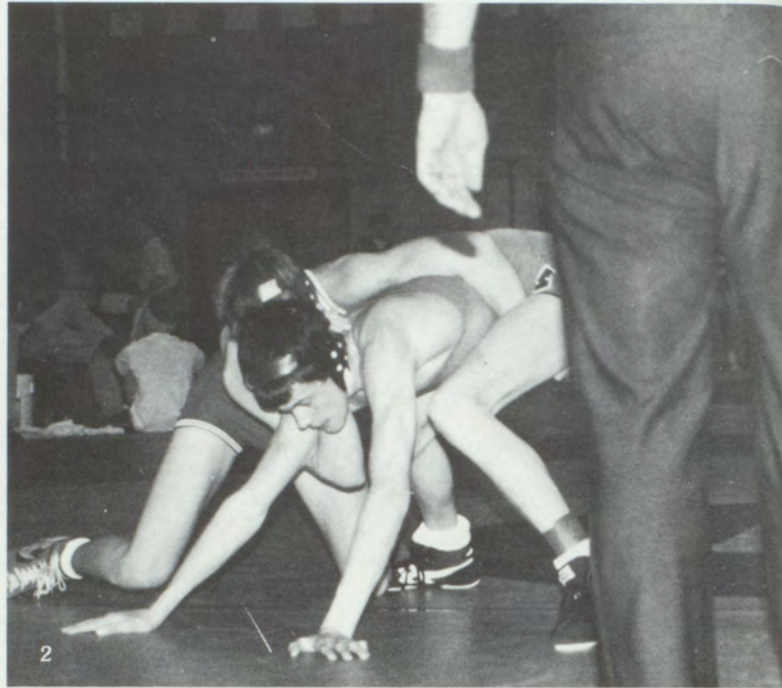

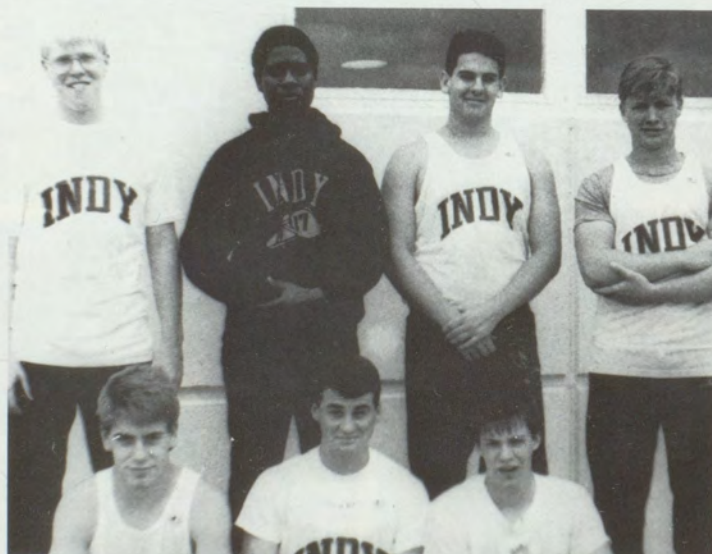

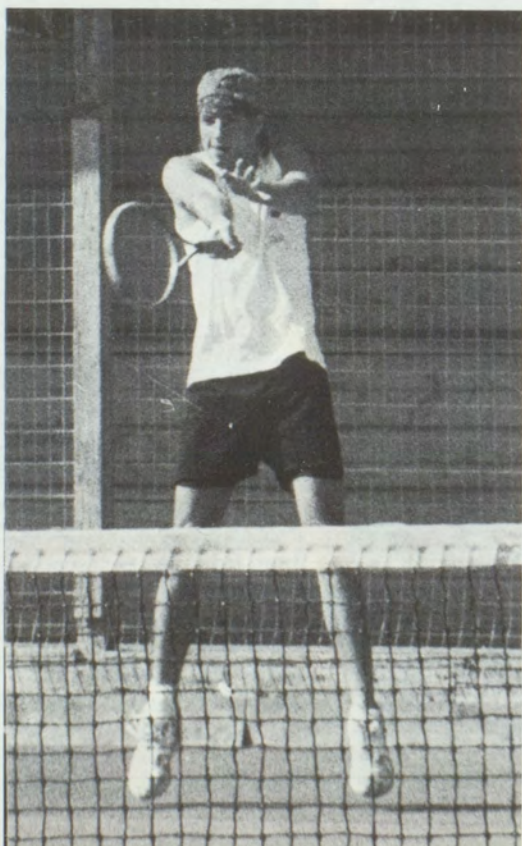

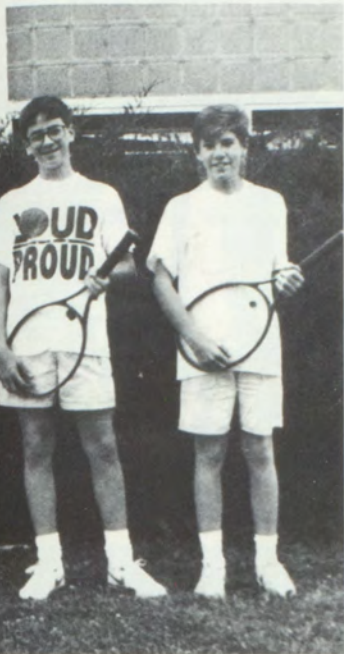

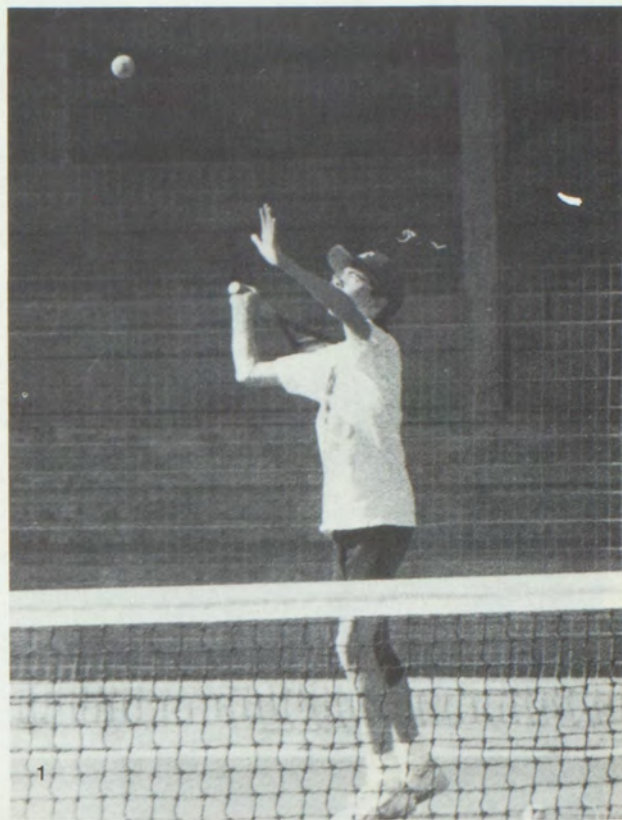

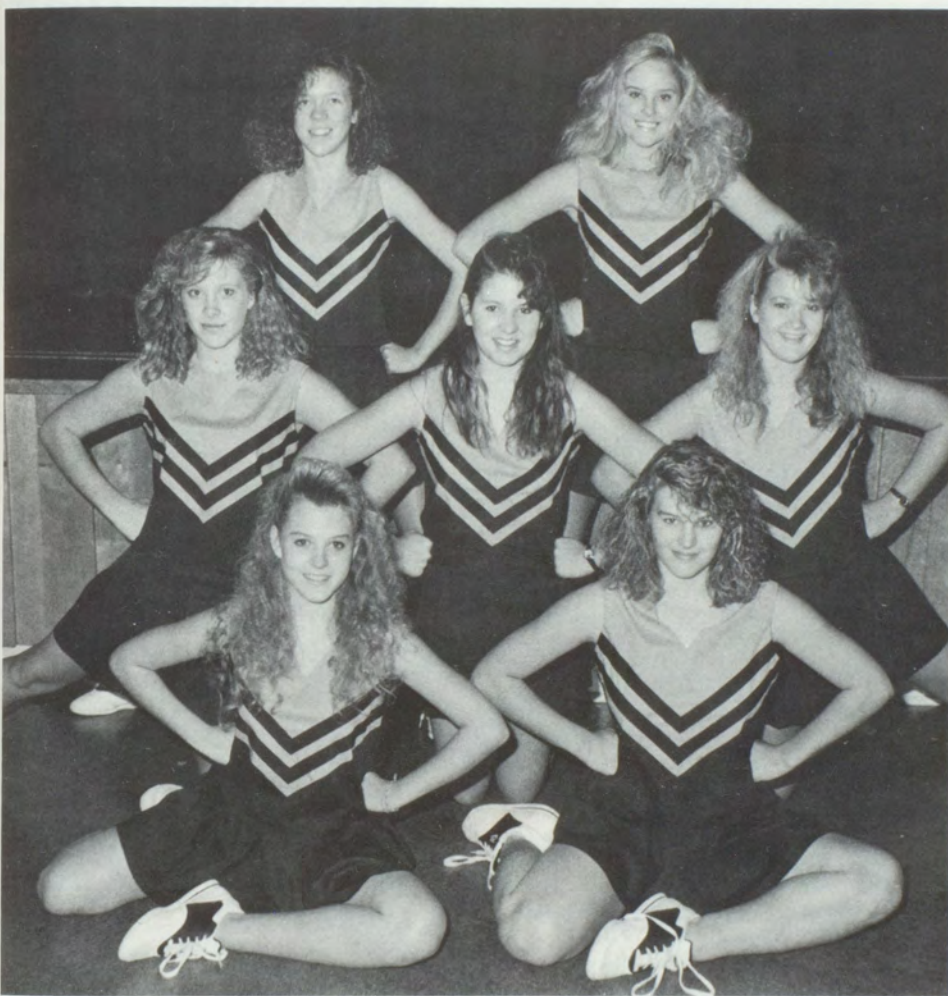

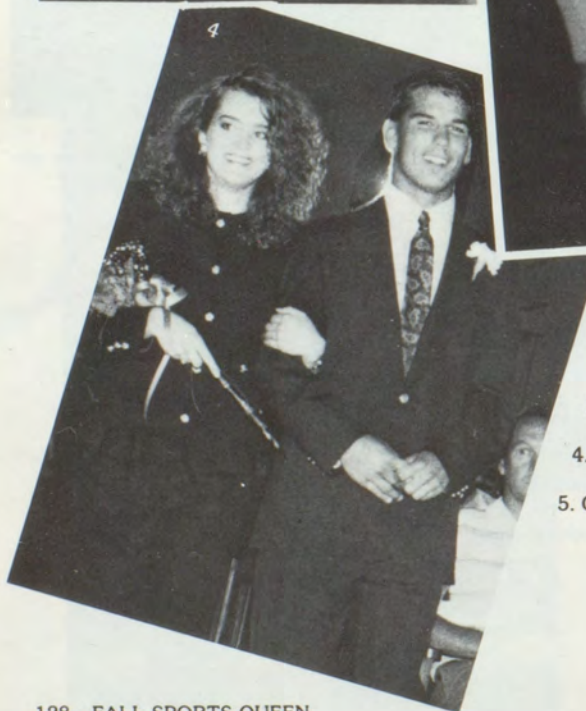

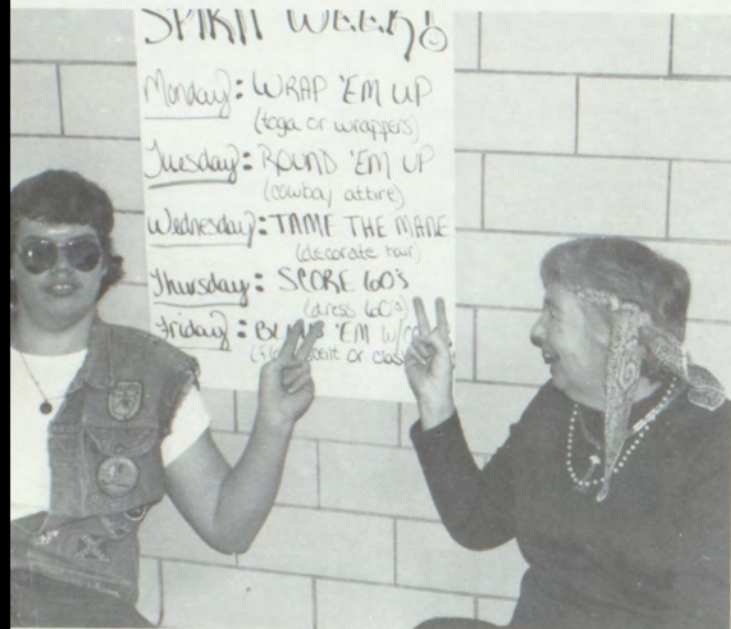

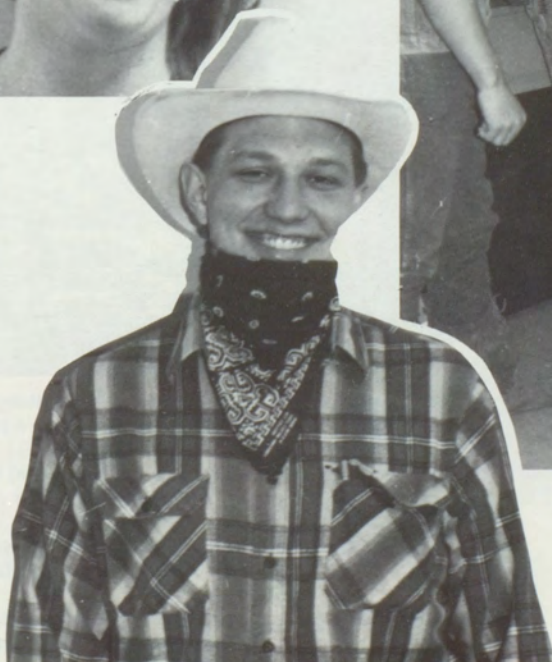

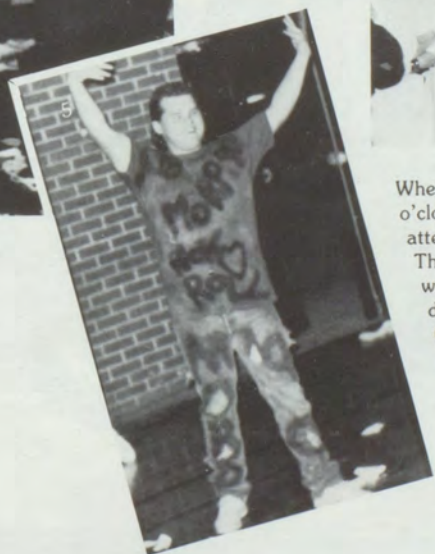

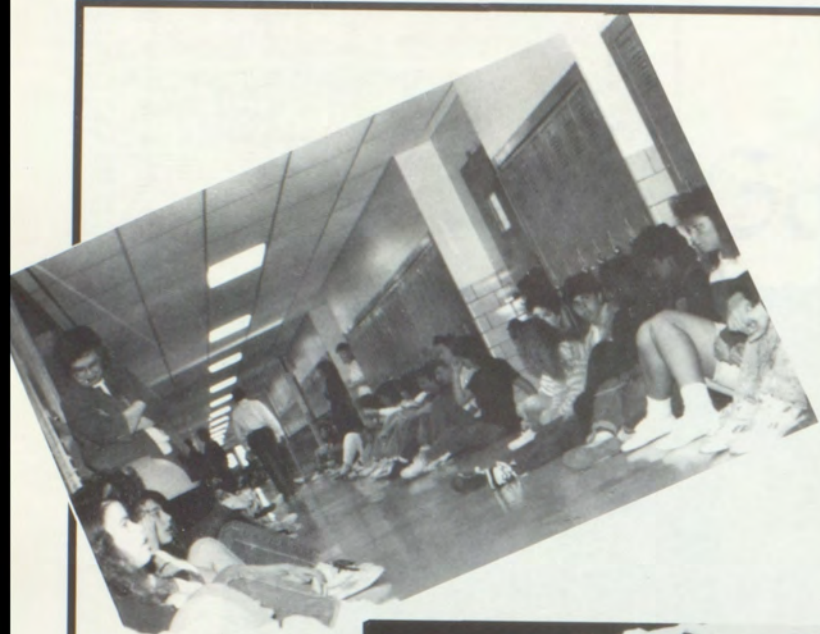

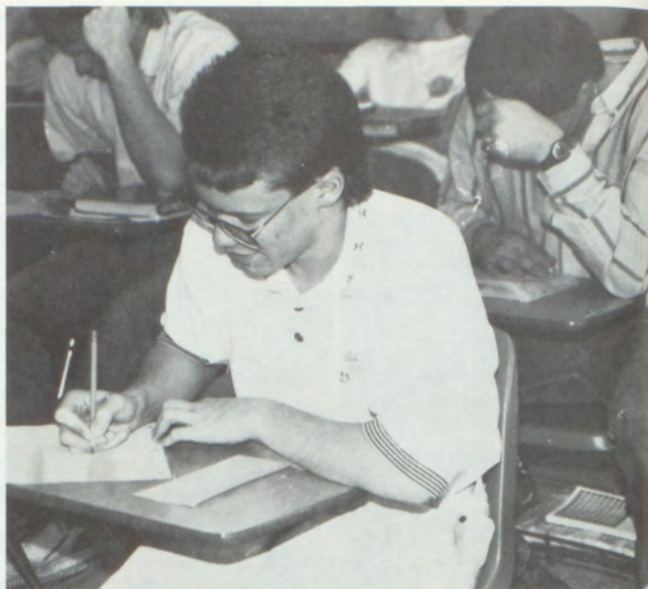

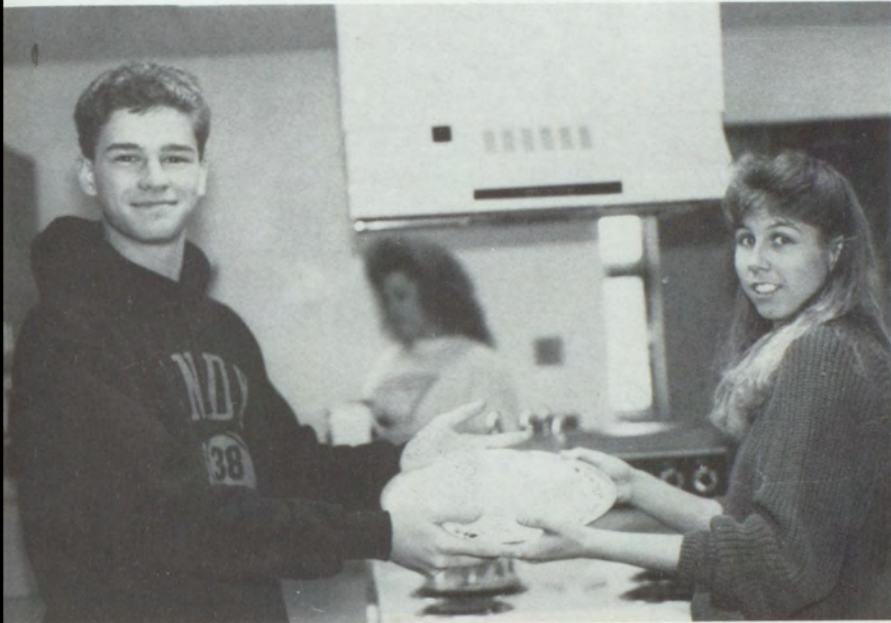

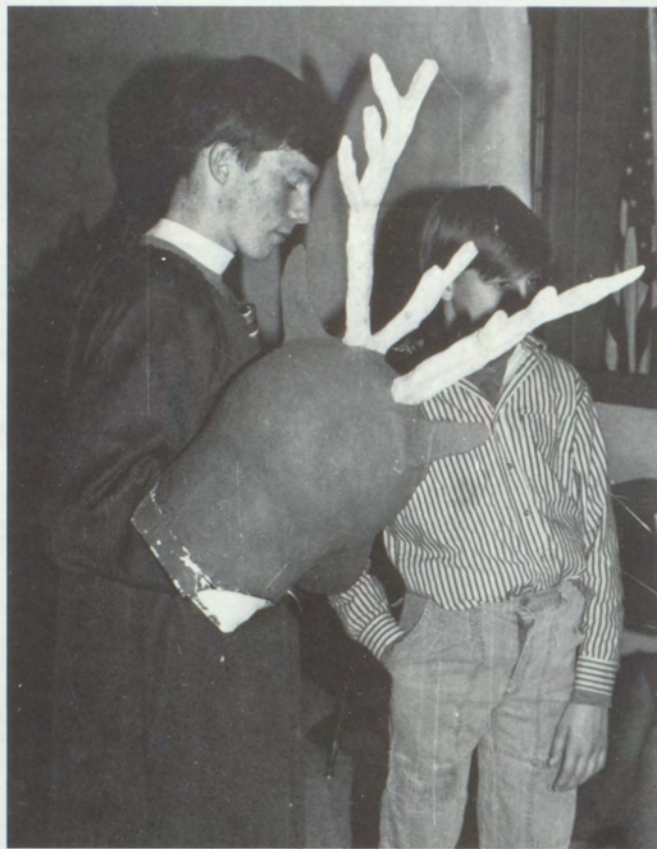

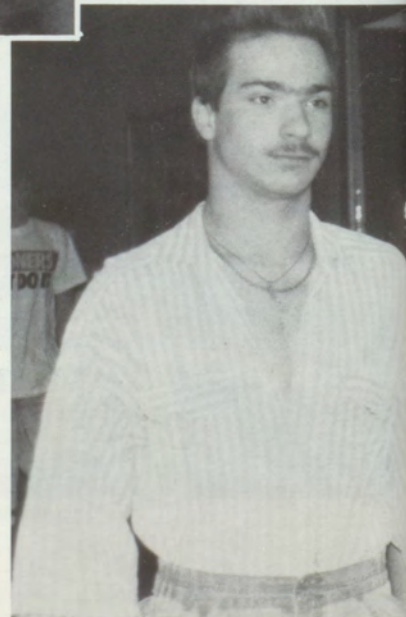


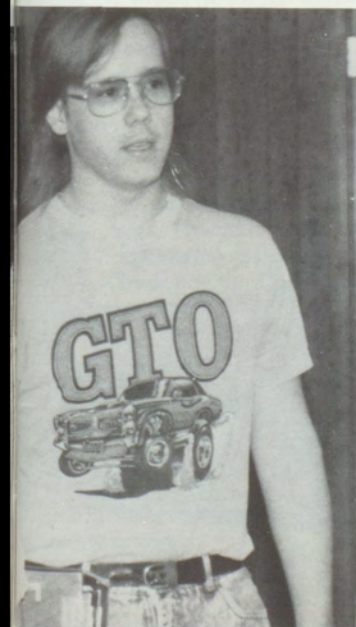

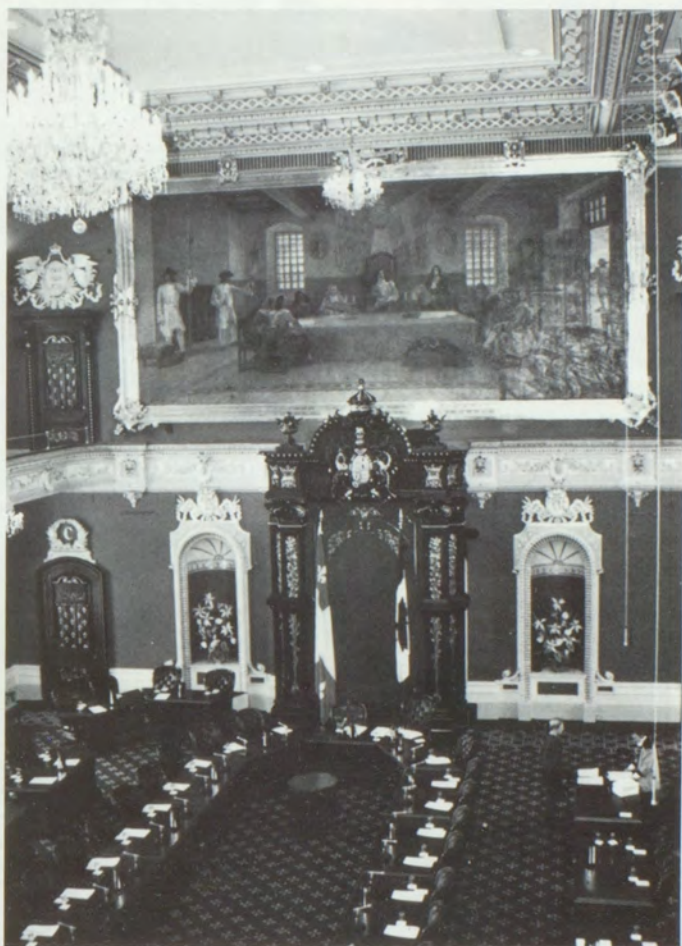
Mr. Shire said, "Talking to, making contact in private homes, and making friends with Soviet Citizens was the most successful thing achieved."

Meise said, "I'm striving to achieve an understanding of the frontier mountainmen. I decided to join a club and live the life of a mountainman on weekends."

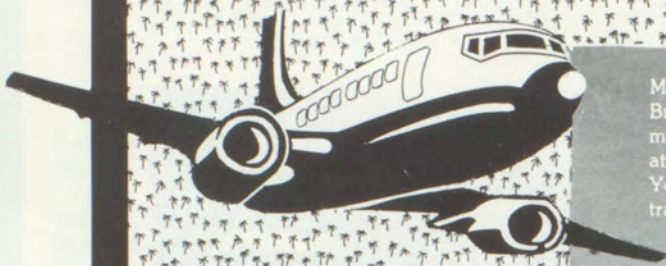
